OUR COAST DEFENDERS.

Six pneumatic dynamite guns, capable of hurling 500-pound projectiles, containing the highest explosive, two miles and dealing a blow to the largest battle ship that would cause her complete disappearance, have been completed by the War Department for defenses of New York and San Francisco harbors. Three guns each mounted on Sandy Hook, now known as Fort Hancock, and three at Fort Scott, guarding the Golden Gate. They were all constructed by priyate firms, under government contract, and have all fulfilled the stringent requirements.

These weapons are unquestionably the most powerful means of defense known to modern science for land fortifications. They lack the terrific velocities and range of powder guns, but the blow dealt by one of their shells is almost incalculable. Some officers have contended that the flight of the projectiles are so slow that they can be watched and dodged by fast torpedo boats, but this is not believed to be true, and in fact it would not be necessary to hit a ship in order to seriously harm her, but the shock experienced from the explosion of a shell some distance off would be sufficient to put most of a vessel's men out of action.

While the government has accepted only six of these guns, others are contemplated for other defenses Two or three will be placed to guard Washington city, with the assistance of steel guns, at old Fort Washington.
