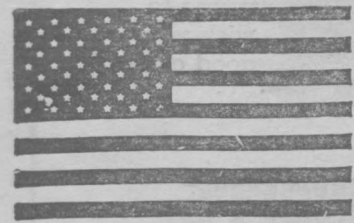

Mounts Drop Two; Idle Over Christmas

Mt. St. Mary's College basketball team are resting over Christmas after absorbing their second defeat of the season. Jim Phelan's men were dumped, in an upset, last Thursday evening in Washington when Catholic U. defeated them 64 to 54, in a Mason-Dixon Conference contest.

The Mounts were held to their lowest point production in a long time and Fred Carter, who had been averaging better than 20 points per game, managed but 10 tallies.

The Mountaineers appeared headed for victory when they built up a 30-21 lead in the first half.

Bill Wilson, who scored 18 of his 20 points in the second half, sparked the Cardinals in the second half surge with the score finally being tied at 43-43. Two more tie scores followed with Catholic then moving ahead for keeps.

Dick Dohler was high man for the Mount with 14 points and Bob Sutor added 12. The Mount made 14 of 28 fouls and Catholic 26 of 34.

Mt. St. Mary's, 4-2 overall, will be idle until December 26 and 27 when it takes part in the Delaware Classic Tournament at Salesianum High School, Wilmington, Del. Other teams in the tourney include Cheyney State, Fairleigh-Dickinson and Tennessee State.

Contractor Lowers Catocin School Bid

Catocin High School's architect said this week that negotiations with the low bidding contractor for construction of the new consolidated school at Thurmont, have produced a proposal which is considerably lower than the original bid.

Lowell E. Nelson, architect for the school, said no major changes have been made in the design of the building, but a "package of minor changes in the plans will amount to a sizeable amount" of money.

Nelson and Dr. John L. Carnochan Jr., superintendent of schools, both refused to release details of the proposal until it is presented to the Board of Education.

Dr. Carnochan said he is trying to arrange a special meeting of the board as soon as possible.

The meeting will probably be between Christmas and Jan. 1. The next regularly scheduled meeting of the board will be Jan. 4, the first Wednesday of the month.

At its last meeting, the Board of Education rejected a negotiated bid of \$3,080,000. The original low bid was \$3,470,000.

The board instructed Nelson to further negotiate with the contractor to reach a lower price.

The \$390,000 trimmed from the original bid represented items that would have to be added to the school later, Nelson said.

The major item deleted from the original bid is a \$302,665 closed circuit TV system.

St. Joe's Expands Win Streak

Saint Joseph High School's basketball team extended its winning skein to seven victories in a row this week with victories over Mt. Airy 71-63, Ascension Academy 79-43, and Fairfield 50-26.

In the seven games played, four of the five starters are averaging over 15 points per game with John Sherwin's 20 per game as tops, while Eddie Adelsberger, Ray Baker and Marty Williams are the other three starters carrying double figure averages, with Williams and Baker also averaging over 12 rebounds per game.

On Tuesday, St. Joe's will entertain St. John's of Frederick in the Mt. St. Mary's gym, as its first league opponent. On Thursday, St. Joe's travels to Hagerstown to play St. Maria Goretti in another league encounter.

Babson's Point Of View On: The Lesson Of Christmas

BABSON PARK, Mass., Dec. 22—"And the angel said unto them, Be not afraid; for behold,

I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all the people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David, a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10-11).

Ever since the angel appeared to the shepherds on the hills outside Bethlehem, bringing them "good tidings of great joy", Christmas has been celebrated as pre-eminently the season of joy—the season of children's laughter and games, of presents, of family reunions, of human warmth and light, of the manger with the star shining above it. But there are times—and perhaps the present with its armed clashes, its political unrest, and economic stresses is one of them—when joy seems hard to capture.

The Personality Of Jesus

If Jesus was not God, He was certainly the most remarkable man who ever lived. For He left the impress of His name and personality upon the world in a way no other man has ever done. The whole period of life from His day to ours is stamped with His name—the Christian era. The civilization that spread across the world sprang from His teaching and is called after Him—Christian civilization. When we wish to describe moral virtues that exceed anything that pre-Christian man knew, we use the terms Christian charity, Christian justice, and the Christian ethic.

The personality of Jesus was so impressed on the world that its impact surpasses anything that anybody else has achieved. In short, it is unique. One is forced to the conclusion that the personality of Jesus was at least super-human. Yet this super-human being claimed to be even more than that. He claimed to be God. To reject that claim is to say in effect that the greatest personality that ever existed was that of a deceiver.

The Humility Of The Manger

The story of Jesus began in a stable. It was a night when all the world was upside down. There was no room in the inn for Him who would be acclaimed as a king; yet angels heralded His birth. A ruler would seek His death; and wise men would adore Him. He was a son of the royal house of David; yet there was no bed for Him and He was wrapped in clothes and laid in a manger.

From this the lowest point attainable in human life, from a stable shared by beasts, the world's most amazing story started. In the sky the angels sang the message which would hold good for all time, that peace on earth would be to men of good will. Jesus set out to teach humility and He started most humbly.

Christmas Is Universal
Jesus was born in the still-

ness of the night, and it has been traditional to associate His birth with silence—the silence of reverential awe and of humility. One of the most hallowed of our Christmas carols is called "Silent Night", and in his hauntingly beautiful "O Little Town of Bethlehem" Bishop Phillips Brooke wrote nearly one hundred years ago "how silently, how silently the wondrous gift is given."

However you choose to regard the life of Jesus, you cannot help but note that it started in humility and in silence, but grew to embrace the whole world. Nor can you help but note that Christmas is the greatest feast or holiday of the year. It is the day we all keep in some fashion or other, though it is to be regretted that for so many it has lost its true spiritual significance.

The Silence Of Bethlehem

The lesson of the manger is a difficult one for a stiff-necked materialistic world. The humility of the stable and the silence of Bethlehem are unacceptable to those who see life's sole purpose as the amassing of power and wealth or the attainment of personal success. The silence of Bethlehem on that holy night was not accidental. It was meant to teach us reverence for God, for His creation, for our fellow men. It was also meant to teach us that we must be quiet and listen or we will not hear God when He speaks within our heart.

Nominated For 'Who's Who'

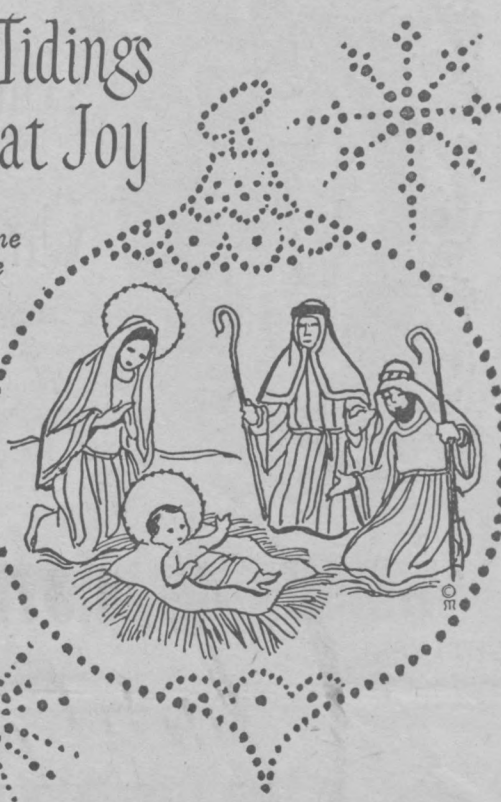

Lipstick Sign Heralds Recovery
SCRANTON, Pa.—Medical Mystery: A physician examining a seriously ill patient finds no clinical sign that she is improving. Her condition seems what it was when he saw her on the previous day. She says she feels as she did, quite ill. Nonetheless, the doctor leaves feeling the patient is on the road to recovery. What clue led him to this conclusion? Simple, Watson. The lipstick clue.
According to an article in

'Pennsylvania Medicine' by Scranton physician Dr. Mario N. Fabi, sometimes when a sick woman applies lipstick, she is on the mend as surely as spring follows winter when the first crocus pokes its head through the winter soil. "When a woman is ill," the doctor wrote, "she usually stops applying makeup. As recovery ensues, there comes a time when she again dons lipstick. This is the lipstick sign." He further observed that sometimes the lipstick sign may precede any other indication of recovery.
Ignorance Not Apathy
Delays Family Planning
YORK, Pa.—Why do some wo-

men fail to ask health and welfare workers for information on family planning? Is it apathy? An emphatic 'no,' along with the following explanation comes from Mrs. Anne Blevins, a housewife employed here to explain birth control to the poor:
"A lot of these women don't ask because they don't know anything. They see have, they see have 10 babies as a matter of fate. 'My mother had 10,' they'll say. It's only after they start talking about how tired they are all the time, about being run down and having miscarriages, or their husband's drinking, and I ask them don't they think things might be a little easier if they didn't have another child right away that they become interested."

According to Dr. Marks, the shiners appear because prolonged and persistent swelling of the mucous membranes of the nasal cavities produces pressure effects on the veins, interfering with their normal drainage.

ers' or their becoming far less conspicuous, the physician noted.
Brewster Opposes Tax Increase Now
Senator Daniel Brewster (D-Md.), said this week that he would not support a Federal tax increase for at least six months. He warned that such an increase might trigger a recession.

Brewster noted, "The latest figures indicate that there is a general slowdown in the economy. Inflationary pressures are easing. "What this means is that we should stop, look, and listen before we raise taxes. We suspended the investment tax credit in October, and the effects of this measure are only now beginning to be felt. We should wait and see what the next six months will bring, before enacting a hasty tax increase."

Brewster admitted that the costs of the war in Vietnam add greatly to Federal expenditures. But he stated that he favors other means of combating inflation and balancing the budget.

"One alternative is general tax reform. Instead of an across-the-board tax boost, which would hit the small taxpayer who can afford it least, we should try to close some of the loopholes in our present system."

"An example is oil depletion. A large tax credit is given to oil producers, supposedly to give them incentive to develop new oil deposits. As a result, many millionaire producers pay little or no tax at all."

"We can provide adequately for the development of new oil resources and still tax these producers fairly. Why should they escape taxation while the little man, the consumer, shoulders the burden?"

Brewster said that there were many other such reforms which would equalize the tax burden. "By ending these special privileges, experts say we could add billions of dollars in revenue. That

would help us to balance the budget, a goal all too often forgotten these days."

Maryland's senior Senator added that the Congress should hold a tight rein on Federal expenditures. Some non-essential programs could be cut back or postponed, he suggested.


"I am convinced that these two approaches—tax reform and limitation of spending—will be more than enough to dampen inflationary pressures and bring the budget into reasonable balance. But a tax increase now, according to some economists, might trigger a recession."

"After six months, if there is a need for a tax raise, there will be plenty of time for the Con-

gress to enact one. But I won't vote for one until it is clearly necessary."





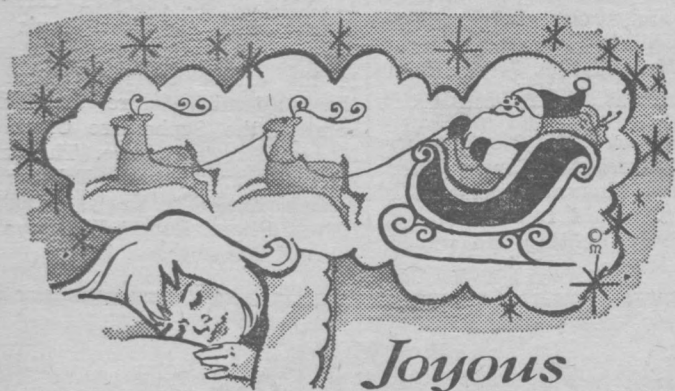
Garden Club Meets

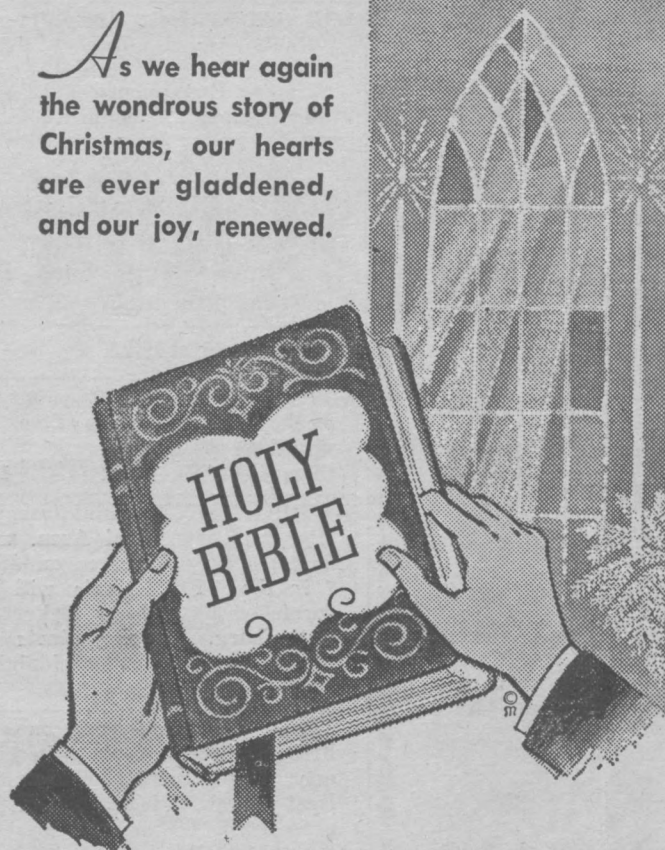

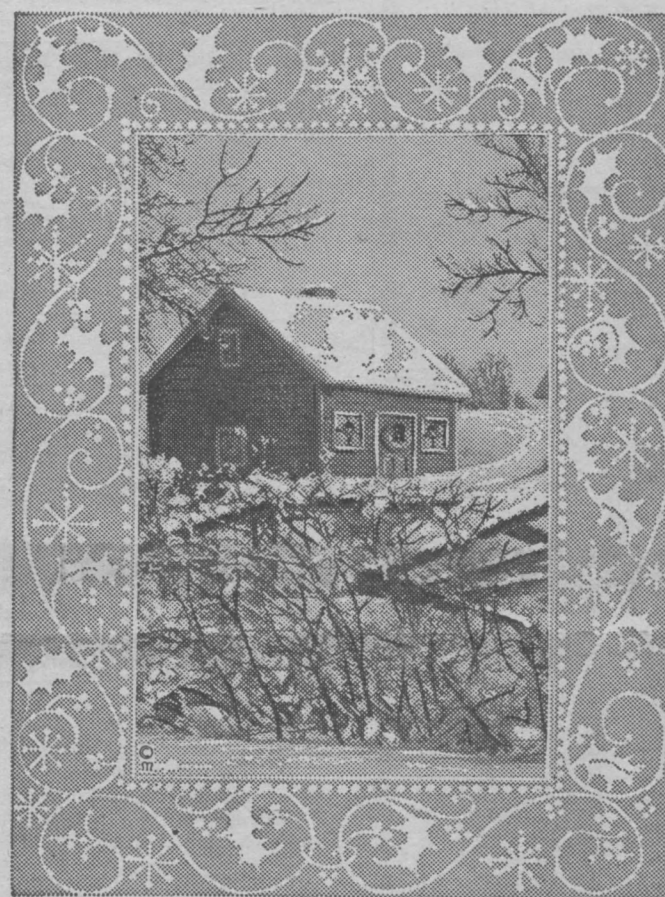

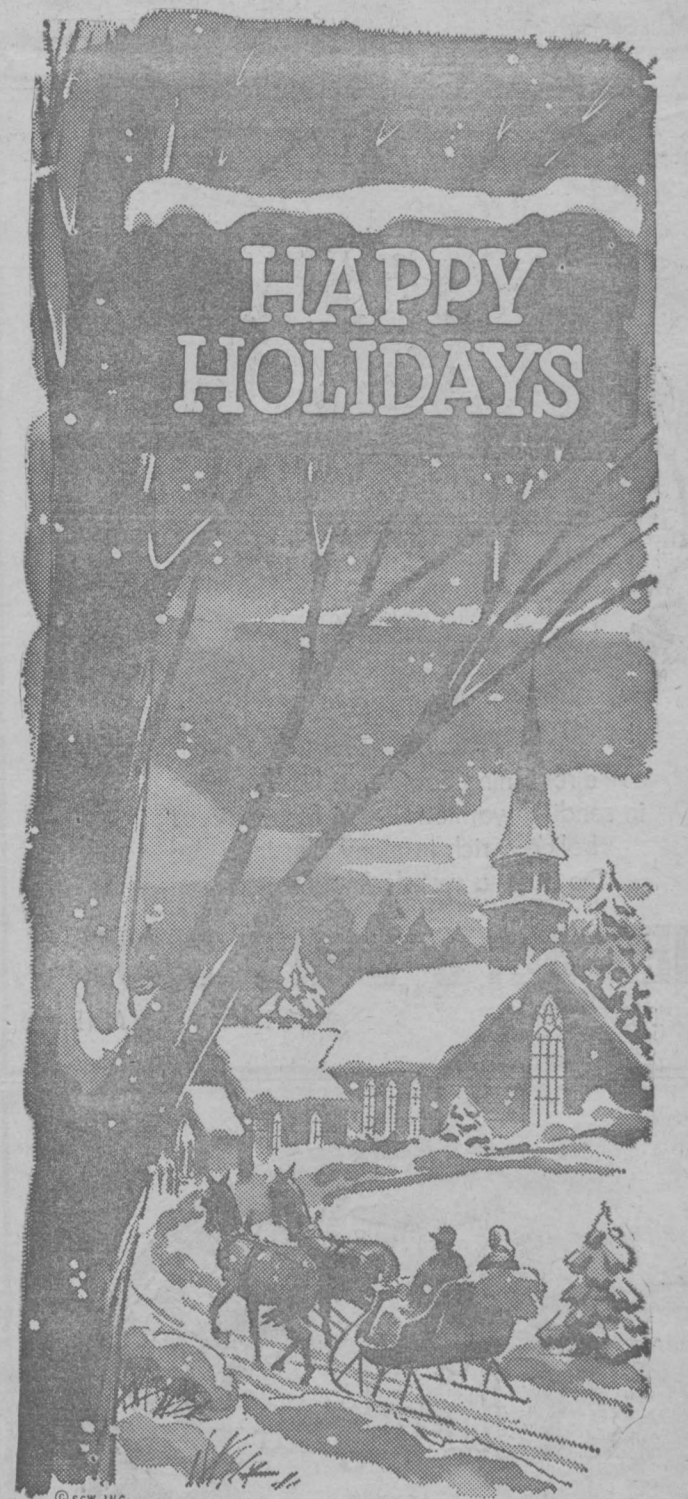
