Harmony reigned supreme at the Republican State Convention held in Baltimore Wednesday. John B. Hanna, State Chairman, called the convention to order and Mr. Thomas Parran, former State Chairman, was made permanent presiding officer. William F. Stone, Collector of the Port of Baltimore, and the acknowledged leader of his party in this State, was on hand and it was clear to everybody that he was the "Big Noise."

Frank E. Williams, of Cecil county, one-time pastor of the Northminster Presbyterian Church and at present editor of the Cecil Whig, was nominated for State Comptroller to oppose Dr. Joshua W. Herring, of Carroll, the Democratic nominee.

The platform adopted expresses satisfaction at the election of Mr. Taft and his "wise, progressive and patriotic administration" and decries the "attempt. to adopt an un-American suffrage system in one State of the Union.'

It claims help "from all good citizens, whatever their politics or party, from all sincere friends of honest government and pure politics, in defeating the proposed amendment to our State Constitution, which we accept as the paramount issue in this campaign."

The Democratic organization's attempt to control the administration of State and city is denounced and the extravagance of the Legislature is characterized as "shameless."

IN OLD ROMAN CAMPS.

plete Plant With Furnace and Flues in Excellent State.

In connection with the excavations of the great Roman camp at Caerus, Montgomeryshire, Prof. Bosanquet, who is in charge of the exploring party, has succeeded in opening up the western portion of the camp, unearthing a complete hot air system situated beneath the floors of the rooms. The floors were supported on a number of stone pillars two feet square and two feet high. Flues were laid beneath to carry the hot air from the furnace, and these have been found in an excellent state of preservation. Outside the huge rampart of clay the workmen have come across trenches which surround the camy. The granary has been opened up for its whole length and measures 931 feet. This building was strongly built and was roofed with slabs of stene.
