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# **Health Spending Increases, Physicians' Share Declines**

CHICAGO—Americans are in- | lion spent on tobacco products. creasing spending for health care.

But they still spend more for tobacco than for hospital care, and more for cosmetics and haircuts than for doctor bills, reports The AMA News, published by the American Medical Association.

Spending for health care totaled \$25.2 billion in 1964, according to figures of the U.S. Department of Commerce. That's an increase of 7.8 per cent from the \$23.4 billion spent in 1963.

Hospitals receive the largest share of health-care spending-about 30 cents of every dollar. The total spent for hospital care in 1964 was \$7.6 billion. This compares with \$7.8 bilOther portions of the health-care

dollar are divided among drugs, 17 cents; dentists, 10 cents; health insurance, 7 cents; appliances, 4 cents, and miscellaneous expenses,

The remaining 27 cents goes to physicians. This percentage has declined slightly over the years. Twenty years ago, physicians received about 28 cents of every dollar spent on

Expenditures for physicians' services totaled \$6.8 billion in 1964, compared to \$7 billion spent on personal items such as cosmetics, haircuts, and toiletries.

This was the distribution of the

services, 5 cents. The Department of Commerce reported these expenditures for health care in 1964:

Hospitals, \$7.6 billion, up 12.5 per cent over 1963; physicians, \$6.8 billion, up 5.5 per cent over 1963; drugs, \$4.4 billion, up 5.2 per cent; dentists, \$2.4 billion, up 5.8 per cent; health insurance, \$1.8 billion, up 6.3 per cent; appliances, \$1.1 billion, up 9.7 per cent, and other services, \$1.2 billion, up 6.9 per cent over 1963.

Commission. But usually a new, or even a more costly secondhand, product brings with it a specific guarantee or warranty not only to help clinch your sale but to specify what you can do about it if anything goes wrong. Keep Your Guarantee And Sales Slip

Even though the liability of company or store for any defectiveness in the goods bought may spur a buyer to complete the purchase, he is as likely as not to forget the guarantee almost before he gets home. The certificate may kick around his desk for a while, then be thrown out with the newspapers. Or a housewife may keep her guaran-

So, the first thing to do when you are given a guarantee or warranty on any article is to put it-with the accompanying sales slip-in one spot specifically assigned for such papers. A manila folder in a desk drawer or on an out-of-the-way shelf is probably the safest and best place. Legally, a warranty is considered to be a manufacturer's statement of liability for his product and how far it goes. A guarantee, on the other hand, may be issued by somebody else along the line-such as the assembler, distributor, or retailer -who must answer for any lapse on the part of the maker. Find Out Just How. You Are Covered

If you are completing a purchase of any article supplied with a warranty or guarantee, take the time to go over it with your retailer and find out just how you are covered. Ask quesions. Who is responsible in case of failure, the manufacturer or the place of purchase? How long are you protected against product default? If lifetime proviso is given, does it mean your lifetime, or the usual lifetime of such an article, or specifically what? If a retailer hesitates to answer such questions, take

your business somewhere else. If you are required to send in a filled-in blank at the time of purchase, do so at once,-then place the stub with date and

But during the course of a year this is what happens inside the body of a cow.

A high-producing cow figura-

tively puts herself into the milk pail. This especially in regard to min-

Even a rela-tively modest production of 8,000 pounds of milk yearcontains 1,016 pounds

dry matter, a highly concentrated food. This is 56% more protein, 30% more fat and carbohydrates, and 90% more mineral matter than is contained in the entire body of a 1,200-pound steer. Ordinarily it takes about 2 years to develop a steer to that weight. This proves the dairy cow to be very efficient

But during havy milk production she cannot absorb enough minerals from her feed to keep the calcium, phosphorus and certain other minerals in her body in balance. She is therefore in a negative balance. More minerals leave her body than are taken in through digestion and assimilation of the feed, even though well supple-

Here is where the skeletal system of the cow acts as a

We do not ordinarily think, reserve or a bank for those minerals. It has been found that a cow stores these minerals during the drying off and the dry period. She is at that time in a positive balance. She retains more minerals than she gives

She is getting ready for the weeks and months ahead when the balance tilts the other way -more minerals lost than gained.

This yearly phenomenon tells us that it is essential that a dry cow be well fed as to the qual-ity of her feed. Not just any kind of forage will do just be-cause she is at that time a nonproducer. She is distinctly not in cold storage.

Different experiments at the U.S.D.A. and Ohio experiment stations have shown that it pays to supply adequate minerals all year including the dry

What applies to major minerals, salt, calcium, phosphorus, applies also to the minor or trace minerals that can be provided so conveniently and at low cost in the form of trace mineralized salt.

Question: Why don't we hear

more about vitamin A deficiencies in sheep as compared to cattle?

Answer: Because sheep are better able than cattle to convert the yellow carotene in their feed to the essential colorless vitamin A. As proof, witness the white internal fat of sheep carcasses as compared with the yellow of cattle, especially when having been on pasture or on heavy silage rations.


### Boating Tips...



WATER SKI SAFETY

The safety of any water skier is dependent to a great extent on the good sense of the tow boat driver. If your driver is careless or reckless, change his ways or change drivers. 


