A large percentage of centenarians who died with all their wits about them and with excellent memories of the days of their youth have suffered for many years from rheumatism and been particularly free from other diseases.

The loss of a leg or an arm is also said to do you good in the long run. Perhaps that is an awkward phrase to apply to the loss of a leg, but let it stand. It certainly seems that when a man is deprived of a leg or an arm the vitality and vigor of the lost memter remain with him to increase the vitality of the remainder.

It has been declared by an eminent authority that when a man has a leg cut off, he being in sufficiently good nealth not to collapse from the operation, adds two or three, sometimes more, years on to his latter days .-Pearson's Weekly.
