Origin Of Workings of The Present System Of Hours.

Primarily, for the convenience of the railroads, a standard of time was established by mutual agreement in 1883, by which trains are run and this system the United States, extending from 65 degrees to 125 degrees west longitude, is divided into four time sections, each of 15 degrees of longitude, exactly equivalent to one hour, commencing with the seventy-fifth meridian. The first (Eastern) section includes all territory between the Atlantic Coast and an irregular line drawn from Detroit, Mich., to Charleston, S. C., the latter being its most southern point. The second (central) section includes all the territory between the last-named line and an irregular line from Bismarck, N. D., to the nearly the western borders of Idaho, Utah and Arizona. The fourth (Pacific section) covers the rest of the country is uniform inside each of these sections, and the time of each section differs from that next to it by ex-

World to Trap. Probably the great condor is the most difficult bird in the world to trap. One of the great vultures, it inhabits lofty peaks of the Andes, hardly accessible to man. It builds its nest among the topmost crags, often on a ledge of some precipice with an almost perpendicular drop of many hundred feet.






