## Most Anything At A Glance

With the sun still scorching the land and the clouds holding back the rain old-timers are muttering that this is the hottest and driest summer they can ever recall. As the fifth consecutive year of drought continues shrubbery and trees are beginning to show signs of distress. The mountains are beginning to look like fall as numerous trees are dying from lack of moisture. Farmers complain that the Federal relief offered is a joke and is just something to talk about and make headlines and really there is nothing realistic about it. I don't have the exact figures of rainfall for the whole eight months of 1966 but a rough estimate shows that we are well over a foot of rain short for the year so far. Normally we should have had about 30 inches at this time. Estimates show that about 18 inches have fallen the last eight months and there is no sign of relief in sight. This drought could go on for many more months yet.

Other towns are feeling the pinch also. It appears that York is the hardest hit and reports say they are hauling water in by tank truck. Our whole water source structure needs a complete revision and study for the future. Most water companies, either privately or municipally owned, are many years behind the times. Just take our own for instance. Twenty years ago we had four reservoirs. Today we have exactly the same and aside from a well or two in the past two decades nothing has been done to provide additional water supplies for the increased consumption that is mounting annually. It is not a bright picture and some research and study is called for. The inadequacy of towns and cities in this area, as far as water supplies goes, indicates immediate action on the Sixes Bridge Dam, plans for which have been shelved. These plans should be activated immediately. Locally, our water shed comprises a natural valley and a dam erected there would at least double our present capacity. While not providing any relief from our distress this year, the dam would insure us ample reserves for years to come. Apparently the quickest solution at this late date is the immediate drilling of several wells.

Approximately 10 farm barns have been burned to the ground in the past several months in Frederick County which indicates there is something radically wrong. Police are keeping constantly alert as are the fire marshals but so far no solution to the burning has been arrived at. Arson is suspected and there very easily could be a "fire bug" on the prowl. These culprits are hard to nab, working miles away from the scene of their destruction, but eventually I hope that they are apprehended. With the water shortage some of these fires could be really disastrous.

Politicking has become a daily routine in Emmitsburg these days and it won't be long until we elect or re-elect some of our public officials. Now is the time to consider what Emmitsburg wants, or what Emmitsburg has been deprived of. There is no question but we need a new set of County Commissioners for those now in office have sold us down the river. They were principally responsible for moving our local Public High School to Thurmont and now they must pay for their actions. There is a new crop of potential Commissioners in the field and we are calling for all new faces on the job. What about parks and picnic areas in this vicinity. There are none, yet millions are being spent elsewhere in the State. We don't even have a picnic table in the area. What are we going to do about this? Now is the time to talk it over with the politicians when they come to Emmitsburg!

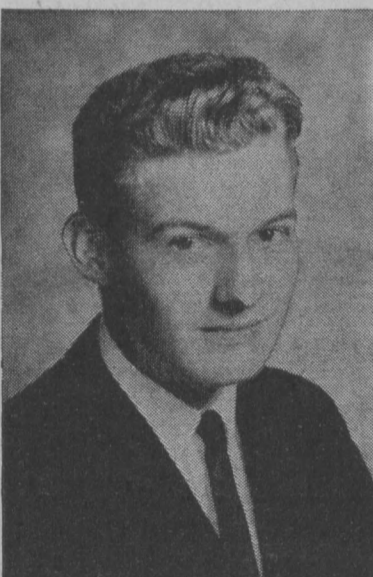
## GOP Candidates Coming Here For Rally

## Public School Has Enrollment Of 452 Here

The Emmitsburg Public Schools will open at 8:55 on the morning of September 6 for the coming school year. It is expected that a total of 221 students will enroll in grades 1 through 6 and a total of 231 students will enroll in grades 7 through 12. The school will have a professional staff of 21 full-time teachers in addition to special teachers in Instrumental Music, Elementary Physical Education and Speech Therapy. There will be several new teachers on the staff this year. These people are:

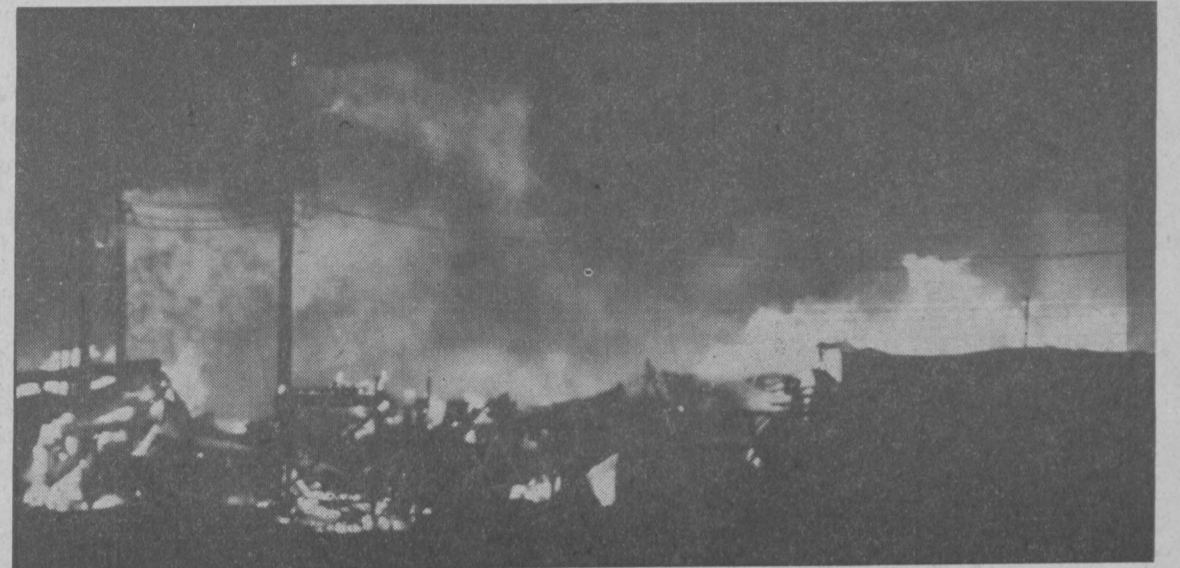

## \$300,000 Fire Destroys Taneytown Lumber Co.

Damage was estimated at \$300,000 when fire destroyed a wood-working factory at the Shower Lumber Co. in Taneytown at 7:45 Saturday night.

Destroyed in the large frame and sheet metal building were hundreds of tools and equipment used in such work as the construction of stair treads.

Seven fire companies with 12 pieces of equipment and 165 firemen battled successfully to prevent the blaze from spreading to an equally large storage building.

One wall of the storage building was only three feet from a wall of the workshop which was completely destroyed.

Firemen ran a water line from a plug in Taneytown to the scene and used tankers to shuttle water from a pond nearby. Taneytown firemen said "We really poured a lot of water," in explaining how they prevented spread of the fire from the building to the other structure a yard away. Unable to determine what started

ed the blaze, Taneytown firemen asked the state fire marshal's office to send an investigator to the scene in an effort to locate the cause.

Taneytown Fire Company had three engines at the scene, Westminster, one; Emmitsburg, two; Union Bridge, two; Littlestown, two; Harney, one and Pleasant Valley, one.

The other fire companies were released from duty at the fire at 1 o'clock Sunday morning. Emmitsburg firemen remained at the scene until later that morning.

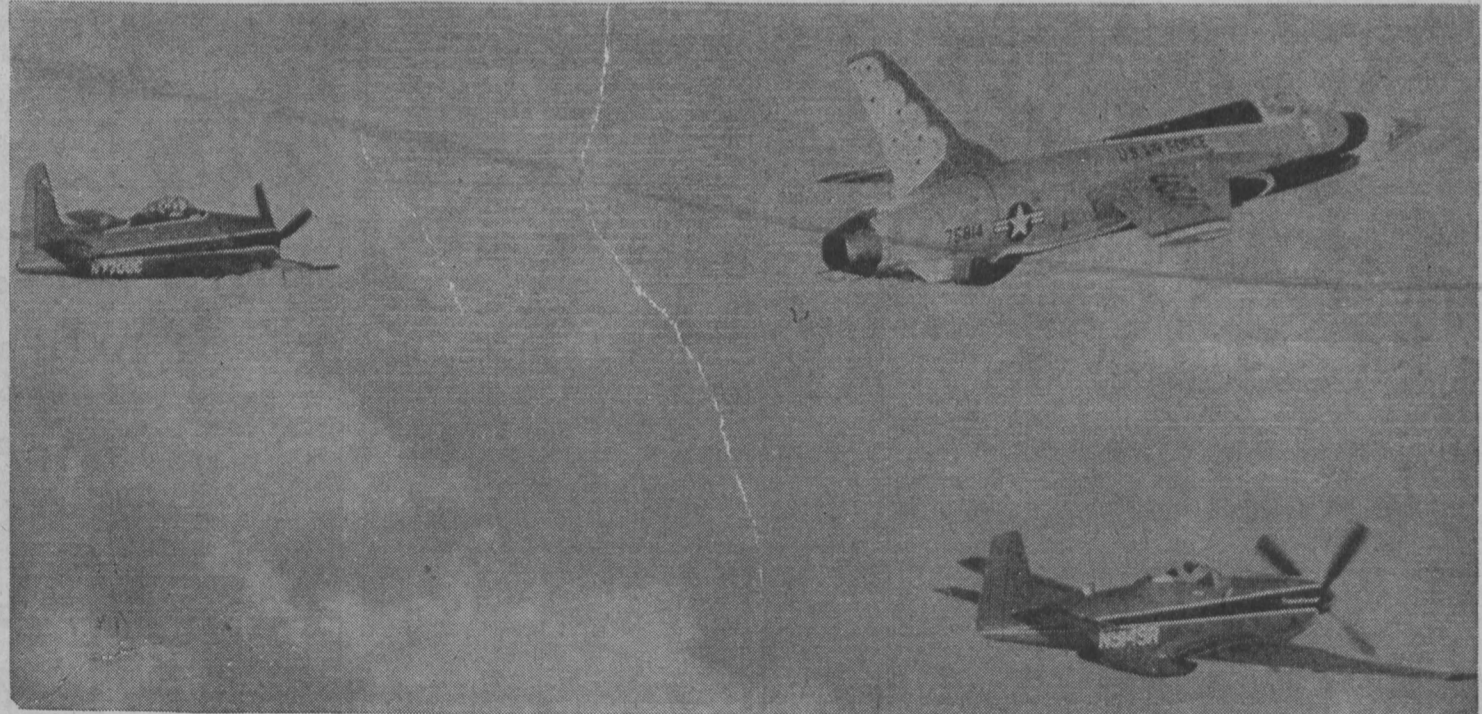

## National Air Races At Frederick Airport Starting Today



The quality of flying skill demonstrated every day over North Viet Nam will be demonstrated by six veteran Air Force pilots at the Washington National Air Races, Frederick, Md. airport, Sept. 2-5.

The famed U. S. Air Force Thunderbirds, six crack pilots flying F-100 Super Sabres, will give thirty minute demonstrations of their skill and teamwork between

heats of the air race.

The Thunderbirds are used by the Air Force to demonstrate the mobility and self-sufficiency inherent in any Air Force unit as well as the high degree of skill and training necessary.

The team is made of six pilots four who make up the Thunderbirds' famous diamond formation, and two solo pilots. Flying with wing tips overlapping three feet and separated vertically by a scant

five feet, the Thunderbirds knife through the sky, their trailing smoke painting graceful loops, corkscrews and curves.

Leader of the Thunderbird team is Lt. Col. Ralph J. Maglione of Akron, Ohio, a veteran of the Korean conflict who holds the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with five oak leaf clusters, and the Purple Heart among his decorations. Solo pilots are Captains Robert H. Morgan

of Pendleton, S. C., and Robert D. Beckel of Walla Walla, Washington.

The Sept. 2-5 renewal of the Washington Air Races features midjet planes powered by 190-cubic-inch engines producing speeds up to 225 miles an hour and sports biplanes whose top speeds are about 160 mph.

Crowds of 40,000 a day are anticipated at the Frederick Airport for the event.

**Wheat Support  
Prices Announced**

Discounts of 20 cents a bushel in price support wheat rates will apply again in 1967 to wheat varieties considered undesirable because of inferior milling or baking

qualities, James M. Voss, Chairman, Maryland Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, said this week. The list of undesirable varieties includes the same wheat varieties that were discounted in 1966. Varieties of the Soft Red Winter class named as undesirable for

the 1967 wheat support program include Kanqueen, Kawvale, Nured and Seabreeze.

The Chairman explained that the varieties were designated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service after consultation with State Agricultural Experiment personnel, agronomists, cereal chemists, and others on State and Federal staffs. The action is supported by representatives of crop improvement associations to help improve the overall quality of U. S. wheat production. Advance notice of the discounts is given in order to discourage plantings of undesirable wheat varieties.

Acresages of most of the undesirable wheat varieties have been declining in recent years, and the discount in the price support program is credited with speeding up this trend. However, the Department continues to consider making additions to the list on the basis of scientific evidence and practical experience. It is giving particular attention to potential problems that would result from large-scale shifts of some varieties from so-called native-producing areas to other areas. A variety

that is desirable in one area may have highly undesirable characteristics when grown in a different area, yet the good reputation of a variety where it is adapted encourages producers in other areas to plant it.

The Department urges farmers to seed only those varieties recommended by State extension services on the basis of experiment station results and practical experience.

Under the 1967 - program regulations, as under past programs, the producer will certify production of undesirable varieties based on his knowledge of the varieties he seeded and harvested. Because wheat varieties are difficult to determine from threshed samples, additional information in support of the certification may be needed in certain instances.

The night track will offer two complete thoroughbred racing programs this Monday, beginning at 2 and 7 p.m. Only one admission charge will be made for the entire doubleheader, according to Robert G. Leavitt, general manager.

Konyot, a Hungarian-born trainer, now handles Arthur Godfrey's dressage horses on the latter's farm near Leesburg, Va. The troupe includes "Goldie, Jr.," a young replacement for the aging and semi-retired "Goldie," the palomino who has thrilled thousands.

Lippizzans are a breed native to Spain and have come into this country through Austria where they were saved from the Nazis in World War II. Only stallions are trained for the graceful routines which will be seen at Shenandoah. Konyot's Lippizzan is Conversana-Erga, a veteran of shows throughout the United States and Canada.

Shenandoah Downs introduced the racing doubleheader on July 4, 1959 and has staged them each holiday since. A West Virginia betting record of \$1,068,848 was set on Labor Day, 1965.

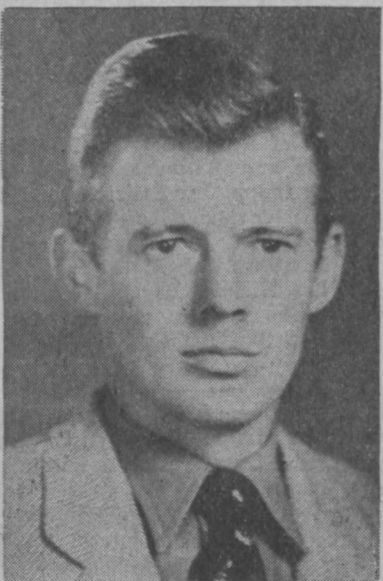

**Jim Dandy (?)**

A great many of the more than 900 Stakes Races run each year are named for Thoroughbreds who have done great things. Saratoga, however, programs a Stakes named for a horse that was by no means great. Jim Dandy won but two stakes races in his career. The first no one remembered and the second no one will ever forget.

In 1930 the turf was celebrating a Triple Crown winner, Gallant Fox, and when it came time for the Travers "Midsummer Derby" at Saratoga, only Harry Payne Whitney's Whichone was considered to be any threat to the Belair Stud champion. While the Travers was considered a match between this pair, two others did start and one of these was Jim Dandy, a non-winner as a 3-year-old. Jim Dandy had won but two races as a 2-year-old, one as an added starter in the Grand Union Hotel Stakes at 50 to 1 on a muddy track. This

omen was overlooked or ignored, and Jim Dandy, owned by a young California publisher named Chaffee Earl who wasn't even present for the race, went to the post at 100 to 1 and the track was again mud.

Whichone and Gallant Fox immediately set out to run each other into the ground and Whichone bowed a tendon in the process, carrying Gallant Fox wide as they entered the stretch. The awed throng, one of the biggest Saratoga had ever seen, saw Jim Dandy come through on the rail and win by eight lengths. It was his only victory in 20 starts that year.

**Mahoney Releases Policy Statement**

George P. Mahoney, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor and his running mate

for Attorney General, Ernest N. Cory, Jr., have, in the past ten days, completed a resounding successful tour of Southern Maryland and the Eastern Shore. From their reception in those areas, it is certain that the Mahoney-Cory-Gold-

stein ticket will sweep the Shore and Southern Maryland on Election Day.

In addition, Mr. Mahoney issued several policy statements this week, and in a TV appearance, explained his philosophy about the coming election.

According to Mr. Mahoney, his opponent is not another candidate, nor a group of candidates. He stated that his opponent is the State Of Things As They Are. As examples of the state of things as they are, he listed: criminals allowed out of the penitentiary for weekends; failure to cope with Maryland's financial problems; public school systems forced to hire far too many uncertified teachers; a lack of foresight in road and bridge planning and construction which has cost taxpayers literally millions of dollars; and the repeated uncovering of unpleasant news—such as conflict of interest resignations and shabby land investment activities. In general, a tendency to hide and to evade until we are faced with scandal and unexpected, emergency tax bites.

Mr. Mahoney said that he is not interested in blaming anyone, or accusing anyone, or anything else which wastes time. "I am interested in correcting these ills," he continued, "by using the modern business methods which I employ in my own successful business."

In a policy statement, Mr. Mahoney said that if elected, he will make it a major purpose of his administration to expand the facilities for vocational education throughout the state. He explained that not everyone is interested in or able to take advantage of a college education, but that everyone can and should have the opportunity for an adequate vocational education in order to take their places in our society.

In another policy statement, Mr. Mahoney voiced his opposition to any state bill governing truth in packaging. Mr. Mahoney said that such legislation belongs to the federal government and that the State of Maryland has more to lose than gain by attempting to pass such a bill.

Finally, Mr. Mahoney said that in his opinion, the Maryland Port

Authority has, in general, done a good job. However, he warned that the time to be thinking of the future is now—before it is too late. He promised that as governor, he would appoint the Executive Director of the Port Authority to a position on the Governor's Advisory Council to bring out port facilities into the proper perspective.

the three-day holiday weekend. Speeding? Sure. Drinking? That's right. Taking crazy, reckless chances in traffic? Yes, again, and doing a lot of thoughtless and daredevil things. What we need is to handle our cars as skillfully and safely as we do our work.

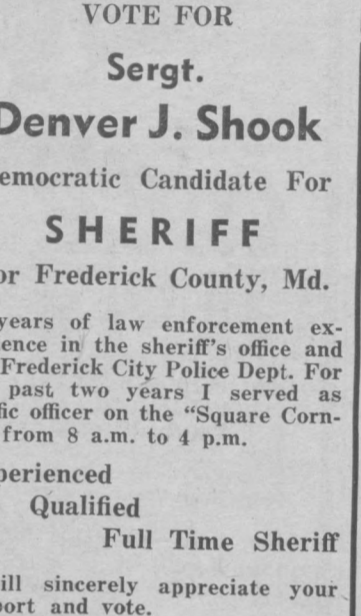

**WOMEN'S HEALTH**

Family Strains Lead To Accidents  
Accidents make up the fore-

most pediatric disease in the country, taking more children's lives each year than the next three chief child-killers combined — cancer, birth defects, and pneumonia.  
In an effort to reduce the ap-

palling accident toll, a team of physicians, psychologists, and social workers at the Children's Hospital Medical Center in Boston, made a detailed study of pre-school children admitted for treatment of accidental injury.  
They found that accidents don't 'just happen'. They are triggered by stress and by fatigue. Most accidents to children, they found, occur between three and six o'clock — when mothers are rushing to meet the demands of children home from school, preparing dinner, getting baby ready for his bath, tidying up.  
Suggestions for avoiding acci-

idents, as well as clear, simple instructions on what to do should accidents occur, are now available in an attractive, purse-sized booklet, "Accident Handbook". Compiled by the staff of the medical center, and published by Dell, the booklet can be bought for 25 cents at Woolworth's.

**Medical Committee Reports On Pill**

Does the pill work? Is it safe? The Committee on Human Reproduction of the American Medical Association recently reported as follows:

"The effectiveness of the oral contraceptives is virtually 100 per cent, certainly the highest of any method short of sterilization or total abstinence.

"The chief side effects such as spotting and breakthrough bleeding, nausea and vomiting, breast tenderness and weight gain usually diminish with successive cycles and can be minimized by adjustment of dosage or shift in products." (Some women, a minority of pill users, may experience one or more of these side effects.)

"To date no increase in the incidence of malignant transformations (cancer) has been reported in those women who were found to be free of pelvic cancer prior to taking oral contraceptives.

"The possible association of blood clots with the use of oral contraceptives has been reviewed by several committees," the Committee said, adding that "no connection has been found."

Women who have or have had circulatory problems or varicose veins should be watched carefully by their physicians if they are placed on the pill, as a precaution against blood clotting episodes. Women who have had liver disease or dysfunction or who have a history of breast or genital cancer should not be given oral contraceptives.

The committee noted that "continuing studies of several large groups of women have been in progress for over 10 years and there is no evidence of long-term adverse effects."

**Watch That Frog In The Throat**

Anyone who has been hoarse for two or three weeks would be wise to see a doctor. This advice comes from Dr. William Chew, otolaryngologist of the Leesburg, Fla., General Hospital. Dr. Chew pointed out in a recent report that hoarseness may be due to many causes—to a cold, laryngitis, vocal abuse, an injury. But it may also

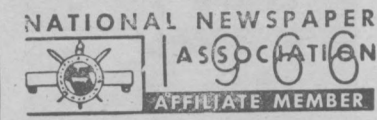

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

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Social Security Information

When do I enroll in medicare if I'm going to 65 in the near future or late years? This is a question the Hagerstown Social Security Office receives quite of-

ten, says W. S. King, District Manager. Persons who are not yet 65 will have seven months in which to enroll for medicare. These seven months are the three months before the month they are 65, the month in which they are 65, and the three months after the month

in which they are 65. The medical insurance part of the health insurance program becomes effective on different dates depending on when the application is filed in the seven month period. It is a definite advantage to file in the three month period before the month of reaching age 65. The medical insurance is then effective with the first day of the month of your 65th birthday. If you apply in the month you are 65 or in the following three months, your medical insurance protection will not begin immediately, although you will have hospital insurance as soon as you apply.

A person who is not yet 65, but who is working or has worked under social security and has not filed an application, should get in touch with the social security office in the three months before he is 65. In this way you become entitled to the health insurance benefits, even though, because of your work, you may not receive a monthly benefit. Don't worry about your additional earnings; these will be automatically included in refiguring your benefit rate.

The Social Security Administration has always urged those persons who have not filed for benefits to get in touch with them three months before they are 65. Now with medicare it is more important to do so.

For further information contact the Hagerstown Social Security District Office at 59 North Cannon Avenue. The office is open from 8:45 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Monday and from 8:45 to 5:00 p.m., Tuesday through Friday of each week.

this summer's rioting, with its potential nationwide explosiveness, is not at all surprising. Whatever actual physical part Communist agents may or may not have had in the Negro riots in Watts, Harlem, Cleveland, Chicago and other cities, the uprisings and their burning madness are of a pattern with Communist intrigue, strategy and plotting.

It will be recalled by most Americans that Malcolm X, who was murdered in New York, originally was an advocate of "Black Power" and planned violence against the White race. Then, several months before he was shot to death, he appeared to have changed course and was openly working in collaboration with less militant Negro leaders. (His long-time associates claim-

ed Malcolm X had not renounced his "Black Power" goal.)

Red Agitation

Here is a significant editorial published in the Chinese Communists' People's Daily of Peking, probably written by Chou-En-lai, second only to Mao as an international tactician. The editorial headline: "The Blood of Malcolm X Will Not Have Been Shed in Vain." The editorial says:

"American Negroes will undoubtedly realize from his murder that in dealing with the imperialist aggressors, violence must be met with violence as Malcolm X himself taught... At the back of the murdered is the sinister force upholding the reactionary imperialist rule and racial oppression. By assassinating Malcolm X, it incurred a new blood debt... (Malcolm X) called upon the American Negroes to fight fearlessly for their rights 'by meeting violence, an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' This incendiary statement of his reveals a truth: To achieve freedom and equality, the American Negroes must on no account rely on the benevolence of the ruling class, but should wage a resolute fight. Advocating Violence

"Malcolm X's murder (the Communist Newspaper continues) shows that the U. S. ruling class and racists today are in mortal fear of the awakening of the American Negroes... Hard facts have made the Negroes see more clearly that the 'Civil Rights Act' is no gospel of emancipation but an indulture to keep them forever under the yoke of the racists. Holding aloft their militant banner, they have continued to march onwards."

Sober-minded patriotic American Negroes—and most of our Negro citizens are in this category—reject the "Black Power" call of Malcolm X and those who are today echoing its incitement to revolution. They reject Communism, and many of them are aware of the Red's plan to conquer the world. Citizen leaders among our Negro population are now challenged to join together and replace on the national scene the "Black Power" agitators and those teaching violence under any guise, the people who are conducting "training schools for violence," and the actual Communists and Communist-dupes who are attempting to incite to violence the entire race. Our national ant state leaders must meantime be strengthened in a determination to prevent and control (and assess hard penalties upon) the expanding mass lawlessness. The lives and property—and freedom—of all citizens are at stake.

Every man has two educations—that which is given to him, and the other, that which he gives himself. Of the two kinds, the latter is by far the most valuable. Indeed all that is most worthy in

man, he must work out and conquer for himself. It is that, that soul and the language of our spiritism. What we are merely taught, seldom nourishes the mind like that which we teach ourselves.—Richter.

Babson's Point Of View On: Inflation



Everybody is talking about inflation again. What do we mean by inflation? To some economists the word suggests too much money chasing too few goods. To other economists it stands for strong unions pushing wages up and up. Still others think of inflation as a demand for goods that keeps pulling prices higher. But for this discussion, let us use the everyday meaning, simply climbing prices. What Is To Blame?

Right now the press is full of reports blaming this group and that for the strong upshoot in prices that has occurred this year. If you are a Republican, you are likely to say that the Democratic Administration is to blame. That free-swinging spending when a war is going on is creating too much buying power. The fact here is: Much of our production is now being "shot away" in Vietnam; it is not the type of production that can be consumed by our citizens; but money is being put in circulation, adding to buying power.

If you are a Democrat, you are likely to think of the moguls of industry pushing their price tags higher to take advantage of the brisk demand throughout our economy today. If you are a strong union man, you tend toward blaming the whole sorry business on the pricing power of big business. But the average man in the street is likely to feel, as President Roosevelt once did: "A plague on both your houses!" Caught In The Middle

Surely, the man in the street is caught in the middle, whether he is a union member, or a Wall Street broker. At the beginning of a price upturn, advances are often slow and scattered. But, as momentum is gained, the upswing becomes steep and broad. And all the furor over inflation at this mid-summer can probably be traced to the fact that people are now realizing that prices are beginning to bound upward. Ask any wife as she returns from shopping.

The natural reaction is to try to offset the falling purchasing power of the family paycheck by seeking a raise. Now, of course, not everyone is going to be able to get higher wages. Even those who do get fatter pay envelopes soon find that their gains are eaten into—even wiped out—by the well-known ability of a rising price wave to swell more rapidly than wages and salaries can be boosted. Point is: Once the inflation of prices hits its stride we are all in the same boat; no way has yet been invented to "beat the game."

All Must Cooperate

All right then, what can be done to remove the peril of an inflation blowoff and bust? For as night follows day, inflation has always ended in deflation.

And that can be very unpleasant for everyone. No one group can solve the problem . . . not government, not labor, not business. But, if each of these would stop trying to fatten its share and work together, economic catastrophe could be warded off.

Government should remind itself that it's wartime, therefore not a moment for pushing the money supply higher than necessary by all sorts of spending schemes. Better to lose an election than the country. Business should avoid price jumps as if the plague, realizing that same fall in profits would be preferable to a later wave of bankruptcies. Labor should tell its members that every wage boost is another nail in the coffin being prepared for the longest boom in our history. Yes, and the bankers should ask themselves if it would be better not to make that loan . . . at this time.

Some Sacrifice, Or Else

It is said that it is already too late. That any shutting down of the money faucets, or any cutting back by the big groups in the economy, would surely lead to depression. To a degree we agree with this thinking. But we shudder at what could happen if the inflation spree is allowed to mount higher and higher from its already lofty level. The bigger the action, the more powerful is likely to be the reaction. To us it seems far wiser to risk some sacrifices now than to run the extreme danger of severe economic breakdown later. What frightens us is the tendency for key groups to simply wait and see. When the avalanche is visible, it is already too late.

of the new, safe catalytic heaters. "The petroleum-fueled lanterns and stoves should not be used inside an unventilated tent," stresses John Jobson, Camping Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. There are those who prefer a tent especially suitable for cold-weather camping. One of the best is the ancient, reliable A-wall. Many old-timers like this type with about a 10- or 12-inch sod cloth sewn around the lower inside perimeter. This folds

out flat on the ground inside the tent. A tarp is spread inside, running over the sod strip. Thus the tent is draft-free. A removable tarp is ever so much easier to keep clean and dry than is a sewn-in floor. The A-wall should have a wood-burning sheep-herder stove, with metal-astobestos ring for the stovepipe. You can cook with it, but other advantages are: a clean, non-toxic warmth; meals without grease congealing before your very

eyes; the fact that clothing and bedding can be dried in inclement weather.

A person must have a warm place to eat—whether it's inside a tent or near a cheery campfire. Scarcely anything is more miserable afield than eating cold food when you want it hot. Campfires, by the way, should be a bit larger in winter than in summer, for obvious reasons.

Schools Opening; Safety Urged

Once again it's "Back-To-School" for all our boys and girls and, for the motorist, it means exerting special caution to protect these young pedestrians. Accidents are the leading cause of death of school-age children, pointed out Paul E. Burke, Executive Director of the Maryland Traffic Safety Commission. An appalling number of children are killed and in-

jured each year while traveling to and from school. In Maryland last year 3,044 children between the ages of 5 and 9 were injured or killed. We need everyone's cooperation to combat this devastating loss of young life. Children imitate the examples of the grown-up,—that's why we urge adults to set children a good example by—obeying all traffic laws—driving within the posted speed limits—practicing courtesy at all times and cooperating with the police, safety officials and school authorities

in enforcing safety. Even considering that youngsters habitually violate safety rules in their walking, the bulk of the blame for such accidents rests with the driver. While most drivers are horrified at the idea of hurting a child, nevertheless, thoughtlessness on the driver's part is the chief cause of the high annual toll of young traffic accident victims. Parents should assume responsibility for early and continuous safety training of their children to make them self-reliant and help save their lives. Let's protect our children by teaching and showing them how to protect themselves. Motorists should be child-conscious — and drive with care — children should be safety conscious and walk with care. This will insure the right-of-way to long life for all our children.

Let's send our children back to school with the assurance that everyone is doing his part to make this world a safer place in which to live and play.

Newspapers Gain Over Television In Adv. Volume

Newspapers have been getting more of the additional revenue going into advertising than any of the other three media.

In the last five years, an advertising executive told the Texas Newspaper Assn., there has been a trend toward print in general, and newspapers in particular!

Leo Bogart, executive vice president and general manager of the bureau of advertising, ANPA, drew his analysis from a report on advertising volume in television, radio, magazines and newspapers prepared by McCann-Erickson, Inc.

Newspapers, he told the men who run them in Texas, will receive 49% of the total dollar volume being added to the four media, a significant increase from 29% in 1962.

In 1962 he said, newspaper advertising grew by 58 million. This year the estimated growth in total newspaper advertising revenue is \$355 million.

By contrast, he added, television has steadily declined in the past five years—from 56% in 1962 to 27% this year!

Television's revenues from advertising this year will total \$2.7 billion. Total newspaper advertising volume for 1966, Bogart predicted, will be \$4.8 billion. By 1970 Bogart said, total advertising volume will reach \$20 billion, "assuming continuing expansion of the economy."

Bogart attributed the growth in newspaper advertising to a combination of factors, including improved editorial production and more thorough and more aggressive selling.

He added, "the single most important reason for the unprecedented growth of newspapers in recent years is probably that the medium in a very real way provides solutions to the complex advertising problems of the marketers in today's burgeoning society."

Drought Aid Insufficient, Farmers Say

Top state and county Farm Bureau officials have denounced Federal drought aid to farmers.

County Farm Bureau president J. Austin Younkens, who called drought aid "of very little use," also said he agreed 100 per cent with a state officer's blast at aid.

E. Rankin Lusby, executive secretary of the Maryland Farm Bureau, had said that drought aid to state farmers is a "deception." He explained that no "government aid or handouts are being given drought-stricken Maryland farmers, contrary to most public opinion."

Lusby added that "to most farmers present drought aid measures amount to nothing except talk and news headlines that mislead the general public."

Reminiscences About Old Ball Game

Editor, Emmitsburg Chronicle: With baseball fever running at a high pitch, and the Orioles way out front in the pennant race, it recalls to mind the fun and excitement we had in Emmitsburg 50 years ago, in 1916, during that summer.

Harry Hopp and John Rosensteel managed the club, and selected me to be captain of the team, playing first base. It is difficult to recall all the names of the team, but several stand out: George Rosensteel at third base; "Bot" Kerrigan at shortstop; Cecil Kreitz, catcher; "Ab" Shorb, pitcher; Sam Annan and "Gummy" Myers, outfielders; and Ward Kerrigan kept score.

We played some 14 games, losing 2 by close margins, and 2 tied. The boys from Myersville consisted of Hauvers and Bittles only. The Woodsboro team looked like Indians, with mud plastered under their eyes, and a slice of lemon in their mouths, but they won the game.

The one tied game occurred when some of the players had farm chores to do, especially harvesting wheat. While the second game was catastrophic. We were playing Gettysburg, who had a few semi-pros on their team. The game went some 16 innings tied 2 to 2. Our regular umpire quit after 10 innings in the heat, and my brother Sidney, substituted for a few innings, and then "Si" Klosky came in for the finish.

"Chick" Rosensteel hit a three-bagger, and when he slid into third base, Skelly tagged him on the head. The young man rolled over unconscious. Father Hayden came down to the field and administered the Last Rites, and Doctor Jamison also was present. He was finally removed to the doctor's office where he was in a coma for a day or so. Skelly, the Gettysburg third baseman, was so worried he remained in town over night. The town was in a pall and very quiet.

The following weekend, we played the golf club at Blue Ridge Summit, and the invalid was so fully recovered, he hit three home runs.

He takes no holiday warns the Maryland Traffic Safety Commission and with the Labor Day weekend coming up, our roads and highways will be more jammed with traffic hazards than ever before. This means that every motorist will need that safety-know-how when he gets behind the wheel of his car if he is to survive the annual holiday weekend carnage. Those who take to the "road" to enjoy this last summer weekend holiday, please remember the highways will be crowded with speeding cars and impatient drivers who are potential accident makers. Don't take needless chances. Drive at a sensible speed — avoid alcohol — watch out for the other guy — drive with caution, courtesy and common sense. Labor Day was never meant to be celebrated with traffic accidents — keep it safe — and happy.

He said that "only one so-called aid measure is actually available to farmers in the six-disaster counties, and it is worthless."

Frederick is one of the six counties granted permission to allow farmers to graze livestock or harvest hay on diverted acres. But those acres "now contain only dry, burnt farm life," Lusby added.

Moreover, he said, a farmer who uses diverted land "must pay for the use of his land."

Lusby also said that emergency low-interest Farmers Home Administration loans "are available to only a limited few who cannot obtain credit from any other source and can show there are reasonable prospects for success with the assistance of a loan."

The loans have not yet been granted for Frederick County far-

mers, but a request is being processed.
