Stalled Production "The wages have been what we in the hills call 'reasonable' but certainly not high by any standard. A small stove mill will make jobs for from 20 to 30 hill people, most of whom do a little farming on the side.

Feeding Inflation One of the dangers of such programs is their spread of "printing press" or "deficit" money. The stove mill money was genuine because it was paid to people who had produced new wealth—by processing a raw material into a product somebody would buy.

Instead of throttling production, and raising taxes, and rigidly manipulating all of the normally dynamic forces in our market economy, the Government's sourest role, in good times or bad, is to keep vital the incentives in the private enterprise system, so that it will continue to expand the production of new wealth, create the new jobs for our expanding population, and increase genuine purchasing power.

Those big steelhead and salmon rivers of the Pacific Northwest call for special boats, called drift boats.

There are all kinds of variations and at least two distinct types: the McKenzie River boats and the Rogue River boats. The McKenzie is a faster river than the Rogue, and the McKenzie boats carry two men—a fisherman and a guide.

Rogue River boats carry more beam on the bottom and usually drift with two fishermen and a guide—three and a guide in a pinch. They float downstream with the bow first, and the fishermen face the baits from a comfortable forward seat.

What makes this drifting so unique is that, unlike the situation on other float trips, in which the anglers cast to likely spots, the drift boat, controlled by the oarsman, in effect does the fishing.

ON THE LAWN

With Larry Lawrence

It used to be that a TV comedian could raise a laugh merely by using the word crabgrass. But last year I hardly heard a crabgrass gag all summer. Which

merely proves, I suppose, that jokes wear out a lot faster than weeds.

It is also true that the average home-owner is no longer as baffled about crabgrass as he used to be. For one thing he has learned that it is an annual and that

last year's dead plants can be ignored. He has also heard tell, even if he hasn't experienced it yet himself, that it is easier to prevent crabgrass from coming up than it is to eradicate it when grown. Indeed, that polysyllabic mouthful "pre-emergence control" seems to be passing into every day language along with such space age tongue twisters as solid-state circuitry and acrylic polyester.

Today, the important thing to remember is that many crabgrass controls cannot be used if you also plan to seed. If you have planted any new grass or expect to do so, be sure to get a compatible control such as Halts, which is put out by Scotts, or Halts Plus which is the same thing but with a full feeding of fertilizer included.

opportunity will not come until October 1967.

The original deadline for signing up for voluntary medical insurance was March 31. Nationally, about 90 per cent of the 19.1 million people eligible for medicare had already signed up for medical insurance by March 31, but there were a little more than 1 million who had not made a decision on medicare. The deadline was extended to May 31 to give these people time to sign up if they want medical insurance, and to give those who had said "no" to medicare a chance to reconsider.

Many of the people who have not enrolled for medical insurance are still working. They may think they must retire before they can apply for health insurance. Others may have failed to act in the belief that they must have been employed in work covered by social security to qualify for health insurance. Medicare benefits are payable for persons 65 or over whether or not they have ever worked under social security and whether retired or still working.

Men and women now reaching 65 have 3 months before the month of their birthday and 3 months after that month to enroll. King urged enrollment in the three months before age 65, however, to insure that medical insurance protection starts with the month in which age 65 is reached.

He said that the social security district office is open daily except Saturday, from 8:45 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., to help people who want information about signing up for health insurance. The office is also open from 8:30 to 12:30 on Saturday for people who are unable to call during the regular daily hours.

That it has determined it necessary and proper to acquire for the purposes referred to in said Petition, and in connection with the construction and maintenance of the highway system of the State, certain tracts or parcels of land situate in the Third Election District of Frederick County, consisting of 17.80 acres, more or less, lying between the lines marked "Right of Way Line" as shown on Plat No. 33509, which is being taken in fee simple, and also all that property outside said lines, outlined by shading as shown and/or indicated on Plat No. 33510 consisting of 6.96 acres, more or less, which is being taken in fee simple.

TOGETHER with the buildings and improvements thereon and the rights, alleys, ways, waters, roads, privileges, appurtenances and advantages to the same belonging or in anywise appertaining; together with the perpetual right to erect and maintain between October 1st and April 1st of each and every year, on the adjacent land of the defendants, within or hundred feet of the land hereby condemned in fee simple, snow fences, provided that said snow fences shall not interfere with the construction and use of buildings now erected or hereafter erected with growing crops or roadways; together with the perpetual right to discharge the flow of water from such stream changes, side ditches, inlet ditches, outlet ditches, pipes, culverts and all other drainage facilities as are necessary in the opinion of the State Roads Commission to adequately drain the highway or adjacent property and/or control the flow of water through those drainage structures to be built to protect said highway (either within the areas shown cross-hatched thus

or within the limits of the areas hereinbefore conveyed in fee simple) into existing waterways or natural drainage courses as indicated by the symbol and/or the existing ground, as indicated by the symbol at the outlet end of the drainage facilities so created by the Commission, all of which are shown graphically and indicated by appropriate symbols and explanatory notations on the aforesaid plats, together with all the right whatsoever of ingress or egress between the through

highway and the remaining property of the defendants across the lines which are designated "Right of Way Line of Through Highway" to the end that there never will be any vehicular, pedestrian and/or animal access to or from the through highway and the remaining property of the defendants across those lines which are so marked on the beforementioned Plats Nos. 33509 and 33510, except by means of such public road connections as the Plaintiff may construct or permit to be constructed.

Hood Receives 'Head Start' Grant

The Morningstar Baptist Church of Catonsville, has received a grant of \$8,091 in federal funds for their Head Start Project, and Hood College of Frederick, was granted \$33,942 for a project to train Head Start teachers for programs to be operated this summer.

J. Donn Aiken, Executive Director of the Maryland Office of Economic Opportunity, stated that the Morningstar program is designed for four and five year old children and will be centered in Catonsville. Components will include medical and dental examinations, as well as treatment of problems that will be discovered. Comprehensive social and psychological services will also be included.

The Hood College of Frederick will conduct and administer a special training program for Head Start teachers. The college will enroll 25 trainees, all of whom are teachers employed in Head Start centers in Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia.

The teachers will receive special training in the teaching of pre-school children from low-income families. The underlying purpose of the training program is to insure the very highest quality of teaching, as well as the use of effective new techniques in Head Start centers. The training staff will consist of four instructors, coupled with two other persons as staff support.

Miss Margaret L. Munn is the director of the program.

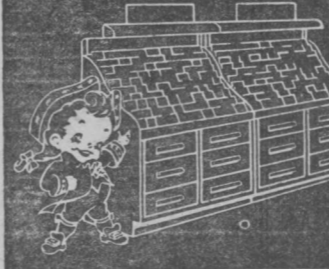

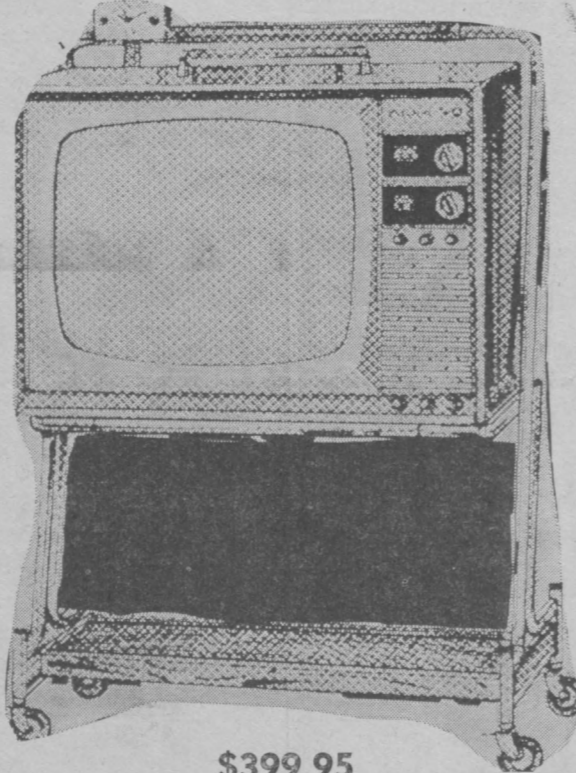
