Most Anything At A Glance

The new highways they are building these days are really safe and serviceable but little consideration is being given to muffle the sound of modern day traffic. As the trucks and cars get bigger the crescendo of traffic noise multiplies yet our road experts have done little research to remedy the condition. Residents of the Washington area where a new beltway has recently been installed, have complained to their legislators of the perpetual noise day and night and some of these solons have gone to bat for the cause. They suggest planting more trees to absorb some of the sound, redesigning treads on car and truck tires, some new type of road service, etc. Sounds like a good idea, one which should be explored.

The continued drought is being felt along the entire eastern seaboard. Our own local supplies appear adequate at the present but should the drought continue into the winter months we could be in for some trouble or deprivations. At least three hurricanes have bypassed us or disintegrated almost at our doorstep but little if any rain fell in this area. We don't want any part of a hurricane except possibly a fringe rain area which we need badly. It is apparent that more and more farmers here will have to turn to irrigation methods as we continue into the third dry year. Quite a few farms have been sold within the county limits because farmers and dairymen could not stand the financial loss precipitated by the extreme dryness.

It was announced that the group had received official confirmation that the committee had been sanctioned and approved by the Frederick County Democratic Central Committee and that it would be the recognized bargaining committee here.

Punt, Pass, Kick Contest Scheduled; Rehearsals Soon

Emmitsburg area grade and junior high school boys from eight through 13 can pit their football skills against thousands of other boys throughout the nation in the fourth annual Punt, Pass & Kick competition which will culminate with a trip to Washington, D. C., and to an appearance at a National Football League championship game for the top 12 winners. Francis X. Ligorano, Student Union Director, Mt. St. Mary's and former football luminary, will direct the contest.

Sponsored nationally by the Ford Dealers of America and the National Football League, the Punt, Pass & Kick competition—or PP&K—will be staged in Emmitsburg by Sperry Ford Sales with the Emmitsburg Lions Club as local co-sponsor.

Emmitsburg boys will be tested for their ability to punt, pass and place-kick on the same day as thousands of other boys all over the country. For 8-, 9- and 10-year-olds, warm-up jackets, place-kicker outfit and autographed footballs will be given as first, second and third prizes for each age group. Boys 11, 12 and 13 will receive gold, silver and bronze trophies. There will be 18 prizes in all. Scores throughout the country then will be compared to determine the six top winners in each of the 362 Ford zones—a total of 2,172 zone winners.

Zone winners will meet in 37 Ford District competitions at which 222 District champions will win trophies. The 222 runners-up also will receive trophies. From these District champions, the best 168 scores will be selected, 12 to represent each of the 14 NFL game areas, and declared Area winners.

Area winners, their fathers and mothers will attend a National Football League game in their area to compete for Division championships—the six top eastern NFL division winners and the six top western division winners. These 12 finalists, accompanied by their parents, will go on a "Tour of Champions" to Washington, D. C. They then will travel to the site of an NFL championship game, for half-time competition to determine the six National PP&K champions.

John S. Hollinger, Sales Manager of Sperry Ford Sales, pointed out that the competition involves no body contact, there is no charge for entering and no special equipment is needed. "Registration is now open through October 9," he said, "with Sperry Ford Sales as registration headquarters."

Mr. Hollinger said entrants will be judged on distance and accuracy of their punting, passing and kicking. Points will be awarded for each foot of distance the ball travels on the fly, and points will be subtracted for each foot the ball lands to the right or left of a center line. The Emmitsburg competition will be held at Community Field on Sunday, Oct. 11. Practices will be held on Saturday afternoons, director Ligorano stated.

Initiate Church School Here; Starts Wednesday

Wednesday, September 30, will mark the beginning of a new agency for teaching religion in Emmitsburg. It is the Weekday Church School, which will meet once each week, for 30 weeks, from 4 to 5 p.m., Wednesday afternoons in the Parish House of the Lutheran Church. The pupils will come immediately following the public school dismissal. Adult supervision will be provided for the younger children in walking from the public school to the church.

The Weekday Church School is for all pupils in grades 1 through 6. Pastor Ronald Fearer is serving as director of the School, and the teaching staff will be composed of the four Protestant ministers of the Emmitsburg area. The school is a cooperative effort by the Protestant Churches, just as the annual Vacation Church School each summer.

Grades 1 and 2 will study a course entitled, "Boys and Girls of the Bible." Pastor Fearer will lead this group.

Grades 3 and 4 will study major personalities of the Bible, such as Abraham, Moses, David, Nehemiah, Jesus, Peter, Paul and others. This course is called "Chosen To Serve," and will be led by Pastors Martin Case and William Hendricks.

Grades 5 and 6 will learn about the mighty acts of God in the Old Testament. Pastor John Chatlos will lead this class in the course entitled, "God's Way In The Old Testament."

The School will end promptly each Wednesday at 5 p.m., and a bus will be available to take those children home who need this service.

The Protestant Church feels that there are four basic educational Church agencies for teaching religion to children: Sunday Church School, Vacation Church School, Camping and Weekday Church School. The Churches of Emmitsburg are now providing the maximum opportunity in religious education for its children, with the addition of the Weekday Church School program.

Pre-registration is now being conducted in the various churches, and in the public school. All children from grades 1 through 6 are invited. The school is free to all children and there will be no offering. The textbooks and workbooks will be provided by the co-operating churches.

Thurmont Grange Community Show Friday, Saturday

The Thurmont Grange and Future Farmers of America Community Show will be held at the Thurmont High School September 25 and 26, at which time approximately \$500 in prize money will be given away. There are twenty departments in which there will be exhibits: fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, canned fruits, canned vegetables, jellies and preserves, pickles, baked products, handwork, crocheting, needlework, sewing, embroidery, knitting, flowers, corn, small grains and seeds, hay, nuts, poultry, eggs, antiques, commercial, home products display, and miscellaneous.

Only exhibits grown by the exhibitor will be eligible for a prize, and exhibits and antiques out of the community will not be eligible for judging.

Judging will take place on Friday from 1 to 5 p.m. There will also be two \$10 awards for the best ten ears of corn, given by the DeKalb and Pioneer Seed Corn companies.

The judges will be Mr. and Mrs. Howard Smith, Buckeystown; Mr. and Mrs. Harold E. Reilly, Woodsboro, and Mrs. Rita Remavege, Emmitsburg. The show opens to the public on Friday, Sept. 25 at 6:30 p.m. At 8 p.m., a variety program will be presented in the high school auditorium.

A special feature this year will be the introduction of representatives from all the 4-H Clubs in Frederick County. David Eigenbrode, 4-H Extension Agent for Frederick County, will make these introductions. Highlighting the entertainment will be the presentation of the FFA Chapter Sweetheart and Community Farm Queen. Mylo S. Downey, director of 4-H Club work for the Federal Extension Service, Washington, D. C., will present the candidates and announce the chosen one. Door prizes will be awarded following the program. The Sweetheart Ball from 9 until 11:30 p.m. with a dance, will be held in the school cafeteria. Music will be furnished by records. Master of ceremonies at the dance will be Ralph Lockwood, from Radio Station WSBA, York. Prizes will be awarded and the new FFA Sweetheart will reign over the festivities.

On Saturday, September 26, the show will be open to the public from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. A pet show will be held at 1 p.m. on the blacktop back of the school. At 2 p.m., a bike rodeo will also be held on the blacktop back of the school. In the evening from 4 to 8 the Thurmont High School PTA will serve a turkey and ham supper in the school cafeteria.

Music will be furnished nightly on the electric organ. A silver offering will be accepted nightly at the show. Door prizes will be drawn Saturday night at 9:30. Exhibits may be claimed after 10 p.m. Saturday.

Dick Florence Promoted By Co.

Republicans Thwart Local Registration

Despite efforts to block a "field" registration here, approximately 150 citizens took the opportunity to register in Frederick to be eligible to vote in the November Presidential election.

An explanation of the successful blocking of the local registration was given at a general meeting of the Emmitsburg Democratic Central Committee held on Tuesday, Sept. 22.

On Wednesday, Sept. 16, a committee went to Frederick to the board of Election Supervisors to see about the possibility of a field registration in the Emmitsburg District. After an explanation and reasons for this request, it was refused on the grounds that since the Republicans had not asked for a field registration, why should the Democrats be granted this favor. The question was asked, "Are you not going to try and help us?" and the reply was "no."

We asked for the president of the board but he was not in the office at the time. The committee then contacted the governor's office for advice and guidance. The following day, Mr. Horon Peace, Supervisor of Election, was given the green light to proceed with registration by the governor and attorney general, who took into consideration the ten-day requirement and gave the opinion that such procedure was within the framework of the law.

The attorney for the board agreed with the opinion from the attorney general's office. Plans went ahead for registration. Following the announcement in last Friday's Emmitsburg Chronicle that a registration would be held in the fire hall, disgruntled local Democrats and Republicans began an effort to thwart the registration. When it was learned that a threat of a court injunction was under way the local Democratic Central Committee went to work.

On Sat., Sept. 19, the attorney for the election board advised the Democratic Central Committee in Emmitsburg despite his opinion and that of the attorney general, that an injunction was pending. Congressman Charles Mathias, learning his name had become involved, made it plain that he had no thought of such a plan, and later gave assurance that the threat of an injunction was off. Mr. Peace advised the local committee to proceed for a local registration in Emmitsburg.

Sunday afternoon, Sept. 20, in view of what had transpired, the local Republican Chief Judge was contacted to see if all was in readiness for Monday's registrations, and much to the surprise of the committee, he stated he would contest every citizen's vote on Nov. 3 who registered on Monday, Sept. 21. In view of this new development and challenge, the Democratic committee again contacted Mr. Peace and the attorney for the board. Both gentlemen agreed the best solution would be for the Board to provide transportation for all to and from Frederick. This procedure would in no way jeopardize the 1600 voters already registered.

Previous to Sept. 16, numerous letters from local citizens had been mailed to the supervisor's office in Frederick, asking him to consider giving Emmitsburg a day or part of a day for registration. Further it should be known that the County Commissioners had some weeks previously provided the money for a local registration.

Babson Discusses Health And Business
 BABSON PARK, Mass., Sept. 21 — Our business editors and columnists dig into just about every political, industrial, commercial, and financial influence on our economy. Now and again I am struck by the fact that they seldom take into consideration how much business — especially individual companies — can be affected by the health of the executives at the helm.

Corporation Men And Health
 For a half-century I have been making a detailed study of company earnings. On a great many occasions I have found that failing health on the part of a key executive has been responsible for declining business. This shows up most clearly when one firm in a field that is booming is unable to buck the competition and chalk up satisfactory profits.

An executive, for instance, may be at his desk every day and put in his full total of hours; he may attend conscientiously to his mail, his telephoning, his meetings. The difficulty may be that he is not really well enough to make that important extra effort that goes into the making of a top-notch official. He may not have the special zest to extend his lines and his territories sufficiently to hold his company at the top of the heap.

What Ails Such Businessmen?
 The reason why such conditions are seldom diagnosed is that illness is often thought of in terms of heart trouble, high blood pressure, chronic ulcers, viruses, etc. What I have come upon in my studies has usually been stress and strain caused by worry—a condition that often only a trained specialist would suspect. Men who seem to be doing their important jobs faithfully are seldom thought of as "trouble spots".

Look, however, at the stocks listed on the Big Board today and you will see that certain issues—in lines even that are breaking through all-time highs—are crab-walking sideways, with no pep. I wonder what would be found by doctors who examined the head-men of some of these firms? There may well come a day, I predict, when company directors will distribute to their stockholders annual health reports on all their key men, along with their financial audits. This could result in some of the "sleeper" companies climbing upward again.

Two Kinds Of Figures Important
 Studying figures has been one of my most important occupations. I learned long ago, however, that the "human figures" have got to be in condition if the "mathematical figures" are going to please stockholders. The businessman who is going at top speed every waking moment in the business day keeping up his social or business commitments during the evening; and living on headache pills, pep pills, and sleeping pills is not going to keep a jump ahead of his competitors for very long. I am convinced that there will come a day when top corpora-

tion men will be retired and pensioned strictly in accordance with their physical condition rather than with their age. Some people, of course, have far more vitality than others and can stand the modern "rat race" for longer periods of time. The real solution to the problem is avoiding unnecessary worry and pressures, cutting out useless or repetitious work, streamlining unwieldy or inefficient departments, and delegating jobs that could just as well be handled by competent assistants.

Spiritual Reserves Essential
 Remember, too, that not even physical or financial reserves are worth anything unless they are accompanied by genuine reserves of the spirit. I have pointed out before that Jesus was called "The Great Physician" because He constantly taught that stress and worry are futile, that men must not be overanxious for material things. It is significant that there is actually not a great deal written in the Bible about sickness. Few stories about the followers of Jesus indicate that they died of illness; those who were not martyred lived apparently to an extremely old age. Surely a spiritual rebirth would be the

answer for most of us to the strains that beset us in these difficult tension-ridden days.



Inconsistent Decision

Some 14 years ago the Congress thought it was setting up a law which would halt the Communist conspiracy in the nation. The law ordered the Communist Party to register, report its finances and label its publications. All of its front organizations were to be compelled to do the same. Failure to register under this Internal Security Act of 1950 would subject the Party to penalties so still it seemed doomed either to show its true color or go underground.

The Party has beaten the rap. With the help of the U. S. Supreme Court and despite the Justice Department, the Communists will not have to register. The Court upheld the constitutionality of the law in 1961, all right. But on June 8, the Court, viewing the Fifth Amendment broadly, declared that registering would not be possible without causing some individual to incriminate himself by that very action. In other words, there is no way to enforce the law. The highest court in the land has thus given U. S. Communists, native and infiltrated, the high sign to proceed with their nefarious shenanigans.

Commendable Editorial
 The Memphis Commercial Ap-

peal the next day commented editorially on this outrage: "It is well known that the Communist Party, U.S.A., is an agency of the international Communist Party and therefore dedicated to the overthrow of the United States Government. It is funded by the Kremlin and exists not as a legitimate political party but as a base for subversion and propaganda."

"Nonetheless, the Supreme Court of the United States has let stand an Appeals Court ruling that upsets the Communist Party's conviction for failing to register with the Government as the agent of a foreign power. The basis for the Appeals Court reversal was that under the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution no one could be compelled to incriminate himself."

"The Supreme Court's refusal to reconsider that decision, as requested by the Justice Department, leaves the door open to continued subversive activity in this country by the Communist Party. It is a hearty invitation to Moscow to step up such infiltration. It means that Communist fronts now have no fear of Government pressure against their work in behalf of the Communist Party. The Enemy Within"

"The Constitution was designed to protect Americans, not foreign agents whose aims are the collapse and overthrow of the United States Government. Yet the high court has managed of late to read the Constitution so literally that its protection cover is freely granted to the enemy within. The Supreme Court's solecisms have become the language of government, through usage, despite efforts of Congress and the Justice Department to provide legal means for attacking communism in

America.
 "Hopefully, the Justice Department will try again, and refuse to rest until the court has a change of heart."

The shock and amazement of the American people could hardly have been expressed better than in the above editorial. After 14 years of legal maneuvering, the Communists have evaded the express purpose of Congress, outwitted the Justice Department and are now free to do what no clear-thinking American wants them to do—all with the help of the highest court in the land.

Strange Inconsistency
 The Supreme Court later struck down another provision of the law, that which refused passports to Communist Party members. Meanwhile, the Department of State arranged an agreement with the Soviet Union that provides consular exchanges. We thus may expect a new wave of spies and subversives in major cities of the land. In all likelihood, this will provide new direction and liaison for the activities of American communists. We are actually doing what we do not intend to do: making it easy for Communist activity to grow and prosper in the U. S.

The Communist Party thus continues to work unobstructed throughout the country, publishing and distributing its propaganda and placing its speakers in colleges and universities at an increasing rate. If we are concerned about Communism enough to fight it as we do in South Vietnam, why will we not fight it at home? Communism in the U. S. is a far greater threat to our security and well-being than Communism in Southeast Asia. Yet we fight it there with the lives of our soldiers

and the expenditure of more than \$1 million per day. At home, we allow the Supreme Court to shield the Party.
