## Most Anything At A Glance

Now that the furor of our local election is over there will be a new face at the Town Council meetings in the near future. The election was sort of quiet as elections go and there must be a winner and also a loser. Local political jobs are a thankless and low-paid lot. Little, if any praise is ever uttered, but condemnation runs strong many times. Many times the public is unaware of the issues at stake and tend more or less to work out on personalities. Emmitsburg is small and rumors and news spreads fast, and on many occasions, is a total fallacy. Still those in office receive the blame, just or unjust. That's the way it is in a small town and I guess there's no cure for it. Some times I wonder just what makes individuals seek these offices. It must be a pure sense of duty and recognition of community responsibility because certainly the amount of work involved is not commensurate with the amount of money received. At any rate, we're over the election this year and in a short 12 months we'll be at it once again.

Sentiment for constructing the Sixes Bridge Dam is being strengthened these days, many months after the project had been abandoned by the Corps of Army Engineers. Many of those opposed to the project a year ago now seem to see the wisdom in having the project revived. We always have been of the opinion that it would be a great boon to the economy of this area should the project ever be completed. Anyway, recently county bodies and officials have staked on a new interest in this project and are now asking that it be reconsidered. Actually, the only opposition generated here came from a few farmers who apparently thought they would not receive adequate compensation for their ground to be taken by the impounding dam.

Well the school budget has been presented to the County Commissioners and as anticipated, it is a whopper. Over 11 million dollars is being asked by the Board of Education for the next fiscal year . . . a record. Spending records mean little in this day and age and just about every year a new spending record is established. Of course when the Commissioners are finished trimming the "fat" from the budget, a much leaner figure may materialize. We are cognizant that the cost of everything seems to be rising but we thought that after a decade of high budgets and building new schools, etc., that perhaps the day would come when the budget would settle down to some degree of stability. We often wonder if the County really is growing and if the spending is in proportion to the growth reported? We sort of thought that perhaps we had caught up with the demand for new schools, one of the costlier items in the budgets, because actually the birth rate has declined in the State in recent years, but then something always crops up to find its way into the budget, such as increased wages, more teachers, more assistants, more office expenses, etc. Just a word of advice to the Commissioners . . . sharpen those trimming knives!

## School Board Budget Given; Record High

The Board of Education presented its \$11,220,331 budget to the Board of County Commissioners this week, leaving commissioner action as the last step in the budget procedure.

The record budget includes provision for 12-month employment for teachers who desire it, pay scales which average a \$250 increase for teachers, and new administrative pay scales.

Of the total, the county is asked to provide \$6,669,579 for current expenses, capital outlay and transportation of parochial school children.

The presentation attracted only about a dozen spectators in addition to the Board of Education members and staff.

During the presentation, which followed the presentation of the budget of the Frederick Community College, commissioner Wallace E. Hutton asked for a list of the employees of the school board and their salaries.

Dr. John L. Carnochan, Jr., superintendent of schools, told Hutton that salary schedules were available, and he suggested that the two boards "informally" discuss the matter of individual salaries.

The presentation of the 136-page budget began with a summary of revenue expected from all sources, including the county.

Major areas from which the Board of Education anticipates funds aside from the county are: State of Maryland, \$3,894,103, an increase of over \$500,000 than was expected before the passage of a tax reform by the 1967 legislature; and \$530,000 in federal funds for students whose parents either work for or live on property owned by the federal government.

Commissioner Hutton asked about other expected Federal funds not included in the budget. He was told by Dr. Carnochan that Federal funds other than those mentioned could not be anticipated before they are appropriated.

The areas in which the federal government has provided funds to Frederick County in the past include: head start, and opportunity programs, grants for library books and aid to vocational education in the form of equipment and salaries.

Dr. Carnochan said that such aid in the current year amounted to approximately \$600,000. He said if federal funds are not made available this year, then the programs which they finance will not be carried out this year.

The breakdown of the budget, with percentages of the total request, is as follows:

Administration \$224,873—2 per cent; instruction \$8,594,334—76 per cent; pupil personnel \$52,990—47 per cent; health services \$24,985—22 per cent; transportation \$614,702—5.48 per cent; operating \$890,075—7.93 per cent; maintenance \$388,938—3.47 per cent; fixed charges \$180,161—1.61 per cent; food services \$20,953—.19 per cent; and community services (parochial school busing) \$29,000—26 per cent.

Eugene Rosensteel, Postmaster, reported this week that his job is to see that local patrons, the public, receive the best in mail service. However, he admitted, if he is to accomplish this goal he must have the full cooperation with the requests he has set forth.

On three occasions, the Postmaster reports, he has requested the use of Postoffice Box Numbers to be placed as a part of the return address, on all correspondence, and to please notify publishers of newspapers and magazines which you receive regularly, of your proper address.

There are now approximately 35 patrons out of the 220 mail boxes rented, who receive the majority of their mail properly addressed. To these 35 I extend my gratitude and to the remaining 185 I request again, to please help and make our mail handling as up-to-date as our facility, by updating their addresses, using their proper box numbers on all correspondence.

Likewise, our two rural routes were recently surveyed and given box numbers to be used as their proper addresses. The survey was quite a success with approximately 90-95% of the rural patrons returning their survey forms. If you have not as yet returned your form, please do. The main purpose behind the survey (besides that of up-dating the register of names) was to induce the rural patrons to use their route and box numbers as their proper address, rather than street or road names. Like the Postoffice box patrons, I wish the rural patrons would notify their correspondents and publishers of their proper address.

## Ralph McDonnell Is New Town Commissioner

Approximately 40% of Emmitsburg's eligible voters turned out Tuesday to elect a Town Commissioner in the annual town election. Of the registered 647 voters 269 took time out to cast their ballots.

J. Ralph McDonnell, local electrical contractor, rode rough-shod over his opposition garnering 179 of the total votes cast. It was McDonnell's first bid for public office.

Robert A. Rosensteel, also a newcomer to local politics, received a total of 50 votes.

Joseph M. Haley, incumbent Commissioner and chairman of the Board of Commissioners, seeking re-election after serving a three-year term, received 39 votes thus losing the office. There was one write-in vote for Thomas W. Bolinger.

McDonnell has 10 days in which to qualify by taking the oath of office before Magistrate Guy A. Baker, Sr., after which he will be seated on the Town Council. Other members of the Council are: Mayor Guy A. Baker, Jr., Quinn F. Topper, Samuel C. Hays and Clarence P. Wachter.

While there was only one Commissioner elected Tuesday, in next April's annual election, three offices will be open. They are those of the Mayor, Guy A. Baker, Jr., Samuel C. Hays and Quinn F. Topper, both Commissioners.

## Thurmont Elects

C. Ray Weddle was re-elected mayor of Thurmont and James E. Black and Roy C. Clabaugh were elected to the town council Monday in the annual general election.

Incumbent Charles R. Ambrose was defeated, running third.

Weddle ran unopposed for mayor and was elected with 250 votes. Weddle is an agent for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and was elected a commissioner of Thurmont in 1964. Last December he was named mayor, replacing the late Roy W. Lookingbill.

In 1952 Weddle was the youngest elected mayor in Thurmont history. He served in that capacity for six years.

James F. Black, 45, who received 268 votes, the highest total in the election, is a lifetime resident of Thurmont and owns the Thurmont Upholstering Store.

Roy C. Clabaugh, 43, received 172 votes and he is an employe of the Claire Frock Company and is a member of the town planning and zoning commission.

Postage Increase  
Effective May 1

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster G. Eugene Rosensteel announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, however, a brief explanation of the changes, is as follows:

1. Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13c a half ounce, to 15c.

2. Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15c a half ounce to 20c.

3. Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2c each, from 11c to 13c.

4. Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased approximately 20c per parcel.

Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters to Canada and Mexico, correspond to U. S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time.



Desserts with a Heritage

Today let's take our tastes back to Early America. To the days when homemakers picked their own fruit — invented thrifty family desserts — and dreamed up ingenious recipe names. Like Apple Pan Dowdy, remember? A homey and delicious deep dish apple pie, for all its tippy turvy appearance. Another Early American original, the Roly Poly: Rolled dough wrapped around a peach or pear and baked into a plump little dumpling. And up New England way, pioneer ladies would "cobble up" a dessert (or mix in a hurry) and the fruit cobbler was born. Today a perennial favorite, with fruits always available. Maybe you'd like to bake up a memory with one of my cobbler recipes?

1 can (1 pound 13 ounces) pear halves, drained (reserve syrup)  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon ginger  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 cup Bisquick  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1/2 cup coarsely shredded sharp cheese  
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons light cream

Heat oven to 400°. Cut each pear half into 4 pieces; set aside. In saucepan, mix cornstarch, 1/4 cup sugar and the reserved pear syrup. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Boil and stir 1 minute. Remove from heat; stir in lemon juice, ginger and pear pieces. Pour into 2-quart casserole; dot with

butter. Place in oven. Mix Bisquick, 1 tablespoon sugar, the cheese and cream with fork to a soft dough. Beat vigorously 20 strokes. Drop dough by teaspoonfuls onto hot fruit. Bake about 20 minutes or until nicely browned. Serve warm with cream, if desired. 6 servings.

Spicy Pear-Cheese Cobbler: Follow recipe above except — reserve 1 1/2 cups syrup and leave pear halves whole. Reduce sugar to 2 tablespoons; add 2 tablespoons red cinnamon candies and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon to the cornstarch-sugar mixture and omit the ginger. Bake in 1 1/2-quart casserole.

To plan a traditional New England menu, serve Boston Baked Beans or Clam Chowder, brown bread, lots of butter. Then main dish to dessert, rediscover how good Early American cooking really is.




