



NEGRO LYNCHED BY OHIO MOB.

Springfield, O., March 7.—At 11 o'clock the negro Richard Dixon was taken from the jail and shot to death in the jail yard, and the body was taken from there to the corner of Main street and Fountain avenue and hung to a telegraph pole, where the mob spent the next half hour riddling the body with bullets from several hundred revolvers.

The mob found an entrance to the jail by butting in the east doors with a railroad iron. At 10.30 the mob melted rapidly, and it was the general opinion that no more attempts would be made to force an entrance. Small groups of men, however, could be seen in the shadows of the courthouse, two adjacent livery stables and several dwelling houses. At 10.45 the police were satisfied that there was nothing more to fear and they, with other officials and newspaper men, passed freely in and out of the jail.

Shortly before 11 o'clock a diversion was made by a small crowd moving from the east doors around to the south entrance. The police followed and a bluff was made at jostling them off the steps leading up to the south entrance. The crowd at this point kept growing, while yells of "hold the police," "smash the doors," "lynch the nigger" were made, interspersed with revolver shots. All this time the party with the heavy railway iron was beating at the east door, which shortly yielded to the battering ram, as did the inner lattice iron doors. The mob then surged through the east door, overpowered the sheriff, turnkey and handful of deputies and began the assault on the iron turnstile leading to the cells.

The police from the south door were called inside to help keep the mob from the cells, and in five minutes the south door had shared the fate of the east one. In an incredibly short time the jail was filled by a mad mob of 250 men, with all the entrances and yard gates blocked by fully 1,500 men, thus making it impossible for the militia to have prevented access to the negro had it been on the scene.

The heavy iron partition leading to the cells resisted the mob effectually until cold chisels and sledge hammers arrived, which were only two or three minutes in arriving. The padlock to the turnstile was broken and the mob soon filled the corridors leading to the cells. Seeing that further resistance was useless, and to avoid the killing of innocent prisoners, the authorities consented to the demand of the mob for his cell to the jail door and thence down the stone steps to a paved court in the jail yard.

War News In Brief. The Japanese forces are pushing forward into Manchuria, fighting and driving back the Russian advance guard with loss, but the Japs have a force of 36,000 strongly entrenched in front of them. They are also landing troops along the Yalu.

It is believed that the plan of the Japanese is to outflank the Russians and get in their rear in order to cut their line of communication and stop supplies.

MOTHER OF 13 AT 26.

New York, March 9.—The surgeons of Bellevue Hospital have a most unusual case in the psychopathic ward of a woman, 26 years old, who has been driven insane through the nursing and caring for 13 children that she brought into the world.

This remarkable patient is Mrs. Eva Abernathy. She was in the hospital last January when she became the mother of her fifth pair of twins.

The physicians who are caring for her learned today that grief was also responsible for her mental failing, as 11 of her 13 children are dead. From a pathological standpoint, however, too much motherhood was the direct cause of her loss of reason.

Mrs. Abernathy was born in Petersburg, Va. She was married when 15 years old, and at 16 became the mother of her first pair of twins. In the next three years she gave birth to three girl babies, and then in six years, ending with last January, brought four pairs of twins into the world.

Mrs. Abernathy's grandmother raised a family of 25 children. Her sister, Susie Black, who lives in Petersburg, is but 30 years old and is the mother of 20 children.

MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.

Owing to a desire to study amendments made by the Senate, the House of Delegates failed Wednesday to pass the Baltimore City Emergency Bill, but will pass it shortly.

The House Committee on Corporations gave a hearing to the advocates and opponents of a bill to authorize the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal Company to charge 50 cents for each passenger on a boat using the canal.

The Baltimore city delegation gave a hearing on the bill to appropriate \$250,000 for a new home for the Maryland Institute.

A report from the House Committee on Elections, to be submitted early next week, will, it is understood, favor the unseating of Mr. Smoot, Republican, of Charles county.

A bill was introduced in the Senate to incorporate the Baltimore and Southwestern Railroad Company. Delegate Morrison introduced a bill to revise the act creating the State Charities Commission.

Delegate Bosse offered a bill to incorporate the People's Savings Bank. The bill to appropriate \$100,000 for a library building for the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland was killed by the House of Delegates.

A measure which is intended as a substitute for the Haman Oyster Bill, but which will apply only to the waters of Calvert county, will be introduced in the House.
