UNDER A HOT FIRE. British Officer Writes of His Experiences at Colenso. A letter received from a British offi-

cer who took part in the battle of Colenso savs: "At the start a shell from our own artillery, with a fuse badly timed, burst in the middle of my company, wounding about five men. I was knocked down by the explosion and a portion of the shell struck the ground at the side of my boot. We

went on and got behind a mound, with bullets flying within a few inches and shells bursting over us. A bullet from a shrapnel hit my side without hurting me, and I kept it as a memento. We lay as flat as possible. waiting to be killed, as no one thought we would escape. We were under fire from 5:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.

"Soon the Red Cross people appeared and we were relieved from an awkward position. While lying on the ground I felt a bullet skim along my back and found that it had made a hole in my jacket. Our men were wonderfully plucky. One man near me got a bullet through him, and said, 'Ah, and if the bastes haven't hit me; that's one fer them.' Immediately the words were out of his mouth he got another, and, cooler than ever, said. 'Bejabers, if they haven't struck me the second time.' Another bullet struck him just after, and he said.

'Well, that's number three! I do think the blackguards might let a feller alone when they've hit him wance." Others were laughing and joking continually.

"I actually slept as I lay on the ground, and was awakened by the bullets going 'ping' upon the ground at the side of my head. One Boer was very kind. He galloped more than once to the river with bottles of water for our men, and seemed very distressed. He said they were all tired of the war and asked what we were fighting about. He thought the English were jolly good fellows. Other Boers loted the dead and wounded. and one officer was found with a finger cut off to get a gold ring."

#### MILK PRODUCTION.

#### How the Market Is Changing From Old Conditions.

The New York institutes are discussing two questions in the diary sections with more than ordinary interest-the feeding of the cow, and the producing of finer, purer milk. The milk market is rapidly changing from old conditions. ity of milk is wholly a matter of care good care and attention, gives absolutely pure, clean milk, free from all deleterious matter. Milk drawn into a sterilized bottle (so as not to come in contact with the air) and sealed, keeps indefinitely, so that all trouble with milk comes from something that falls into it after milking, and for this the man who milks the cow is wholly responsible. Not that all things that get into milk are bad, for a few of the germs are necessary to secure flavor, etc.; but dirt and its allies are wholly inexcusable.

It goes without saying that stables be kept clean, dry and well ventilated, and with abundance of light. Strange as it may appear, mouldy straw is a fruitful source of introduc-ing bad germs into milk, and not a little trouble comes from this source, as straw mould finds a congenial home and food in milk. The stable should be ventilated, not by open windows and cracks in the siding, but by means of air intakes and flue out-

Everything being made tidy about the stable, milk as soon as drawn from the cow should be removed to a suit-able place and cooled and aerated down to a point near 65 degrees. The forcing of good air into the milk in-troduces extra amounts of oxygen, which has a good effect upon the milk, and especially for shipping or cheese making purposes it is of great value as it hinders cream separation. The strainer only catches the coarse matter at best; all the "soil" has been dissolved and goes through the meshes of the cloth or wire strainer. The strainer never makes dirty milk clean, or takes out the things that start the ferments. Strainers are too often washed in lukewarm water, or often just given a cold water bath at night. Wash it thoroughly in cold water at night, then rinse in oiling hot water and dry in sunshine.





#### WATERING COWS.

#### Important Information From an Authentic Source,

paying nearly, if not quite, as much for butter fat as a few months ago. and the price for farm made butter has correspondingly advanced. Now is a time when it will pay to force cows to the highest practical yield. Water is as essential as feed in milk production, and a dairy cow having insufficient water will give a low yield no matter what she is fed. Besides the water needed to make up the oth er fluids of the body, about 87 per cent. of the milk is water; and experiments have shown that cows giving ments have shown that cows giving the most milk and those giving rich milk must have the most water. Where the stall is fitted with one of the self-watering devices, that places a constant supply of fresh water be-fore the cow all the time, she will drink 10 to 20 times each 24 hours, the bisecure areal quantity at a fine taking only a small quantity at a time, and numerous trials have shown that best yields of milk are obtained when the cow can drink in this way. many cases the increased milk yield obtained from this method of water-ing has paid, in a single season, Where this system is not used, the

cows should be watered twice daily and watered under shelter, if possible -either in the stable or from a trough protected by a shed. When the stable or storms weak in going to water, even if the expo-sure is short, the milk yield is often cut down 25 per cent. for several days afterward, and the loss is not infre-quently more. If such exposure is made for several days in succession, the milk yield is usually reduced for the remainder of the milking season. It will often pay to haul water to dairy josure.
