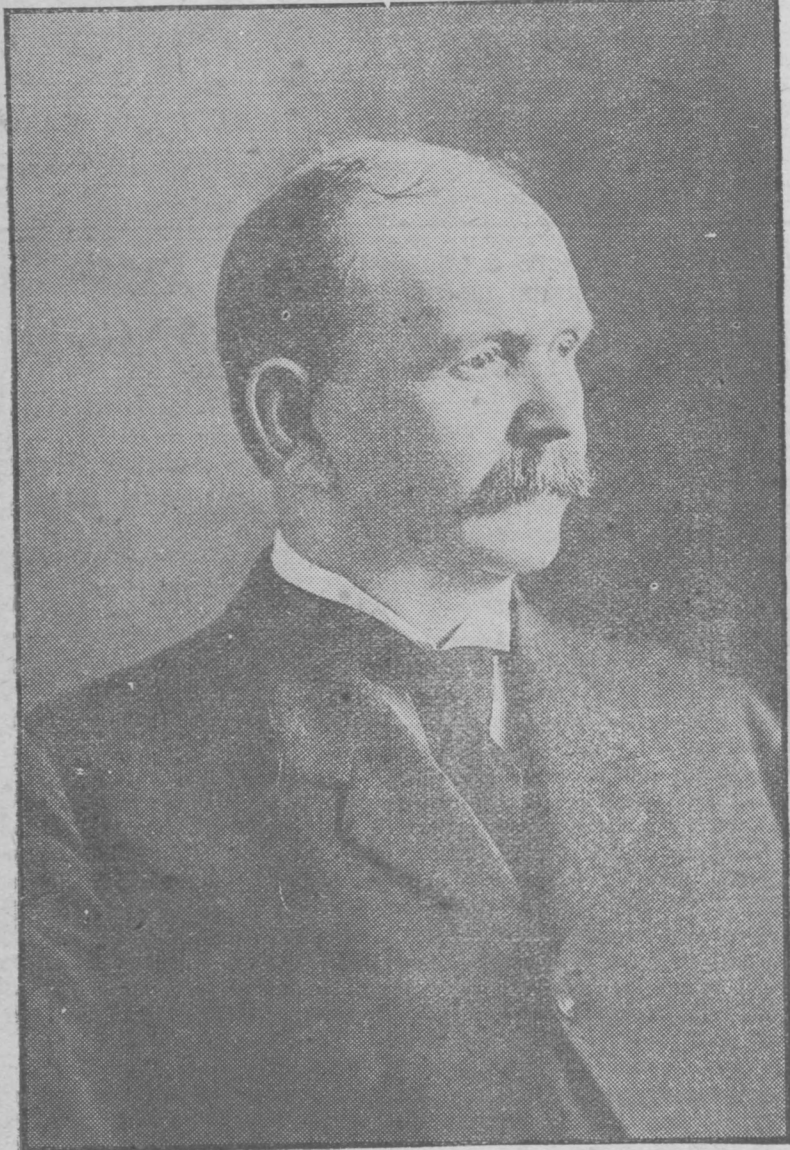




GOVERNOR VISITS EMMITSBURG



Governor Crothers and Chairman Tucker, of the State Roads Commission, made an automobile trip of about 150 miles to inspect the turnpikes recently acquired by the State.

The trip took them out the Frederick road to Frederick, then over the Jefferson, Emmitsburg and Frizzleburg pikes, all of which the State now owns. The trip home was made over the Reisterstown turnpike, which the State has not bought because the price asked was considered too high.

The roads acquired by the State were found to be in good condition.

From Frederick the trip was over the Frederick and Woodboro pike, which the commission desired to purchase, but which was held at too high a figure, to the intersection of the Emmitsburg pike recently acquired. The purchase of this road by the State has created in its neighborhood a great deal of interest in the State roads movement, and on each tollhouse along it was a sign in big red letters with the legend "Free Road." On this road is located St. Joseph's Academy, the great school for girls, of the Sisters of Charity, and Mount St. Mary's College.

INCOME TAX LEVY THAT WILL YIELD \$100,000,000

Senator Brown Ready with a Bill if the Constitutional Amendment is Ratified by The States.

If the income tax constitutional amendment receives the indorsement of the needed three-fourths of the States while this Congress is in its session, Senator Brown of Nebraska, father of the amendment, will at once introduce a bill he has prepared making an income levy from which he expects to obtain \$100,000,000 for the Federal Treasury. Such a levy, he says, will meet at once and forever the argument that the revenue needs of the country stand against any further reduction of the tariff. Thirty States have already indorsed the amendment, and only five more favorable votes are required.

"If this amendment is adopted as part of the Federal Constitution," said Mr. Brown to-day, "the whole tariff situation will be completely revolutionized. The argument that duties cannot be reduced or wiped out because we need the revenue will no longer be valid.

"Just the minute that I can get opportunity to do so, following the conclusive ratification of the amendment, I shall introduce an income tax bill I have completely drafted. It has been submitted to the best authorities. The lowest estimate placed on this revenue is \$70,000,000, which is the figure of the Treasury Department. Other estimates run up to \$90,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

"The Treasury Department's estimate of revenue that would be produced by the corporation tax measure has been proved by experience altogether too low. From this and other indices my own estimate is that my bill will produce just about \$100,000,000 a year."

In Emmitsburg a short call was paid to Rev. J. O. Hayden, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, and another to Mr. Sterling Galt, of THE WEEKLY CHRONICLE. From Emmitsburg to Taneytown the trip was made over a dirt road which was in fairly good condition, and from Taneytown to Frizzleburg over the Frizzleburg turnpike, which has been donated to the State by the people of Carroll county. From this point in to Baltimore the trip was over the Reisterstown turnpike, which the State has been trying to buy, but for which the Good Roads Commission considers the price exorbitant. —Baltimore Sun.

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF SUN

Visible To-Day to Those South of Line from Washington West to Portland, Oregon.

A total eclipse of the sun this evening just misses by a few miles being visible at Emmitsburg.

The phase of totality will begin at 10.51 o'clock Friday morning on the east coast of Australia. The path of total obscuration crosses New Guinea and the islands to the north, follows a generally northeasterly direction, crossing the equator at 155 degrees east longitude, and continuing to about 140 degrees east 15 degrees north, where it dips to 90 degrees east 10 degrees north, just off the coast of Central America.

The sun will be partially obscured in Central America, Mexico and the United States, but the obscuration will not be visible north of a line running from Portland, Ore, through Milwaukee and Pittsburgh to Washington.

The capital will see the edge of the moon on the sun's face, as the sun sets. Chicago will have a five-minute view before it goes down, but Los Angeles, San Diego, and San Francisco will have several hours of it, the sun being about one-third obscured.

This eclipse marks the end, or beginning, of a saros, as the cycle of eclipse is called. The saros runs 18 years 11 days and about 8 hours. The last corresponding total eclipse was on April 16, 1893. Former occurrences were April 5, 1875, and March 25, 1857.

In each saros there are approximately 70 eclipses, 41 solar and 29 lunar, though since 1893 there were 42 solar and 27 lunar.

Vote Buying Contagious in Ohio.

Nine of the 41 votes indicted by the grand jury, which last February investigated election in Scioto county, Ohio, appeared before Judge Blair at Portsmouth and pleaded guilty to selling their votes. They were fined \$25 each and sentenced to six months in the Cincinnati workhouse and disfranchised for five years. The fine and workhouse sentences were suspended on payment of costs amounting to \$9.49 in each case. All nine culprits were from Miles township, which borders upon Adams county, where Judge Blair's activities resulted in the disfranchisement of hundreds of voters. The Scioto county men received \$1 to \$3 for their votes.

Smooth Pavements For Frederick.

At a session of the mayor and aldermen of Frederick held late last week it was decided that more of the ill-paved streets of the city should be improved and several blocks will be paved with vitrified brick. The cost of this work is estimated at from \$25,000 to \$30,000 not including the cost of sewers.

ANOTHER VIEW OF DIAZ

Shrewd and Graceful Action of Clemency To Two American Boys.

Not the least significant passage, by any means, in Mr. Bonsal's recent dispatches to the New York Times from Mexico City was that in which he told how gracefully and tactfully—which is the same thing as saying with how much of what may be called higher statesmanship—the old President exercised executive clemency in the case of two young Americans who had been captured while serving in the rebel army.

It was the father of one of them who made the plea, but Diaz had the best of rights, had he chosen to exercise it, to point out the enormity, from the Mexican Government's point of view, of the offense he was asked to pardon, and to justify by all the rules of international law the treatment of these "boys" with even greater severity than natives caught in open rebellion. In other words, he had more than an excuse to refuse to interfere with the regular course of military procedure.

To have done so, however, would have been to neglect a magnificent opportunity, by a cheap and easy act of mercy, not only to win the heart of the anxious father, but to earn for his Administration something of the kindlier feeling from the general American public of which that Administration is just now in such desperate need. Diaz saw his chance and took it. He cut short the father's remarks about the general folly and waywardness of "boys" with a genial reference to his own early love of fighting and adventure, and he said that it was not for him to condemn as an unpardonable fault a characteristic which had so notable marked himself.

As argument, this had its weak points, since there is a large difference between taking up arms for one's own country against a foreign invader and meddling in another's quarrel. As diplomacy, however, it was beyond criticism, since it proved conclusively to at least three Americans that the old dictator is not the monster of cruelty he has been painted, and to a good many million Americans it at least gave reason for admitting that on occasion he can do a very pretty thing in a very pretty way. And that's something. The episode illustrates again, too, how easily the occupants of great positions—thrones, Presidential chairs, and the like—can, by acts that in lesser people would pass as matters of course and common humanity or kindness, earn—or get—admiring recognition as worthy of their elevation above ordinary mortals.

New York is to have a skyscraper 750 high.

The Massachusetts Senate is equally divide on the Income Tax Amendment.

New York is to spend \$100,000 in a plan to boost the city as a summer resort.

A man is held in \$5,000 bail for getting a child drunk on cider at his home in Connecticut.

John Tyler, an express driver in New York, was arrested for getting away with \$30,000 in packages.

Assistant Attorney General James A. Fowler succeeds Senator-elect Kenyon as official trust buster.

All postmasters are to be investigated by the Congressional Committee on Expenditures in that department.

Buffalo officially executed a house cat who, it is said, is responsible for the spread of diphtheria in that city.

A reapportionment bill was introduced in the House which will give one member for every 211,867 inhabitants.

The trans-Pacific liner Asia ran aground near Shanghai, China, and is a wreck. The passengers were saved.

Former mayor of New York, G. B. McClellan, has accepted the chair of Public Affairs at Princeton University.

Mme. Sembrich, celebrated singer, was hurt while walking through the ruins of Pompeii. The accident is not serious.

Mrs. Sereno E. Payne, wife of the former Republican leader in the House of Representatives, died in Washington on Sunday.

Emperor Nicholas has conferred the Alexander Nevsky order upon Baron Rosen, the Russian Ambassador to the United States.

The Mexican Foreign Office have made a protest against the landing of British marines from the "Shearwater," two weeks ago.

Samuel Adams, of Chicago, will be appointed by President Taft to succeed First Assistant Secretary Pierce, of that department.

The Senate Republicans are in danger of a party split, the regulars and insurgents being deadlocked on the matter of committee assignments.

A Holstein-Friesian cow owned by E. H. Dollar, of Heuvelton, N. Y., in a 7-day test produced 590.7 pounds of milk and 37.87 pounds of butter.

By a vote of 105 to 30 the New York Assembly adopted the resolution advocating the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

Prof. Beers of Yale, has accepted the apology of the Navy Department for the slighting remarks made about his daughter by the authorities of the Naval Academy.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch, warned by the building inspector that it is carrying too much heavy machinery on the upper floors, has decided to erect a new building.

A resolution appropriating \$10,000 for plans for a monument in Washington to the signers of the Declaration of Independence has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Gallinger.

While the men of a battery of German artillery were asleep the horses bolted drawing the heavy guns over nine men, one of whom was killed and the other eight were seriously wounded.

Gov. Wilson of New Jersey will tour the West. He will pay special attention to Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, and Los Angeles, and will also stop off at Lincoln, Neb., to be the guest of William Jennings Bryan. The trip will occupy a good part of May.

Cardinal Gibbons, on behalf of the Catholics of the country, has joined in the protest against the United States accepting a silver service for the battleship Utah bearing the likeness of Brigham Young of the Mormon Church.

The Signal Corps of the District of Columbia National Guard has enlisted Anthony H. Jannus, an aviator, who will accompany the guard on its annual encampment in July and instruct members of the Signal Corps in air navigation.

Military rule went into effect in Muscatine, Iowa, on Monday, by order of Major George W. Ball, in charge of the State troops sent to preserve order during the local labor troubles. No

Word has been received from Bishop James W. Blashford, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, that the plague is now extinct in North China and has been almost entirely stamped out in Manchuria. Bishop Blashford is one of the general superintendents of the church in China, with residence at Peking, and he has just returned from a long trip through Western China, extending to the borders of Tibet.

The first installment of the work for the improvement of the port of London, under the act by which the Government took over all the great docks and vested them in the control of the port of London authority, is about to be taken in hand. The whole undertaking will occupy years, and is destined to place London on an equality with Liverpool, Southampton and other ports in respect to modern equipment.

The attorneys of Frank N. Hoffstot, the Pittsburgh banker and steel car manufacturer, charged with bribery and conspiracy in connection with the councilmanic "graft" cases, have filed petition in the Quarter Sessions Court asking that the District Attorney be compelled to file a bill of particulars, to permit him to prepare a proper defense. A rule was granted by Judge Marshall Brown, returnable next Saturday.

The United States National Bank of America, to be established in the District of Columbia with \$100,000,000 capital, is provided for in a bill introduced by Representative Fornes of New York. Shares of stock numbering 100,000 at \$1,000 each are proposed, three-fifths of which shall be purchased by the United States with the proceeds of \$60,000,000 worth of Government bonds and two-fifths by the National banks of the country.

The contract between the Government-owned Panama Railroad Company and its co-carriers, the Pacific Mail and California Atlantic Steamship in regard to freight rates from San Francisco to New York, via the Panama Railroad, due to expire Monday, has been continued by Secretary Dickinson until April 30. The delay in entering into a new contract is due to a desire by the Government that its action shall not cause a rate war between the Pacific co-carriers of the railroad and the American Hawaiian Steamship Company, a competitor.

Again Honorably Acquitted Secretary of the Navy Meyer announced Friday that Capt. Austin M. Knight, U. S. N., has for a second time been "fully and honorably acquitted" of responsibility for damage to the monitor Puritan during recent tests of high explosives on that vessel at Hampton Roads.
