"Bacteriology," by Barnes and Noble. Principles and Practice including questions from State and National Board Examinations.

"Science and Technology at Fort Detrick, 1943-1968." A memento of the Silver Anniversary of Fort Detrick. The contents include the War Years—the Aftermath, the postwar years, reorganization, expansion of facilities, Animal Dis-

ease Research, etc.

"The Second Skin," by Marilyn J. Horn. An interdisciplinary study of clothing. Interrelationship of clothing and culture—clothing and human behavior— aesthetics and dress, clothing and the physical self—clothing in the economy—acquisition and use of clothing.

"The Book of Religious Holidays and Celebrations," by Marguerite Ickis. Jewish Holy days— Festival Cycles, Christmas Cycle, Easter Cycle, Pentecost Cycle, Religious Drama, Biblical Gardens. From the rich traditions of the Jewish and Christian faiths, the book presents pageants, ceremonies, rituals, drama, folk dances and music, with the stories of their origins, which are used in the active observance of the respective faiths, including as well some of the celebrations from the

Orient.  
"Thirty Days to Better English," by Norman Lewis. A noted teacher, author and editor

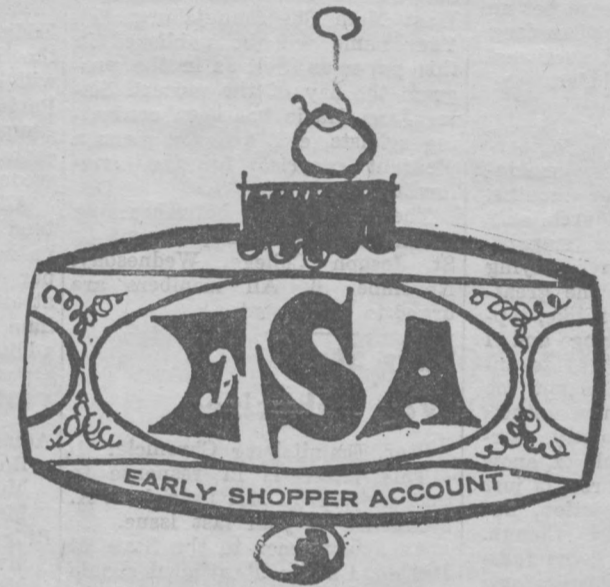

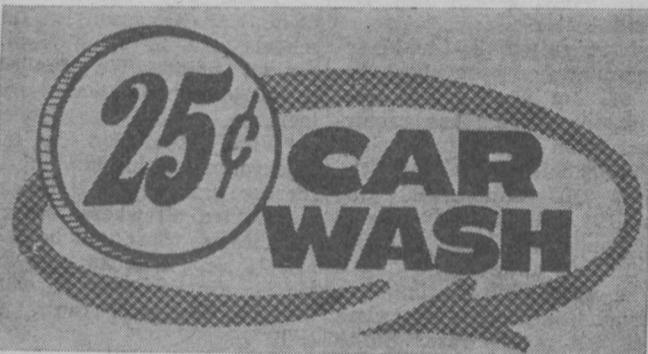

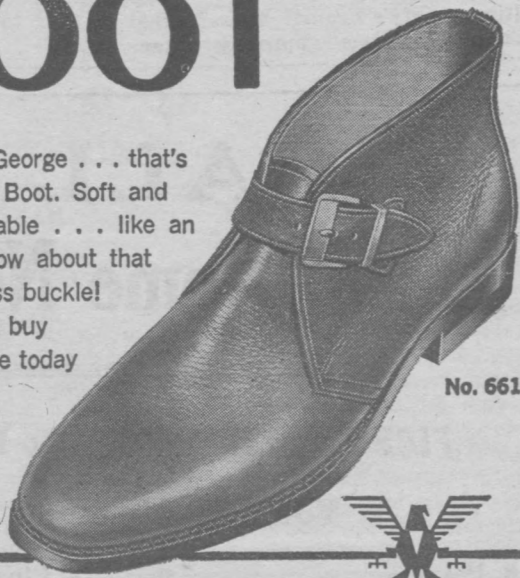

**Two Faces Hath Evil**  
Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev went home to the Kremlin from his triumphant American visit in the fall of 1959 laughing at the ease with which he had again deceived U. S. leaders, the American press and perhaps the majority of the American people. He had been entertained in the White House, with a champagne dinner, wine and dined and paraded across America acting like a friendly country bumpkin. A smiling U. S. President had presented him a personal gift—a helicopter.

The value in prestige to World Communism of this triumph at the White House, in Congress and in most of the world press (with editorials warming up to Khrushchev) was incalculable; and it was devastating to the spirit and hopes of all the millions held in varying degrees of slavery by the Communists.

**The Real Khrushchev**  
Because Lenin's technique for world conquest called for keeping the enemy "off balance"—with periods of dramatic "peace making" followed by periods of terror and expansion, a technique followed successfully by

all Soviet dictators—the "spirit of Camp David" between President Eisenhower and Premier Khrushchev lasted just eight months. Then Khrushchev—who had ordered the tank-led Soviet Army to crush out Hungarian resistance to slavery and who subsequently put on the mask of good will on his trip through America—shocked our governmental leadership with a display of venom against President Eisenhower and the U. S. His attack scuttled a scheduled (May 1960) Paris "Summit" meeting. (We are continuing here to cite the history of America's forgiving and forgetting the evil deeds and the true nature of Communism.)

After the tirades in Paris, Khrushchev and his Krmelin cohorts decided to display to the world the power and unity of World Communism. Talking loudly about the necessity for world disarmament (again the propaganda of "Peace") Khrushchev ordered his satellite puppets to gather with him at the annual U. N. General Assembly meeting in New York.

Jumping through the hoop held by the Soviet boss, as Khrushchev made a circus-like shambles of the U. N., were such beneficiaries of U. S. billions in aid money calculated by our foreign policy "experts" to alienate them from the Soviets as:

**Puppets On Strings**  
Marshal Josif Brozovitch, called "Tito", Communist President of Communist Yugoslavia, whose Communist dictatorship had benefitted to the tune of \$2 billion in U. S. "aid", Tito, with some of the "liberal" press aghast, backed Khrushchev's plan designed to give the Soviets greater control over U. N. activities.

Jawaharlal Nehru, Prime Minister of India, whose nation had received more than \$4 billion U. S. "aid" and who personally had been lionized in the U. S. press. Nehru joined with the Moscow puppets to sponsor a reorganization of the U. N., as Khrushchev demanded, and a forced Summit meeting on disarmament, as Khrushchev demanded.

Kwame Nkrumah, Communist President of Ghana, whom the U. S. had aided to power and whose nation had benefitted from hundreds of millions of U. S. "aid". He supported Khrushchev's moves all the way thru the U. N.

Fidel Castro, Communist Cuba, whose seizure of Cuba could not have happened without U. S. aid. At the U. N. session he showed himself to be a Soviet puppet. (He had been entertained royally in the U. S.—as a "reformer", and a non-Communist.)

Ahmed Sukarno, President of Indonesia, whose constant bootlicking of the U. S. S. R. had not slowed the flow of U. S. millions into his hands (total U. S. "aid" to Sukarno: approximately \$2 billion.) At the U. N. he did what Khrushchev commanded. (His own people later got rid of Sukarno and his largely Communist dictatorship.)

Other puppets displaying themselves in Khrushchev's circus at the U. N. were: Janos Kadar, First Secretary of the Hungarian Communist Party (boss of Hungary); Mehmet Shehu, Red Albanian Premier; Gamal Abdel Nasser, President, United Arab Republic; Wladyslaw Gomulka, Red Poland's Communist boss; Antonin Novotny, Communist President of Czechoslovakia; Todor Zhivkov, top Bulgarian Red; Nikolai V. Podgorny, Communist boss of the Ukraine; Krill T. Mazurov, Communist Premier of Byelorussia; George Gheorghiu-Dej, Red Boss of Rumania.

This was the monolith of Communist power, put through

a circus routine by the ring master, Khrushchev, in one of the most obnoxious U. N. sessions ever witnessed. Yet, in America today, the Soviet image is getting still another white - washing, even after a second murdering of Czechoslovakia.

### Writer Predicts Wallace Loss

At this date both Nixon and Humphrey have announced—for public consumption—that they will not deal with Wallace for electoral votes. And yet—at this very moment—it is reliably reported that Strom Thurmond—Nixon's Lieutenant—has approached Wallace electors with the proposition that they vote for Nixon if Wallace fails.

The just and gentlemanly thing for Wallace electors to do is this: Announce such contingent intentions now! In this manner they will be placing their cards on the table, and will forever after be free of charges that they deceived the country and their constituents. I do predict however, that on the eve of the election, and before the country can react—generally against Nixon, as it should—the electors of a small number of states—maybe only Alabama—will make a public, or semi-public announcement that they will cast

Speeding
One of the problems involved in a discussion of "speeding" is the difficulty of defining a term that is a "relative" concept.

This "relative" quality can be illustrated easily. Driving 60 mph on a clear day under optimum conditions on an expressway could hardly be called speeding; driving at the same 60 mph through a metropolitan school zone certainly is speeding.

The concept of "speeding is not limited to the act of exceeding a

speed limit. Perhaps it would be more comprehensive to use the terms "safe speed" and "unsafe speed." A safe speed is one adjusted to potential hazards of road and traffic conditions, while at the same time allowing for the limitations of the driver and his vehicle. Any speed which does not meet this definition is an unsafe speed.

Posted speeds are designed to serve under optimum driving conditions; but optimum conditions do not always prevail. It is the responsibility of each driver to adjust his speed to any factor or combination of factors which determine safe speed.

These factors may be divided into three major classes: the driver; the vehicle; and the environment (road and traffic conditions).

The Driver
Some limitations on the driver

are temporary; fatigue, effects of drugs, alcohol, etc. Others are of a more permanent nature: slower reaction due to age, for example.

Also, there are certain limitations which impose themselves on all drivers, such as the laws of physics and biology.

In any event, the driver must take into consideration his known limitations in determining a safe speed (i.e., if he is aged, or tired), or indeed in deciding not to drive at all (if, say, he has been drinking). All other things being equal, a driver whose ability is impaired in any way requires a lower safe driving speed than one whose ability is not.

The Vehicle
It is the responsibility of the driver to safety-check his own vehicle frequently. If, for instance, a car's brakes are operating at reduced efficiency, the driver must certainly lower his safe-speed limit until he reaches a garage for repairs.

The Environment
Of the three classes, this is the least subject to the driver's immediate control. The environment includes such factors as: highway construction and maintenance, weather, visibility limitations (as in fog or darkness), and traffic volume. Some of these limitations are fairly permanent (sharp curves), and some are transient (heavy traffic).

In any case, the driver must remember that he does not drive in a vacuum. Every highway situation offers potential hazards requiring speed adjustments. The same driver in the same car on the same road will drive a little slower at night than in the day, although the legal speed limit on the road remains constant. And, parallel to what we have seen

above, when environmental conditions become extreme, such as in a very severe snow storm, no speed at all may be the only safe speed.

Over and above these considerations are the limitations imposed upon all drivers and all vehicles by the laws of biology and physics—the amount of time between a driver's observation of a hazard and his defensive actions—his reaction time. Generally it takes about 1/4th of a second for a driver to react. This means that his car will travel 11 feet for each ten miles per hour of speed.

At 30 miles an hour his car will travel 33 feet before his foot hits the brake, and at 60 miles per hour his car will travel 66 feet before he can brake it to a stop.

This time lapse must be taken into account by drivers in adjusting their speed, particularly when following other vehicles, to avoid rear-end collisions.

There is, finally, one certain determinant of safe speed which must not be over-looked. It is the law. A safe speed may be less than the legal speed limit, but it may never be greater. Exceeding the speed limit is speeding, and is in direct violation of the law.

Maryland Motorists Require Snow Treads For Hazardous Driving

Motorists will soon begin to "winterize" their cars against the severe weather conditions which sometimes come to Maryland as early as November.

A major consideration for safer driving in snow and ice is the annual changeover to snow tread tires.

Under Maryland Law, the State

Roads Commission has the authority to designate snow emergency routes and the Superintendent of the Maryland State Police has the authority to designate emergency conditions.

When snow emergencies are announced, motorists can use the designated snow emergency routes only if their cars are equipped with snow tires or chains. An early changeover to snow tread tires is good insurance against a possible violation of the Law, should a sudden turn of the weather require an emergency announcement.

There are three methods of designating snow tires:

- 1) "Those tires which are normally designated by the manufacturer as snow tires or,
2) Such tires as may be approved by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles as meeting the standards of effectiveness required of normally designated snow tires or,
3) Tires which have anti-skid patterns cut into the treaded surfaces to form bars, buttons or blocks especially designed to give effective traction on snow or ice covered streets and highways and shall be in good state of repair."

Most snow tires now in use during the winter months in Maryland as considered acceptable because they have been designated as snow tires by the manufacturer or because they have anti-skid patterns cut into the tread to give greater traction.

Because no performance standards for snow tires have been established by the tire industry or by the Federal Government's Department of Transportation, the Department of Motor Vehicles has not approve any specific tires as snow tires.

Some tires are being marketed as snow tires, using a card certification that states they are "comparable" to snow tires. However, DMV has not given its blessing to this type of certification because of the difficulties of enforcing due to its inconsistency with established practices of nor-

mally designating snow tires by imprint on sidewalls.

When industry, or the Federal Department of Transportation, establishes performance standards for snow tires, a specific designation for approval will be authorized by this Department.

Thus, manufacturers of such products as radial tires will be able to merchandise these items for both conventional use and as snow tires, provided of course, they meet the approved performance standards.

Baltimore City's Transit & Traffic Commission has approved a

specified type of cross-grooving for BTC buses and recently has given approval for several makes of radial tires to be used as snow tires for city driving.

1968 PROCLAMATION OF THE GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND DIRECTING THE PUBLICATION OF BILLS PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND

WHEREAS, at its regular session of 1967, the General Assembly enacted Chapters 245 and 474 proposing amendments to the Constitution of Maryland; and
WHEREAS, at its regular session of 1968, the General Assembly enacted Chapter 617, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Maryland; and
WHEREAS, it is the duty of the Governor, under Section 1 of Article XIV of the Constitution, to order the publication of the bills proposing said amendments in advance of the General Election of November 5th, 1968; and
WHEREAS, there will be presented on the ballot at said election the following proposed amendments to the Constitution for adoption or rejection by the voters:

CHAPTER 245
AN ACT TO PROPOSE AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND, TITLE "Legislative Department," by adding thereto and adding thereto, to follow immediately after Section 40C thereof, providing for an optional procedure for the acquisition of land and interest in land by the Board of County Commissioners for Prince George's County for the construction or extension of county roads and streets, providing for a contingency by which this amendment may be void and of no further effect and providing for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for their adoption or rejection.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (Three-fifths of all the Members elected to each of the two Houses concurring), That the following new Section 40D be and it is hereby proposed as an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Legislative Department," to follow immediately after Section 40C thereof; if adopted by the legal and qualified voters of the State as herein provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland.

The General Assembly shall enact no law authorizing private property to be taken for public use without just compensation, to be agreed upon between the parties or awarded by a jury, being first paid or tendered to the party entitled to such compensation, except that where such property, located in Prince George's County, is in the judgment of the Board of County Commissioners of Prince George's County needed for the construction or extension of county roads and streets, the General Assembly may provide that such property, except a building occupied as a dwelling, may be taken immediately upon payment therefor by the condemning authority to the owner or owners thereof or into the Court to the use of the person or persons entitled thereto, such amount as the condemning authority shall estimate to be the fair value of said property, provided such legislation requires that the condemning authority's estimate be not less than the appraised value of the property being taken as evaluated by at least one qualified appraiser, whose qualifications have been accepted by a Court of Record of this State, and also requires the payment of any further sum that may subsequently be awarded by a jury. This section, if adopted by the voters in the year 1968, at the time it becomes effective, is void and of no further effect if the voters of the State prior thereto have adopted a revision of the Constitution of Maryland proposed by a Constitutional Convention.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State shall, at the next general election, to be held in this State in the year 1968, be submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For Constitutional Amendment" and "Against Constitutional Amendment," as now prescribed by law, and immediately after said election, due returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article 14 of the Constitution, and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article 14.

EXPLANATION: Italics indicate new matter added to existing law. [Brackets] indicate matter stricken from existing law. CAPITALS indicate amendments to bill.

CHAPTER 474
AN ACT TO PROPOSE AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 40A OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND, TITLE "Legislative Department," to provide a procedure for the immediate TAKING of private property for public use in Anne Arundel County, providing for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for their adoption or rejection, and providing for a contingency by which this amendment may be void and of no further effect.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (Three-fifths of all the Members elected to each of the two Houses concurring), That the following new Section 40D be and it is hereby proposed as an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Legislative Department," to follow immediately after Section 40C thereof; if adopted by the legal and qualified voters of the State as herein provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (Three-fifths of all the Members elected to each of the two Houses concurring), That Section 31A of Article IV of the Constitution of MARYLAND, TITLE "JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT," BE AND IT IS HEREBY REPEALED AND THAT SECTION 31 THEREOF BE AND IT IS HEREBY REPEALED AND REENACTED, WITH AMENDMENTS, THE SAME IF ADOPTED BY THE LEGAL AND QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE STATE, AS HEREWITHTH PROVIDED, TO BECOME A PART OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND, AND TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

THERE SHALL BE ELECTED BY THE LEGAL AND QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SAID CITY THE NUMBER OF ASSOCIATE JUDGES REQUIRED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY WHO, TOGETHER, SHALL CONSTITUTE THE SUPREME BENCH OF BALTIMORE CITY, AND SHALL HOLD THEIR OFFICES FOR THE TERM OF FIFTEEN YEARS, SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS CONSTITUTION WITH REGARD TO THE ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS OF JUDGES, AND THEIR REMOVAL FROM OFFICE AND SHALL EXERCISE THE JURISDICTION HEREINAFTER SPECIFIED, AND SHALL EACH RECEIVE AN ANNUAL SALARY WHICH SHALL NOT BE DIMINISHED DURING THEIR TERM OF OFFICE.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State shall be, at the next general election, to be held in this State in the year 1968, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For Constitutional Amendment" and "Against Constitutional Amendment," as now prescribed by law, and immediately after said election, due returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article 14 of the Constitution and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article 14.

EXPLANATION: Italics indicate new matter added to existing law. [Brackets] indicate matter stricken from existing law. CAPITALS indicate amendments to bill.
NOW, THEREFORE, I, SPIRO T. AGNEW, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, by virtue of the power and authority conferred upon me by the Constitution of Maryland, do hereby, by this proclamation, ORDER that the bills proposing the foregoing amendments shall be published in at least two newspapers in each County where so many more than one may be published, then in that newspaper, and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, once a week for four weeks immediately preceding the General Election to be held on November 5th, 1968, at which Election the proposed amendments shall be submitted, in the form prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State for adoption or rejection.

## Catoctin High First To Have Math Lab

Catoctin High School will be the first school in Frederick County to have a mathematics laboratory according to Robert Lambdin, Chairman of the Mathematics Department at Thurmont High School. Explaining the use of a mathematics laboratory in a modern high school, Lambdin said that at the Catoctin School the mathe-

matics laboratory will not represent a departure from the traditional methods of teaching mathematics, but will supplement the basic curriculum. A portion of the laboratory will be devoted to individual study areas where the student may pursue on his own an interest that he may have in a specific branch of mathematics. To encourage this interest, there will be available several types of computers, film-strips with records designed for individual use, a programmed learning machine

of the instant response-feedback type, a varied library of resource materials, and other devices designed to encourage individual discovery in mathematics.

According to Lambdin, some of the computers are of a fairly sophisticated nature. By the addition of a programming device, the computer has the ability to accept a program of up to 80 steps. The computers are designed expressly for high school use and a workbook is provided which enables the teacher to coordinate the curriculum with specific sections in the book. The computer can be used to supplement the curriculum at all levels, from the general mathematics classes in the 9th grade to the advanced math of the 12th grade. Also available will be a computer trainer which, through a series of step-by-step manual operations, will enable the student to understand how a typical digital computer works.

Speaking of other parts of the laboratory, Lambdin said that in addition to the individual stations, there will be several locations where as many as six students can work together. Through the use of an overhead projector, tape recorder, and an earphone junction box, the student will see, listen, and respond (on paper) to the lesson being taught. All of this will be accomplished without disturbing the other students in the laboratory. At another group station, the students will be able to use an 8mm film loop projector, a device which is capable of showing on 8mm film a single "bit" of information, which can then be repeated over and over without the mechanical disadvantages of an open reel machine. The remaining space in the lab is devoted to a storage section, a display case, a two table reading-

study area, and several teachers' desks.

According to Lambdin, a mathematics laboratory is not a new concept in teaching, with approximately 25% of the high schools in the United States now having one. This laboratory is designed to be flexible both in terms of materials available and physical facilities. Lambdin concluded by saying "A mathematics laboratory is a necessary part of the mathematics curriculum in a modern high school."

Louise Weagly, Mathematics Supervisor, commenting on how the mathematics laboratory at Catoctin fits into the total picture for Frederick County said, "Tom Rowan, Supervisor of Mathematics for the Maryland State Department of Education, and I have been working to get such a facility in Frederick County. I see this laboratory as a first step toward a comprehensive program to teach the use of computers through the mathematics program. There is a feeling among authorities that the area of mathematics is the primary place to begin computer instruction. We want Frederick County to be able to participate when computer terminal installations are available for instructional use. These installations are presently available in a number of other systems in the United States. We should begin making use of computers as quickly as possible if the mathematics instruction of Frederick County children is to be as good as that in other school systems."

Marvin Spencer, Science Supervisor for the Frederick County School System, agreed. "In addition," he said, "there will be many times in Chemistry and Physics courses where the mathematics laboratory can be used to

advantage. The equipment can be a real time saver with complex Chemistry and Physics calculations. Further, skills developed in operating this equipment can be of use to the student after graduation."

Catoctin High School now under construction near Thurmont will be ready for occupancy February 1, 1969. Students from Emmitsburg High School and Thurmont High School will make up the student body.

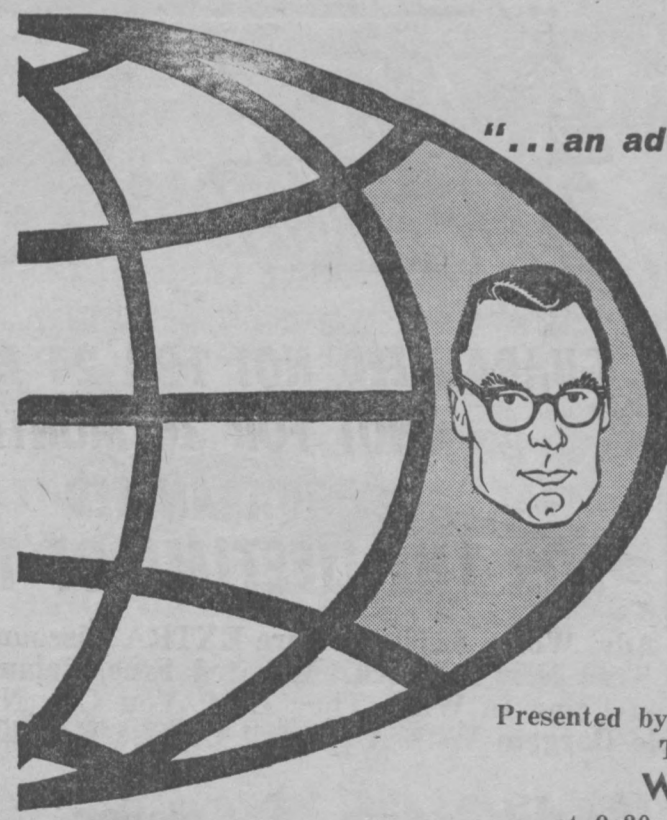

**BABSON'S POINT OF VIEW**

The Nation's Fate Rides On Your Vote  
WELLESLEY HILLS, Mass., October 31 — Five days from now, the popular balloting for President of the United States will take place in every corner of the nation. But, conceivably, we may not know until some time in January who the next Chief Executive will be. It could be that close!  
**Forming A Consensus**  
Following the party conven-

tions this summer, disaffection and dissatisfaction with the nominees was widespread among Republicans, Democrats, and others not normally hard-and-fast adherents of either party. Differences of opinion within the ranks of Democrats were more noticeably than among Republicans, though many staunch Republicans were dismayed at the choice of Governor Agnew for second spot on that ticket. And literally millions of Americans, of differing political persuasions, have been unhappy because they could detect little distinction in what they regarded as the "hawkish" views of Messrs. Humphrey, Nixon, and Wallace on the Vietnam issue. Many citizens are reportedly so wrought up that they may not vote at all. But as each day passes, more and more undecided voters are reaching a decision. The spread between the two leading candidates has apparently narrowed and there is some reason to believe the third candidate reached a popularity peak some time ago. Right now, additional millions of voters are swinging toward a choice.

Is A Deadlock Likely?  
At this writing, no man knows how close this election will actually turn out to be. But we do know that the cleavages over law and order, Vietnam, foreign aid, civil rights, and the war on poverty will cause more cross-switching by voters than normally occurs. We also know that ex-Gov. Wallace has attracted more voter interest and support than any third-party candidate within memory.

The Wallace strength and these cross-trends within the major parties could make for a deadlock in the electoral college, even if one of the three candidates should attain a majority of the popular vote. For it is in the electoral college that the final decision will be made.  
**General Electoral Procedure**  
When we make our ballot choice for President and Vice President, we are actually selecting a slate of electors who will presumably favor our chosen candidates. The electors from each state equal in number the Senators and Representatives from that state. Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, the Canal Zone, and Guam have no electoral vote; but the District of Columbia does have 3 votes. Hence, the full complement of the electoral college is 538, with 270 votes needed to elect.

The electors cast their votes in their respective states on the Monday following the second Wednesday in December (Dec. 16 this year). If no presidential candidate receives 270 votes when the ballots are opened by the President of the Senate on January 6, 1969 and tallied . . . in the presence of the Senate and the House of Representatives . . . the House then chooses a President from among the three candidates having the greatest number of electoral votes, with each state having but one vote and with 26 needed to elect. The Senate picks the Vice President from among the two candidates having the greatest number of electoral votes, with each Senator having

one vote and with 51 needed to elect.  
**Importance Of One Vote**  
Voter disagreement with this year's presidential candidates on particular issues is loud and sharp. Hence, it is feared that many voters may stay away from the polls to avoid having to make a decision. Such a course, however, would be hypocritical and cowardly. We contribute to the welfare of the nation by our vote. We do not deserve our rights and privileges—our freedoms—as American citizens unless we are willing to use that franchise. The importance of our vote, in fact, cannot be overstressed. The life of our Republic depends upon it.

**Schools To Get 3 Extra Holidays**

The Board of Education announced this week the dates of the first of three in-service days provided for in this year's school calendar. The three in-service days will occur, one in November, one in March, and the last in May. These in-service days are in the school calendar this year to give faculties time to work on school problems, organization and in-service training. The calendar was arranged so that these days do not result in a decrease in the number of days students spend in school. The objective is better education for children.

All of the schools in the county will not close on the same day. However, the schools in an articulation area will all close on the same day. An articulation area is made up of a high school and all of the elementary schools that send children to this high school. For example, Middletown High School is fed by the Wolfsville, Myersville, and Middletown Elementary Schools; so all of these schools will close on the same day. A similar situation will exist for the other high schools in the county. On the day a high school is closed all the elementary schools feeding children to that school will also be closed.

College Okays Campus Drinking

The governing board of Washington College at Chestertown has adopted a new college policy on the use of alcoholic beverages that will permit students who are 21 years old—the legal age in Maryland—to drink on the campus.

Acting on the recommendation of a committee composed of students, faculty and administrative officers, the Board of Visitors and Governors of the private, coed college approved the policy without dissent. The change, however, will not become effective until appropriate regulations and standards are drawn up.

In announcing its action, the Board cautioned the 610 students currently enrolled with a statement that anyone found to be intoxicated on the campus will be subject to severe disciplinary action.

The recommendation adopted by the Board also was unanimously approved by the Alumni Council of the college.

The conditions upon which the new policy will become effective will be drawn up by a committee composed by the dean of the college, the deans of men and women, alumni director, students representing campus judiciary boards and members of the faculty.

College Drama Club To Present Farce Nov. 8-9

"Lysistrata"—a bold and rollicking farce by Aristophanes, will be presented by the Drama Club of St. College on the evenings of Nov. 8-9 at 8:30 o'clock in DePaul Auditorium.

The play, which has been staged by Gary Vena, director of drama at the college, speaks particularly well to the contemporary world of its comic consideration of civil disorder, anti-war demonstrations and pickets for peace.

Written by the Greek satirist in the fifth century B. C., "Lysistrata" is a pacifist play about the problem of "bringing the men home" from war.

The title role in the production, which features an all-woman cast, will be played by Lindanne Hawkins, of Lynchburg, Va.
