

Most Anything At A Glance

With the thermometer flirting with zero and the ground covered with snow the Christmas shopping spree is in full progress. Individuals can be seen daily trimming their homes outside in the brisk freezing weather getting ready for that grand and holy occasion . . . Christmas. The town itself is decked out for blocks and most homes show some semblance of the season. For 52 weeks we have been reporting weddings, births, deaths, school news, meetings, fires, elections, Town Council affairs and meetings, etc. It is a steady grind and in a sense a pleasure. We do our utmost in behalf of the community and it is just taken for granted. We derive a sincere measure of deep satisfaction in serving the citizens of Emmitsburg and it is our pleasure once again to wish each and every one of you a Merry Christmas! Elsewhere in this issue you will read greetings from most business places who are appreciative of the privilege of serving you. We urge you to read them all.

Apparently efforts to retain our local public high school have reached a dead end. No real progress has been reported after numerous meetings and negotiations seem to have reached a stalemate. This is indeed sad news at this time of the year, or for any time as a matter of fact, but especially so at Christmas. It creates an air of sadness over the community as we are about to enter another year; a sadness which we feel is not rightfully ours, but imposed by elected officials. The selection of a site for the school in Thurmont is a poor one in our opinion. It is also costly and dangerous. Emmitsburg children going to the new school will be forced to negotiate that dangerous intersection of Route 15 and State Route 81 where there have been innumerable automobile accidents. We dread to think of the number of school buses that will have to go through that intersection during the coming years. Buses from both Thurmont and Emmitsburg will be coerced into using that road. The Commissioners and the Board of Education still have ample time to right a grievous wrong and settle half way between the two towns. This undoubtedly would meet with the approval of residents of the two towns concerned and everyone would be safe and happy. However, if the County Commissioners let the deal go through, and apparently they will, they will go down in local history as the Commissioners who dealt the lethal stab in the back to the Community and Citizens of Emmitsburg. A harsh but true statement.

An estimated six to seven hundred children are expected to turn out for the 34th annual Kiddies' Christmas Party to be held Saturday, Dec. 21. The affair is sponsored by the Emmitsburg Lions Club with the cooperation of the Town Council, local merchants and individuals.

General Chairman of the affair, Charles F. Stouter, reported this week his committee, with the cooperation of members of the Vigilant Hose Co., had boxed over 400 pounds of assorted candies and oranges.

The affair will get under way promptly at 11:00 a. m. Saturday morning when the first showing of a film will be given to the children free at the M-G Theater. Following the first show another will be given just as soon as the children have exited and those remaining are seated. President C.

Arthur Elder of the Lions Club announced there will be no meeting of the group next Monday in lieu of the Christmas Party Saturday.

Following the free movie the children will assemble at the Fire Hall where they will be treated to a hot lunch. Promptly at 2 p. m. Santa Claus will lead the big parade from the Doughboy in West End, to the Fire Hall, where the children will be proffered candy and oranges. The Emmitsburg Municipal Band, under the direction of Walter A. Simpson, will play the music for the parade and give a short concert while the distribution of candy is being made. Expected to be included in the parade are police cruisers and fire engines. All members of the Lions Club are asked to be present Saturday morning to help with the children both at the movie and the Fire Hall.

Soldier Is Freed On Manslaughter Charges In Hearing

A 28-year-old Ft. Ritchie soldier, charged on three counts of manslaughter, reckless driving and passing when the way ahead was not clear, was found guilty on the passing charge and fined \$35 and court costs by Magistrate Byron W. Thompson in a hearing in Frederick Magistrate's court this week.

The pleas of not guilty on the three charges of manslaughter and reckless driving were confessed by Robert S. Rothenhoefer, State's Attorney, on grounds of insufficient evidence.

The soldier, Robert Leonard Nichols, of Chatham, N. Y., stationed at Ft. Ritchie, was charged May 19 following a three-car accident on U. S. 15 at St. Anthony's in which three persons were killed.

The deceased were listed as Mark David Smith, 3; his mother, Mrs. Joyce Smith, 33, both of Rochester, N. Y., and Raymond E. Sheehan, of Lyons, N. Y., all passengers in a car being driven by Raymond Edward Smith, father and husband of two of the deceased.

Tfc. Neil F. Bechtel, said that Nichols was going south on U. S. 15 when he attempted to pass the Smith car. While making the pass, Nichols saw an oncoming car being driven by Aubrey Cleo Bodle, 49, of Mechanicsburg, Pa., and tried to get back in his lane of travel.

As he hit his brakes and tried to pull back behind the Smith car, Tfc. Bechtel said that Nichols' car hit the Smith car in the left bumper, causing the Smith car to cross the road and run headon into the Bodle car.

Mother Guillemin, Head Nun, Visits In Emmitsburg

The superior general of the Daughters of Charity of Saint Vincent dePaul, Most Honored Mother Suzanne Guillemin, was welcomed by faculty and students of Saint Joseph College, at an academic convocation during her visit to the Provincial House and College here this week.

In deference to Mother Guillemin's French origin, the convocation program was presented entirely in French by the students. The Very Reverend Charles O'Connor, C.M., spiritual director of the Daughters of Charity here, gave the invocation. Miss Aileen Borst, senior, whose parents reside in Frankfurt, Germany, welcomed Mother Guillemin, remarking that her visit was a cause for rejoicing which coincided with the spirit of the liturgical season.

Miss Catherine Kochanski, senior from Baltimore, gave an historical account of the college, noting particularly the French names designating various buildings on campus. Miss Kathleen Trollo, senior of Brandy Station, Va., and Miss Mary Ann Leonard, senior of Utica, N. Y., president and vice president respectively of the Children of Mary, presented a spiritual bouquet and a bouquet of flowers. The Cecilian Society closed their choral offering with "The Marseillaise."

Mother Guillemin was elected superior general of the Daughters of Charity in 1962, and is presently on tour of the institutions throughout the world which are conducted by the members of her order. Her official tour of the houses in the Western Province began in early December following the installation of a new superior of the Japanese Province. She arrived in Washington, D. C., on December 11 for her visitation and met the sisters of the Provincial House and Saint Joseph College here this week. She was accompanied on her official tour by Sister Mary Basil, an alumna of Saint Joseph College, assigned to the mother house in Paris.

Mounties Click; Take Two Games During Week

The Mount St. Mary's College dribblers appeared to be establishing a winning pace this week as they bowled over two strong opponents in court action, both here and away. Jim Phelan's crew had little difficulty mastering Catholic University last Friday in Washington by a 78-71 score.

It was the third straight win for the Mountaineers to lift their overall record to 4-2. For Catholic, losers by narrow margins to such powerhouses as Providence and Seton Hall, it was the third reverse in six starts.

Catholic set the pace early in the game but midway in the first half Mike Costello sent the Mount to the front 17-16 with a goal. Near the close of the half Catholic sputtered to hold a 34-32 advantage at half time.

The Mount opened the second half with seven straight points and led the remainder of the game.

Mike Costello and Mike Lyons treated the fans to a brilliant bit of outside shooting and accounted for 18 and 16 points. Lou Martine accounted for 18 points, most coming on shorter tosses.

Mike Fessler, a Freshman, and Charley Boylan netted 21 and 20 for the Cardinals.

The Mountaineers swished 33 of their 51 shots from the field while Catholic made good on but 27 of 60. The Crusaders held a wide margin on rebounding 37-16.

Coming back strong, Phelan's hoopsters clobbered helpless Roanoke College on the local floor by a lop-sided margin of 92-74, Monday night.

The victory was the fourth straight for the fast-moving Mountaineers and upped their overall record to 5-2. They are 3-1 in M-D play.

Roanoke, sparked by Steve Baker and Morris Cregger, pushed the Virginians into a 10-point lead midway in the first half but the Mount rallied to go ahead at half time by one point.

The visitors scored the opening basket in the second half and that was the last time they led as the Mount began to click and forged an 11-point advantage after about seven minutes. The Maroons made one last rally to cut the Mount margin to four points but in the last 10 minutes it was all Mount as Coach Phelan's outfit finished strong to win handily.

Mike Costello put up a fine all-around game for the winners and wound up with 21 points. Mike Johnson and Bernie Haag turned in brilliant relief jobs for the Mount when several starters ran Mount when several starters ran.

The Mountaineers will be idle until Friday and Saturday. December 27 and 28, when they will take part in the Battleford Tournament on the Gettysburg College floor with Westminster, American University and the host Gettysburg College Bullets. They will meet Westminster in the opening game Friday at 7:30 p. m.

Coach Phelan will resume practice for his squad on Sunday and twice on Monday after which the members will have a brief holiday, returning for practice Christmas night as well as on December 26 to prepare for the tourney.

Little Progress Reported In School Negotiations

A delegation of interested local citizens was politely received at a meeting with the Frederick County Commissioners held in Frederick Tuesday morning. The delegation sought the help of the Commissioners in opposing the selection of the Staub site in Thurmont for a new consolidated public high school which ultimately would take the public high school out of Emmitsburg. At a recent public meeting held in the local Town Office residents threatened a court injunction to stop the School Board from obtaining an option on the Staub ground but to date no such injunction has been sought.

A. Irvin Renn, president of the Commissioners, told the group that the Board of Commissioners has no authority to tell the School Board where to locate a school, however, he promised that if the Board of Education rescinded its previous action and asked for money to buy another site the Commissioners would give a decision on the request.

The Jamison-Wivell site was selected by a joint committee from the towns and the original choice by the Board of Education. When the School Board asked for funds to purchase that site, however, the request was rejected.

The Commissioners emphasized Tuesday that the site itself was not turned down; they merely felt the price of the land was too high. Commissioner Lawrence A. Dorsey said all the Commissioners were interested in was having the Board of Education negotiate to get the price down. He said they never received any correspondence regarding this site. The next thing received was a request for funds to purchase the Staub site, Mr. Dorsey continued.

It was noted then that the Commissioners asked for an alternate site or sites with prices but the Board of Education later informed them there was no alternate site that met with approval of the School Board. In order to avoid further delay of the school, the

Commissioners said they approved the Staub site request since it was apparent they were not going to receive another choice despite their order to the School Board to furnish one.

The Jamison-Wivell site request was for \$37,000. The Staub site will cost \$30,000 for 40 acres.

Mr. Renn pointed out that they requested the School Board to "select and price an alternate site between the two towns. We couldn't make it any clearer, could we?" he asked.

Mrs. Glenn Gillespie asked Mr. Renn for his personal opinion of the Jamison-Wivell site. "I see nothing wrong with the site," he replied.

Mrs. Jane Bollinger asked if they had ever visited or considered the Harry Prongas site along the Old Frederick Road. This land is offered at just \$250 an acre, she said.

Emmitsburg Mayor Ralph F. Irelan noted that a proposed new highway is due to come near that property too. Mr. Dorsey said that school officials have said they want to keep the school along Route 15 because it does not have the snow drifting problem that Old Frederick Road has. The school officials also contend the site is away from the center of the population between the two towns.

Mr. Dorsey said he is particularly interested in getting a high school in the northern end of the county which has a curriculum equivalent to others in the county.

Mrs. Bollinger said that Emmitsburg already has a good academic course and that the main concern is acquiring a secretarial course to take care of the children who are not planning to attend college.

She said Emmitsburg is always left out. She said a member from Emmitsburg on the Board of Education might be a good thing to protect the interests of that town.

Writes . . .

Babson Discusses Investments For A Young Couple

BABSON PARK, Mass., Dec. 19—In a recent column, I outlined four divisions of study for youngsters at home on vacation from college and considering the "electives" for their next term. There were English, Science, Physical Health, and Religion (or Faith). That column should be carefully retained for future reference.



This week, I wish to mention ten "investments" which a young couple who have finished high school, and perhaps college, should acquire:

- (1) A FAMILY. Whether or not you get married is none of my business. If, however, you are married, your first investment should be a family. The cheapest and best time to begin this is when you are young.
- (2) YOUR HOME. At the same time, it is important to locate your home in the right state. True, every one of our fifty states has its advantages and disadvantages; but it is most important that a young couple settle in a state suitable in climate, business opportunities, and probable growth. I cannot help individuals through correspondence; but this matter should be your main study, covering several months, before you definitely settle anywhere. Perhaps the Chamber of Commerce where you now live will help you with this. Personally, I like a comparatively small city showing considerable growth now.
- (3) LIFE INSURANCE. After starting a family and getting located, you should take out life insurance. Take it out when you are young, for several reasons—you can get a low premium, and you need it most then. I think a twenty-year straight life policy is probably the best for you. Premiums would naturally be payable for twenty years, but with no more payments necessary after that. On the other hand, if you should die soon after the policy is taken out, your beneficiaries would receive payment in full. Later, you may want to change from straight twenty-year life to an endowment or some other fancy policy; but not for your first one.
- (4) FURTHER TRAINING. By this time, you and your wife should have decided what you are best fitted for—whether it is a clerk, an engineer, or a salesman. Or, you may be best fitted for agriculture. Once you have decided, get all the training you can in that field.
- (5) EDUCATION OF CHILDREN. I believe in savings bank accounts; every family should deposit at least 5% of their income in the savings bank for the education of their children. If you start when the children are young, it is surprising how savings accounts will grow with only a small but regular deposit. Once when I asked Thomas A. Edison who was the greatest inventor, he replied: "The man who invented Compound Interest was no slouch."
- (6) CHURCH AFFILIATION. The young couple who is trying to get along without active participation in some church is making a great mistake. I am not appealing for any special denomination; but the denomination in which you were brought

up probably has a church near you. Be not content merely to attend it, but take an active part in its welfare, and have your children attend its Sunday School.

(7) CHILD DEVELOPMENT. Carefully watch your children develop. Do not try to make them follow some line that you and your wife want them to follow. Probably each child has inherited some trait from some ancestor. Although they may be entirely different in the traits they have inherited.

(8) EARLY COMPANIONS. You can "select" your children's playmates and friends as they grow up. This is something which is very important and should be carefully studied and watched.

(9) HOME INFLUENCE. Instead of letting your children go out to too many parties in other homes, encourage them to have parties in their own home where you can largely determine who should be invited. But do not be too rigid about it.

(10) GUIDANCE. Experience teaches me that money spent guiding your children will be well invested; but this must be

done very carefully without trying to force them into any definite social group or any line of endeavor. In short, your most important investment will


be the TIME and THOUGHT given to your children . . . and NOT MONEY! Your children's love or interest or friendships cannot be bought.



Railroads Extend Hay Rate Reduction

Participating rail lines in the Official (Eastern) Territory have extended the expiration date of drought emergency hay freight

rate reductions to April 30, 1964. These reductions—amounting to 25 per cent—were granted to 20 Maryland counties several months ago in the face of recent drought conditions. This deadline for rate reductions had originally been set for December 12, 1963. This time extension should

create a more orderly trading atmosphere, according to John Crothers, Maryland State Department of Markets. Buying and shipping may now be spread over the winter months as needed, thus relieving pressures of immediate concentrated demands which drive prices higher. Such action will also tend to alleviate the freight car shortage problem.

Procedures for qualifying for the drought emergency hay rate reduction remain unchanged. Prospective hay purchasers should consult their county ASCS offices concerning proper forms and procedures before making commitments under this tariff, advises Crothers. Basically, the purchaser must request and receive a certificate of entitlement. He must also have the shipper include a statement on the shipping order and bill of lading reducing the railroad's liability by the same percentage as the freight rate reduction. Hay shipments must originate from permitted points and terminate in one of Maryland's twenty drought disaster counties.

"For his own protection, the prudent buyer will insist upon the right to inspect hay before pay-

ing for it," says Mr. Crothers. This should be assured by prior agreement with the seller and should be put in writing. The terms "Allow Inspection" or "Inspection Allowed" shown on the freight bill, bill of lading, and turn-over order, permit a sample of the contents to be taken from a car before paying the freight bill or draft. This "sample for inspection" may be as much of the car contents as the buyer wants to see, as long as the hay is not removed from the team tract.

HOUSING AUTHORITY GRANTED \$24,000

Congressman Carlton R. Sickles, (D-Md.) announced today that the Housing Authority of Frederick, will receive a \$24,000 loan to begin planning on a program of 200 new low-rent homes.

Cong. Sickles noted that 100 of the 200 homes under the loan, approved by the Public Housing Administration, are scheduled to be designed and built for elderly persons.

Wheat Legislation Sought By Farmers

"Unless wheat legislation is adopted by Congress, the adminis-

tration will be forced to hold another wheat referendum in the election years 1954," Noah E. Kefauver, Jr., President of Maryland Farm Bureau, said this week. "In view of the wheat referendum

defeat last May it would seem unlikely that the Washington planners would relish the prospects of another campaign in 1964 to sell a government supply-management program to wheat producers."

Kefauver speaking before delegates attending the American Farm Bureau resolutions committee pointed out that the USDA's National Agricultural Advisory Committee in a recent survey of farm leaders found that a majority believed a high price support, strict control program would be voted down by wheat farmers.

"If we are to have a sound and workable program for wheat, there must be a concerted effort by farmers to get Congress to act."

"I am sure we will redouble our efforts to achieve our goal of broader markets, more freedom, and greater prosperity for the American farmer," Kefauver concluded.

Some 6,000 delegates from 49 states and Puerto Rico, Alaska is not yet organized, discussed and evaluated problems in their economy during the National convention held in Chicago this week.

Final action on Farm Bureau's program came Thursday when stated elected delegates gave final O.K. to the wording of the 1964 Farm Bureau program.





A Most Precious Sense
By Dr. Alden N. Haffner
Executive Director
Vision Conservation Institute

The more a mother knows about
her baby's eyes and vision, the
more fascinating it will be to
watch baby grow and develop.

Baby specialists frequently have
pointed out that vision can actual-
ly be the key to a fuller under-
standing of baby needs.

A mother looks into her baby's
eyes to see whether he is hap-
py, whether he is angry, whether
he is puzzled or whether he is
willing to cooperate. If a child is

not feeling well, it first becomes
evident in his eyes.

Vision is baby's most precious
sense. Through his eyes he gath-
ers more information about things
around him than in any other
way. Baby depends more on his
vision than on his hearing, taste,
smell and touch combined.

Consequently, how well your
baby sees may also determine how
he will grow and how he will de-
velop. Indeed, vision may affect
a child's body posture as well as
his personality.

For example, when a child does
not see properly with both eyes
working together as one, he may
soon begin tilting his head or he
will squirm into an unnatural po-
sure as he avoids using one eye
while looking at a toy or a pic-
ture book. The danger in such a
situation is that he may develop
a head tilt, or a shoulder slump
or even a curved spine, in addi-
tion to having poor vision.

If a child is too nearsighted, he
may have no interest in playing
games with other children. If he
is too farsighted, he may avoid
close activity such as reading and
writing. If he's cross-eyed he may
have difficulty in focusing his eyes
properly. An eye that has been
turned too long may even lose
some of its vision. These are some
of the eye problems parents should
be alert for as they watch their
child grow. They can affect a





GI Insurance Dividend Coming

In response to President Johnson's directive for the earliest possible payment of the \$234 million GI insurance dividend for 1964, the VA this week said the first checks would reach veterans by January 2, 1964.

In reporting this, F. E. Quinn, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Balti-

more, said payments to all of the 4,725,000 veterans participating in the dividend would be completed in record time—by January 25.

The President, on December 8, ordered the accelerated payments as a stimulant to the economy.

In the first speed payment of a dividend, ordered by President Kennedy in 1961, payments were completed by March 17. The stepped up payment of the 1963 dividend was completed last January 31. The VA plan to issue

the 1964 dividend checks by next January 25 will cut a week from the previous record processing time of 31 days in 1963.

The dividend payments in 1962, and in the years prior to 1961, were made throughout the entire year on the anniversary dates of the individual insurance policies.

Of the total distribution of \$234 million, \$15 million will go to about 225,000 World War I veterans holding U. S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI) policies. The remaining \$219 million will go to 4,500,000 World War II veterans who hold National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policies, Mr. Quinn said.

It is estimated that 88,829 veterans in the State of Maryland will receive dividends amounting to \$4,400,400.

Korean Conflict veterans hold non-participating policies that do not provide regular annual dividend payments.

The regular dividends are primarily a return to the policyholders of part of their premium payments since the death rate among GI policyholders continues to be lower than the rate upon which the payments were established by

law. Mr. Quinn reminded policyholders that the preparing and mailing of dividend payments are automatic and require no correspondence from veterans or their families. In fact, such correspondence might delay the dividend distribution process, he said.

Mount Announces Additional Grants

Rt. Rev. Robert R. Kline, Ph.D., president of Mt. St. Mary's College, announces the college will share in this year's program of unrestricted grants from the Esso Education Foundation.

unrestricted grants is essentially the same as the year before. Heretofore unrestricted grants were made in the amounts of \$2,000, \$3,500 and \$5,000. This year they are \$3,000, \$5,000 and \$7,500. The Mount grant was for the minimum of \$3,000 for the 1963-64 academic year.


