A current of electricity always heats the conductor through which it goes. The conversion into heat of the electrical energy is always complete. 



made a subject of investigation by the Geological Survey. Two experts-H. V. Winchell and F. F. Sharpless-were sent three months ago to explore these wonderful sands, concerning the possibilities of which as a source of wealth there has been much speculation. They contain not only gold, but also considerable quantities of platinum, as well as other rare and precious metals so rich are they in rubies and garnets as to be actually red in places from the presence of those gems. In one spot there are at least 50,000 tons of sand that holds two to five per cent. of garnets and rubies in remarkable perfect and beautiful crystals. 'I he experts re-
