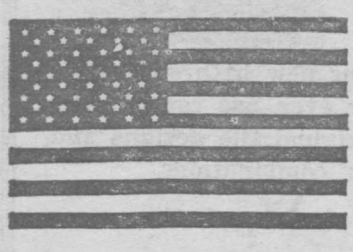

**Chamber of Commerce Hears Committee Report At Meeting**

A progress report of the Recreational Committee was presented at the regular meeting of the Emmitsburg Chamber of Commerce held Monday evening in the Emmitt House, Mrs. Jane Bolinger, president, presiding. The Recreational Committee report was presented by Sister Margaret Hickey, St. Joseph's Provincial House. Sister Margaret explained that drawings of the local recreational area which would include a swimming pool, had been submitted to the Potomac Edison Co. which will send representatives here to measure the site and develop a functional design. Further contact with that company is planned early in January.

The Chamber of Commerce voted to hold its 50-50 drawing on January 1 at some local civic club. G. Eugene Rosensteel, chairman of a committee studying picnic recreational areas where motorists could pull off the highway and enjoy a rest or eat lunch, reported he was in contact with the proper authorities and that the future of the project was bright and encouraging. **Fire Destroys \$30,000 Barn Near Here**

Fire completely destroyed a large barn on the property of George G. Kramer, Tract Road, Monday night. John Murren, Adams County fire marshal, was called to the scene Tuesday morning to begin an investigation as to the origin of the fire.

Approximately 50 firemen from the Emmitsburg and Fairfield departments were summoned about 11:30 p.m. and battled the fire which raged out of control for over three hours.

Fairfield Fire Chief Lawrence Eversole estimated the property damage at \$30,000. The same amount of damage was incurred on the same site when Kramer's bank barn filled with farm equipment and straw was destroyed in an early morning fire on October 31, 1964.

Eversole said the "pole" barn, three miles north of Emmitsburg, was crammed with straw and contained two farm tractors, wagons and other pieces of farm equipment. A number of cattle kept in the barn escaped injury. They were freed before the flames reached their portion of the barn.

A Mrs. Sanders, a tenant in a farmhouse across the road from the barn, discovered flames shooting through the roof of the structure around 11:20 p.m.

Firemen with six pumps poured water on a nearby shed, saving it from fire.

During the fire, flames shot upward of 40 to 60 feet, firemen reported. Emmitsburg firemen remained at the scene until 10 o'clock Tuesday morning.

**Mountaineers Sweep Quantico Tournament**

Mount St. Mary's College basketballers completed a highly successful Quantico Invitational Tourney Saturday night by defeating the host Quantico Marines 86-77. In previous games the Phelamman defeated Ohio Northern, 82-76 last Thursday and on Friday made it two-in-a-row by downing West Virginia State, 96-88.

Saturday's game represented the seventh consecutive win for Coach Jim Phelan's Mountaineers, who will be idle until Wednesday and Thursday, December 27 and 28, when they will take part in the Albright Tournament at Reading. The Mount will open the tournament by meeting Otterbein Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock while Albright opposes Colgate in the second game.

Saturday's win was a difficult one for the Mount as they had to overcome early leads by the Marines several times before pulling away midway in the last half.

Quantico zipped out to a sizzling 15-3 lead in the opening minutes of play and then Fred Carter put on a brilliant shooting display for the Mount. He landed 10 of his 13 goals in the first half on jump shots from all angles of the floor. The Mount moved ahead 49-35 with the half finally ending in a 41-41 deadlock.

Again at the start of the second half the Marines jumped out in front 45-41 before the Mount started to roll. The local outfit moved in front by as much as 14 points before the Marines came back on the shooting of Don Kalinowski who netted five goals.

The Mount was led by Carter who finished with 37 points, 11 of which came on 14 foul tries. Steve Murphy rimmed 19 for the winners. Mt. St. Mary's sank 24 of 35 free tosses while the Marines connected on five of 10.

West Virginia State, beaten only by the Mount this season, took third spot in the tournament by ripping Southampton of Long Island 113-79. In the fifth place game Ohio Northern downed Hampden-Sydney 83-76 and in the seventh place affair Frederick topped New Haven 78-75.

**Constitutional Convention Report**

 Three major changes to Maryland's Declaration of Rights were tentatively adopted last week by the Constitutional Convention.  
 The Declaration of Rights in the State version of the Bill of Rights to the U. S. Constitution.  
 A new "right" was created which sanctions organizing and collective bargaining by all employees. Known informally at the convention as a "Labor Bill of Rights," it extends the right to organize to all persons in the State not covered by the National Labor Relations Act (Wagner Act).  
 It is estimated that the authorization would apply to 135,000 employees of the State, counties, and towns, and more than a half million farm, retail, and service workers. Among the businesses affected are laundries, parking lots, hospitals, farms, restaurants, and other small businesses.  
 All employees in the State would have the right to organize, select a representative to bargain with their employer, and engage in collective bargaining. The em-

ployer would be required to meet the representative, listen to the demands, and bargain in good faith.  
 An amendment to exempt public employees from the provision was defeated 16 to 108.  
 The right to strike is a concomitant of the right to bargain collectively. An amendment prohibiting public employees from striking against the State was defeated on the floor by a large margin after the argument was presented that the General Assembly had the power to enact legislation to protect the public health, safety, and welfare.  
 The exact extent of what effect the new "right" would have on the State will not be apparent until it is operative. The General Assembly will implement it by regulations, and undoubtedly the courts will construe the exact meaning through court cases.  
 The language tentatively adopted by the convention is:  
 "Employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, subject to such procedural regulations as the General Assembly may prescribe by law."  
 A second major change was to add a civil rights plank in the Declaration of Rights.  
 The sentence prohibits "discrimination by the State because of race, color, religion, or national origin."  
 Both this provision and the right to organize come out of committee as minority reports and were accepted by the delegates after presentations on the floor of the convention.  
 The committee in its report had

recommended language similar to the Fourteenth Amendment to the U. S. Constitution which said: "No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor be denied the equal protection of the law."  
 Opponents of the language to be added by the minority argued that its effect would be more far-reaching than that taken by the U. S. Constitution as construed by the Supreme Court and the Constitutions of all other States. They based this argument on the words in the minority report which said that the new policy "will be protection against discrimination—

caused, supported or permitted by the state, its political subdivisions, its agents, servants, licensees, or any other persons operating under its aegis or authority . . ."  
 While some of the proponents of the added language said that its inclusion would make Maryland a leader in the field of civil rights, most of the supporters argued that it changed nothing but should be added to give assurance to groups concerned about their civil rights.  
 As with many sections of the new document, no one can foresee exactly what the effect of the language will be until it has been

construed by the courts after years of litigation.  
 A third major change is the extension of the prohibition against unreasonable search and seizure to include interception of communications by wiretapping, electronic bugging, or other means. Interception of communications would be permitted only when a court authorized a search warrant obtained for probable cause.







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provide for separation of church and State in almost identical language as the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution: "No law shall be made respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." While some delegates favored a strict prohibition against State aid to church-related institutions, the committee recommendation was accepted after very brief discussion on the floor. New York's new Constitution was recently defeated after a church-State controversy overshadowed the other provisions in the document.

The issue of abolishment of capital punishment was apparently laid to rest when the committee decided early in the convention that the subject was a statutory

and not a constitutional matter. The subject was not mentioned during debate on the floor last week.

Minor Changes. Other articles in the Declaration of Rights continue freedom of speech and press, the right to peaceably assemble, and the other traditional guarantees.

Among the changes in the eleven-section article are:

Juries. The legislature may provide for a jury of six for cases at the District (lowest) court level, but all other juries would consist of twelve persons. Unanimous verdicts would still be required for conviction in all jury trials.

Double Jeopardy. For the first time, Maryland's Constitution

would prohibit double jeopardy (more than one trial for the same criminal offense). Prohibition against double jeopardy, with exceptions, has in the past been provided by law.

Eminent Domain. The right of the State to take private property for public use (power of eminent domain) would be continued. However, the State would be liable to property owners not only for property actually taken but also for "damages."

The addition of this provision would permit property owners to recover from the State if they could prove damage even if their property were not taken.

Opponents argued that this new provision would open the floodgates to litigation and cost the taxpayers millions of dollars. Proponents argued that people whose property was devalued by action of the State should be compensated.

The committee recommendation stood after two close votes on the subject.

Voting And Elections. Late last week the convention tentatively adopted new provisions for voting and elections.

Probably the most significant change was the reduction of the minimum voting age from 21 to 19. If the new Constitution is adopted, Maryland will be one of only five States that have a minimum voting age below 21. The minimum age is 18 in Georgia and Kentucky, 19 in Alaska, and 20 in Hawaii. It is estimated that the reduction will give approximately 125,000 more Marylanders the right to vote.

Other changes tentatively approved by the convention are:

1. Residency Requirements Cut in Half. The length of residency to be eligible to vote has been reduced from one year to six months in the State, and from six months to three months in the House of Delegates district or county.

If a person moves within the State, he may vote in the area from which he moved for three months thereafter. The purpose of this is to prevent a person from being disfranchised because

he moves from one place to another in the State. The General Assembly is directed to establish lesser residency requirements to permit recent arrivals in the State to vote for President and Vice President. Recently the legislature established this residency requirement at 45 days.

2. Residents on Federal Property. For the first time, persons residing on land over which the Federal government has jurisdiction will be eligible to vote if they meet other requirements. Places cited as being affected by this change were the U. S. Naval Academy, Perry Point Veterans Administration Hospital, Agriculture Research Center in Prince George's county, National Naval Medical Center in Montgomery county, U. S. Public Health Service and Veterans Administration Hospital in Baltimore City.

3. Disqualifications from Voting. The General Assembly would have the option of establishing disqualifications from voting because of mental incompetence and conviction for serious crimes, and would be required to provide for later removal of the disqualifications. This is a major change from the present Constitution which provides that no person convicted of serious crime may vote unless pardoned by the Governor, and that mentally incompetent persons shall not vote.

4. Municipal Elections. Qualifications for municipal elections may be established by the towns and cities subject to standards prescribed by the General Assembly, but no municipality could require a minimum age of more than 19 nor a residency requirement of more than one year. The practice of some towns to permit non-resident property owners to vote would be allowed, unless the practice was prohibited by the General Assembly.

5. Date of Elections. General elections would continue in even-numbered years, but the General Assembly or county governments could specify that local elections be in odd-numbered years, as is now done in Baltimore City.

6. Ownership of Property. Ownership of property could not be established as a prerequisite to voting or holding of office, except in the special case of non-resident property owners in towns and cities. Those Maryland towns which now require property ownership for voting or holding of office would find this election ordinance unconstitutional if the new Constitution is adopted.

Local Affairs Commission. The convention recently adopted a resolution urging the Governor to establish a Commission on Local Affairs. The purpose of the commission would be to assist in implementing the provisions on

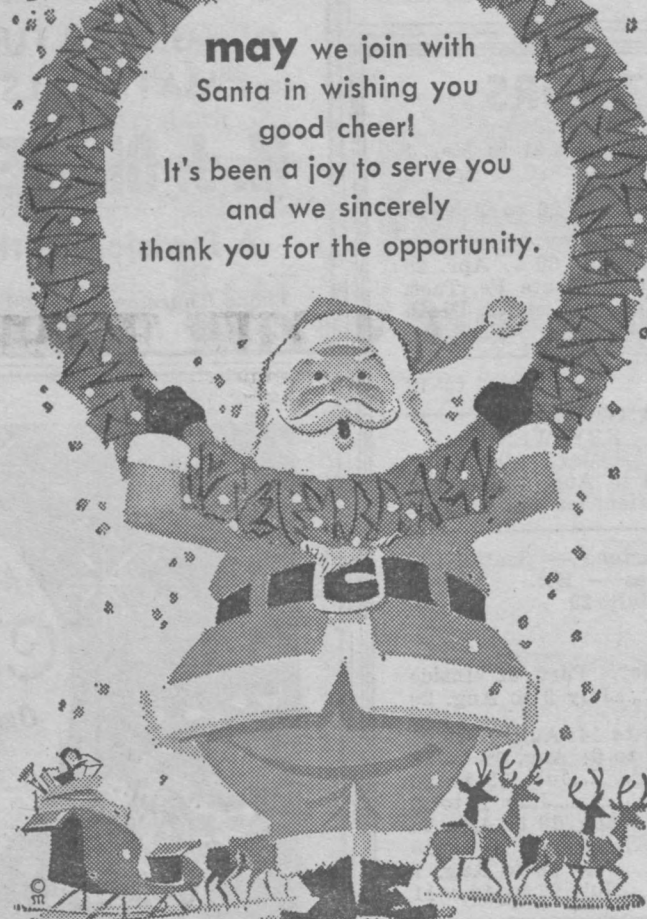

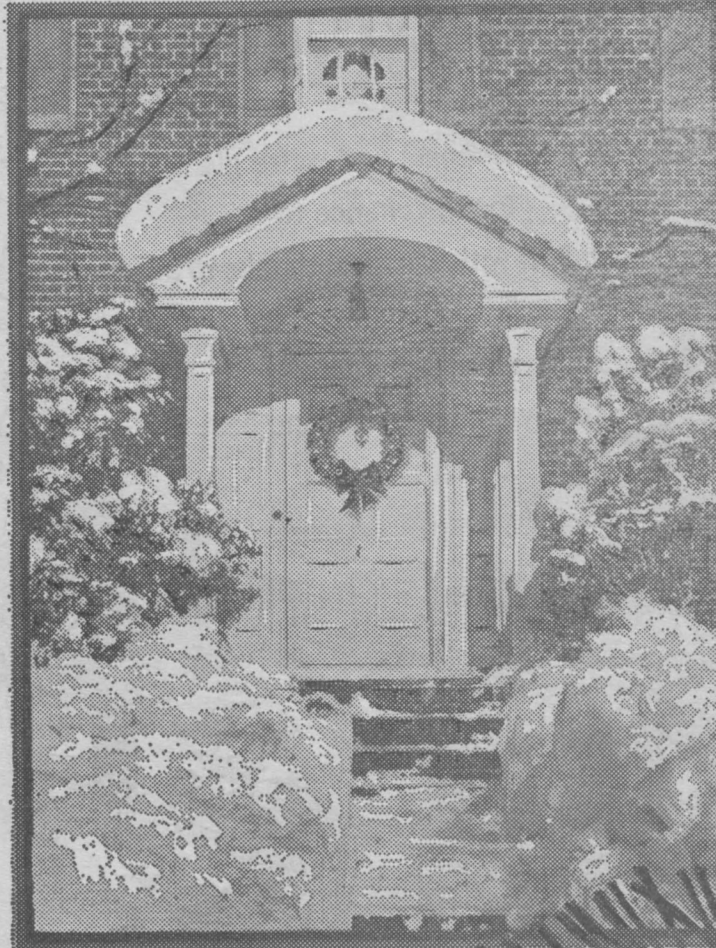
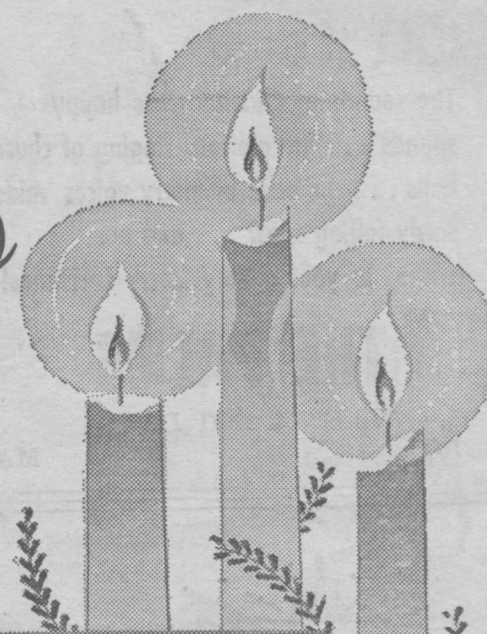

The delegates to the convention are working long hours in an effort to finish most of the preliminary work before Christmas. There are still seven Committee reports to receive initial consideration by all the delegates sitting as a Committee of the Whole.

Until this preliminary consideration is out of the way, the convention can spend little time on the next phase—reconsideration of its initial actions by a second reading of sections after editing by the Committee on Style.

Only four short articles have received a second reading. All were approved without change, al-

though three amendments were considered.

It appears as if the delegates will get off only from Friday, December 22, through Tuesday, December 26.

The final deadline for the convention is January 12.

**Safety Stressed During Holidays**

Last year in the State of Maryland over the three-day Christmas Holiday weekend there were 925 automobile accidents in which 452 people were killed and injured.

Drinking and speed are two factors listed as a frequent holiday death cause. An interesting fact relating to both of the above accident causes is that drivers

involved in both speeding and drinking accidents have had previous moving violations on their records; in other words, they are accident repeaters.

Therefore, it is particularly important during the holiday season ahead that we all watch out for others and be alert to holiday hazards. Marty Williams and Mark Gelwicks sat on the bench for over a quarter of the contest and the Knights took control of the boards in the second and third quarter to coast to victory.

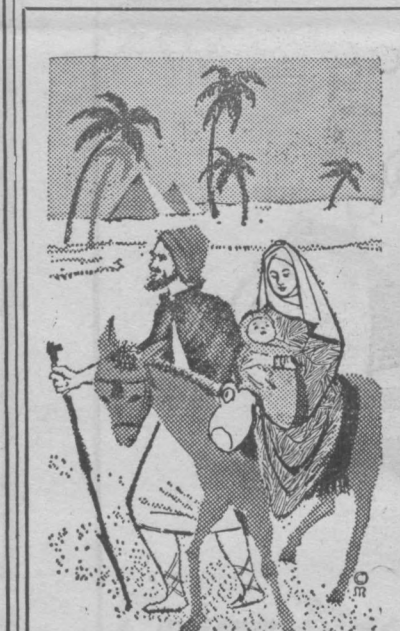
Gelwicks with 15, and Williams with 13, led the Trojans. Middletown also won the JV game 45 to 42.

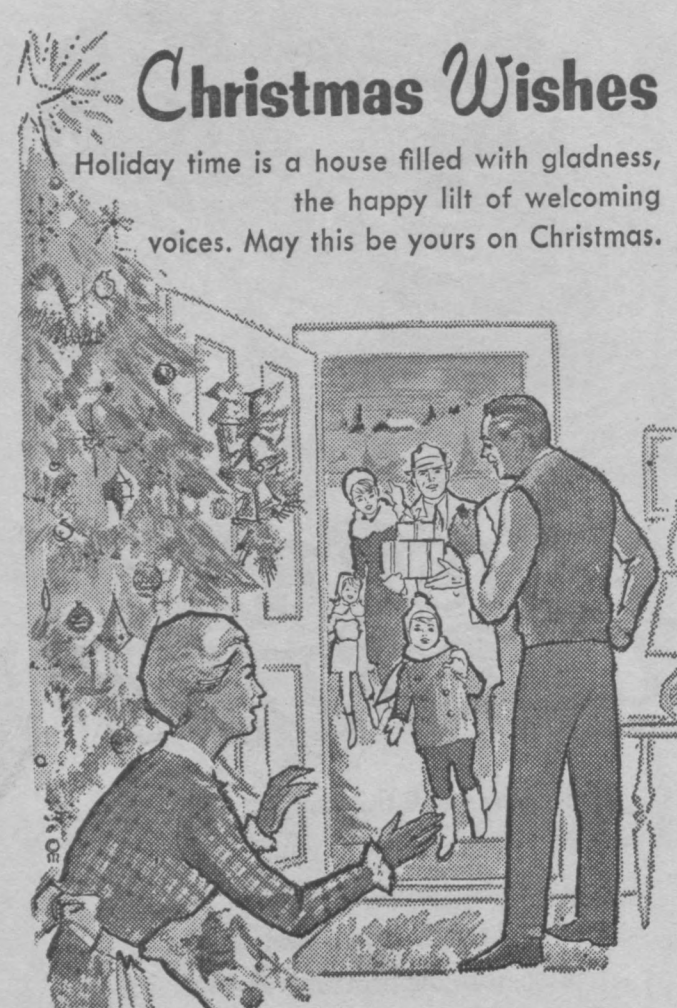
