

POSTAL EMPOYES CANOT LOBBY.

An important order was issued last Saturday by Postmaster-General Wilson, directed against the organization of postal employes to secure legislative action. The order is as follows : "Hereafter no McKinley headquarters in the remedy will give instant relief. postmaster, postoffice clerk, letterhotel in which the Republican carrier, railway postal clerk or other postal employe shall visit Washington, whether on leave, with or without pay, for the purpose of influencing legislation before Congress. Any such employe of the postal service who violates this order shall be liable to removal.
