

Senator Brown Ready with a Bill If the Constitutional Amendment Is Ratified by The States.

ANOTHER VIEW OF DIAZ

Shrewd and Graceful Action of Clemency To Two American Boys.

Not the least significant passage, by any means, in Mr. Bonsal's recent dispatches to the New York Times from Mexico City was that in which he told how gracefully and tactfully-which is the same thing as saying with how much of what may be called higher statesmanship-the old President exercised executive clemency in the case of two young Americans who had been captured while serving in the rebel

It was the father of one of them who made the plea, but Diaz had the best of rights, had he chosen to exercise it, to point out the enormity, from the Mexican Government's point of view, of the offense he was asked to pardon, and to justify by all the rules of interternational law the treatment of these "boys" with even greater severity than natives caught in open rebellion.

than natives caught in open rebellion. In other words, he had more than an excuse to refuse to interfere with the regular course of military procedure.

To have done so, however, would have been to neglect a magnificent opportunity, by a cheap and easy act of mercy, not only to win the heart of the anxious father, but to earn for his Administration something of the kindlier feeling from the general American pubfeeling from the general American public of which that Administration is just now in such desperate need. Diaz saw his chance and took it. He cut short the father's remarks about the general folly and waywardness of "boys" with a genial reference to his own early love of fighting and adventure, and he said that it was not for him to condemn as

an unpardonable fault a characteristic which had so notable marked himself.

As argument, this had its weak points, since there is a large difference between taking up arms for one's own country against a foreign invader and meddling in another's quarrel. As diplomacy, however, it was beyond criticism, since it proved conclusively to at least three Americans that the old dictator is not the monster of cruelty he has been painted, and to a good many million Americans it at least gave rea-

the name of the kind of stearin used.
Mixtures of lard with oleo stearin or other animal fat, or vegetable oil, or both, may be labeled "Lard Compound," but in such case the names of all the ingredients shall be shown upon the label as constituents of the mixture and in all cases the proportion of lard shall be equal to or greater than that

of the other combined ingredients.

In order that the purchaser may be properly informed as to the nature of the article bought, dealers must, in every instance, affix a label to the package giving the necessary information as to the true character of the article

All tins, trays, pails, tierces, or other containers of lard, lard compounds or lard substitutes, must be so marked as to clearly indicate the ingredients from

The names of the ingredients of a mixture sold as a compound, must all Such terms as "Second Quality of Lard," "Cheap Lard," etc., etc., must not be used if the article sold or offered for sale is a mixrure of lard with other





### CELERY GROWING.

Directions Given by Successful Culti-

vator of Vegetable In Pennsylvania. Last year's experience proves very forcefully that celery needs considerable moisture as well as to be well fertilized, says a Pennsylvania grower in

a letter to the American Agriculturist. Nearly all of our celery plants are started in small greenhouses, sowing the seed from the last of February to the latter part of March. Our soil is red shale loam, sand, fine siftings from coal ashes, muck and quite well rotted manure. The houses are cheap affairs, heated with stoves, and used for growing a few vegetable plants each spring. Seed of Golden Self Blanching celery is sown in benches, sometimes in rows three inches apart and sometimes broadcast. If we have good men to thin we like to broadcast. In sowing by this method we use a baking powder can with small holes in the cover. A small hand seeder is used for sowing in rows, but with the plow and coverer off, because we want to sift fine dirt very lightly to cover the seed, only about one-sixteenth of an inch.

Before sowing the soil is made very fine and level, because we do not want water to run from higher parts, and honemeal and wood ashes are used to fertilize this. We use 600 pounds of the former and about 300 of the latter for 1,800 square feet of glass. Calico heur knew how to turn that disorder curtains are used to shade these benches until the plants are up.

We generally try to plow our muck in the fall. In spring the land is well disked, then eight tons of 14 per cent dissolved South Carolina rock is applied to the three acres and well worked in. Then we sow muriate of potash at the rate of about 1,300 pounds an acre, after which we plank the ground for setting, weighting the planker enough to give us a sufficiently firm bed. We set by hand, using two fingers of one hand as dibber, being very careful not to get plants set too deep or so soil is over the heart. This would keep them from growing.

Rows are three feet apart where we expect to blanch with boards and two Then she was enabled to work undisand a half when it is to go into the turbed. celery house. Plants are set four or five inches apart in the rows. If the soil is too dry when we wish to set we have water poured along the rows in a little stream, being careful to follow the mark, made with a light wheelbarrow frame, along the side of a line.

After the plants are set we put on blood to the acre, running it right along the rows close to the plants. As soon as the plants are four inches high in the greenhouses we clip the tops and are sure to clip again before we set, taking about half of the tops off. Sometimes the plants are clipped three about 100 to the square foot of bed. They are often thicker.

As soon as the plants in the field get rooted a little we commence giving them nitrate of soda, putting it as close to the rows as possible or in reach of the roots and putting on only a very little while the plants are small, because we want it to feed them without shocking or giving them a setback. This nitrate of soda is given to them every ten days, adding to the amount each time as the plants grow, so we use about 1,300 pounds of this to the We use about two tons each of muriate of potash, dried blood and nitrate of soda on the three acres. That is why it is about 1,300 of each an acre.

We try to keep the soil stirred around the plants all the time, giving level culture, using a horse cultivator when the soil is dry enough so we do not need to mud shoe the horse.

After the celery has been set about two months it should be ready to blanch, sometimes before.

One Man Crosscut Saw.

It is often convenient to have a crosscut saw that one man can use for cutting medium sized logs. The one shown herewith, turned on its end,

fills the bill very well. It consists of a blade, a handle, set as shown, and a bow re-enforced with wire wound around it at various points. Preferably this bow should be of well seasoned hickory, ash or some other tough but not too heavy wood. It is not necessary to have very much spring in the bow, although some spring adds rigidity and tension to the saw, which can thus be run more easily. The most important
