SPANIARDS ROUTED.

The 600 American marines encamped on the shores of Guantanamo bay, Cuba, have been reinforced by Cubans and won a signal victory Tuesday. Dispatches received Wednesday night, which tell the story of the victory for the first time, state that the Americans and Cubans captured the camp of the Spaniards, four miles inland. The bodies of 40 of the Spanish dead were found and 18 were taken prisoners. Two of the Cuban allies were killed, four of them were wounded and two of the American marines were wounded.

Admiral Sampson has notified the Navy Department that 1,500 Cubans from the commands of Garcia and Rabi have reinforced at Guantanamo. This makes the combined force strong enough to hold its position against any number of men which the Spaniards are likely to send against it.

The insurgents have occupied Acerraderos, eight miles from Santiago, in pursuance of a plan agreed upon with General Miles. This place contains iron wharves, which will be useful in landing General Sharfter's heavy artillery.

The dynamite erniser Vesuvius has had at Santiago her first test in actual warfare. She fired three shells, each containing 200 pounds of gun-cotton, at a Spanish fort. Every shell struck either in the fort or near it and frightful execution was done, although the effects in detail could not be clearly seen from the American fleet.

The cruiser New Orleans attacked and rendered useless a new battery which the Spaniards were erecting at Santiago.

The Spanish government has authorized Gen. Blanco to entertain proposals for an exchange of Lieut. Hobson and the other prisoners taken when the collier Merrimac was sunk at the entrance of the harbor of Santiago. - Sun.

# TWO MARINES KILLED.

The Spanish had a body of sharpshooters, who kept constantly firing at the Americans from the bushes. Two marines were killed and four were wounded. The loss of the Spaniards is not known, but the bodies of 15 of their dead were found.

A Spanish correspondent in Havana reports that three soldiers were "slightly wounded" Tuesday at the Zocapa battery, near Santiago de Cuba, by the fire from American warships. He states that a horse was killed by American projectiles near the lighthouse of Santiago port Monday night.

Lieut. Victor Blue has made a detour of 70 miles for observation of the harbor of Santiago. He reports the Spanish fleet all there.

# HUNTING ELEPHANTS

AN EXCITING ADVENTURE IN THE UF-FER KONGO REGION.
