



The practice of some towns to permit non-resident property owners to vote would be allowed, unless the practice was prohibited by the General Assembly.

5. Date of Elections. General elections would continue in evennumbered years, but the General Assembly or county governments could specify that local elections be in odd-numbered years, as is now done in Baltimore City.

6. Ownership of Property. Ownership of property could not be established as a prerequisite to voting or holding of office, except in the special case of non-resident property owners in towns and cities. Those Maryland towns which now require property ownership for voting or holding of office would find this election ordinance unconstitutional if the new Constitution is adopted. 



St. Joe's committed 24 fouls and consequently suffered their worst defeat of the season losing to the Knights of Middletown, 87-60, in a basketball game played this week.


Marty Williams and Mark Gelwicks sat on the bench for over a quarter of the contest and the Knights took control of the boards in the second and third quarter to coast to victory.
