Charges must be made in writing before the board. If the board discovers that any shop is in an unsanitary condition it can call upon the Health Department to declare the place a public nuisance.

The act does not apply to or effect any person now working as a barber except that a person so employed less than three years shall be considered an apprentice.

A fine of not less than \$10 nor imprisonment of not more than 30 days in jail is provided for violation of the act.



Threads are cut on the other ends, and tees are screwed into each piece. Next four more pieces are cnt seven inches long, and one end of each is threaded and screwed into the tees, thus forming four rods twelve inches long for the uprights.

One-quarter inch holes are drilled into each runner twenty-seven inches oak scantling two feet six inches long. Four three-eighths inch rods are then cut eighteen inches long, threaded on the end and bent the desired shape, as cass is shown in the illustration.
