It appears that bona-fide newspapers are about the only moral literature remaining for people to read or see these days. With the maze of obscene and pornographic literature floating around these days, and with "dirty" underground newspapers being published by the Hip-pies, the general public is almost smothered with smut. It is downright revolting to read the theater advertisements. The theaters must be hard up for business because of the excessive use of sex in the films. Just take any newspaper advertisement in the theater section of a newspaper and watch the illustrations and the artwork. Almost invariably, the show is advertised as suited for adult viewing, or no one under 18 will be admitted. Emmitsburg needs a stiff curfew law so that officers can deal with situations which occur here. There hardly seems any excuse not to have such a law here in Emmitsburg where the out-of-towners and a few local youngsters delight in keeping the whole neighborhood awake these hot evenings. Our officers must have the tools to implement law enforcement and it would behoove the Town of Emmitsburg to come up with an iron-clad, no-loophole curfew law, at once.

Ugh, the first full week of official summer weather is with us, and personally, I don't like it at all. I have never seen so many cloudy days. Many, many times during what should be a bright sunny day, the skies cloud and you would swear it was going to rain cats and dogs. However, in a few minutes the murkiness dissipates and once again we have a hot and burning sun. The rainfall has been almost sufficient recently, but we are still short for the first six months of 1969. Reminds Fireworks Are Illegal

Every Fourth of July celebration must inevitably be followed by a Fifth of July. For several years, hospital reports on injuries caused by the illegal use of fireworks on the "4th" have borne tragic testimony to the painful "5th".

Howard A. Naquin, M.D., President of the Maryland Society for the Prevention of Blindness, urges parents to take the necessary steps to make sure that their children do not have access to fireworks by reporting violations of the Maryland law prohibiting their sale and use except under permit.

Doctor Naquin pointed out that the eyes are particularly vulnerable to injury in fireworks accidents, often resulting in permanently impaired vision or loss of sight.

Truck-Car Hit In Hanover

A truck driven by George G. Bushman, 22, Emmitsburg R3, changing lanes in the one-way section of Frederick St. west of Centennial Ave., Hanover, struck a car operated by Janice C. Robinson, 20, Wilkesboro, N. C., at 3 p.m. Friday, according to Hanover police. Both vehicles were moving east on Frederick when the truck moved from the left to the right lane of traffic, striking the car in the right lane, police said. Damage was estimated at \$100 to the Robinson car and \$25 to the Bushman vehicle, police said.

Chamber Studies Electoral Reform

Electoral College Reform was a topic for discussion by the National Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Commerce of Frederick County at a recent meeting.

Robert Haynes, chairman of the committee said that the committee explored Electoral College reform proposals now pending in Congress and discussed what can be done on the local level to help bring about reform.

Chairman Haynes pointed to the close elections of 1960 and 1968. "With a shift in a few thousand votes in both instances," he said, "the election might have been thrown into the House of Representatives where a Constitutional crisis might have evolved in the event no candidate received the required number of votes."

"The Congress must act favorably on a proposed amendment to the Constitution in this session if the amendment is to be effective in the presidential election of '72. A two-thirds vote is required in the House and Senate and three-fourths of the states must ratify in order to adopt an amendment to the Constitution. This takes time."

"The Congress will act promptly only if the American people become aroused and demand a change in the method by which we elect the President and Vice President."

The grant to Sister Madeleine represents a renewal of the grant awarded her last year. Sister will continue study toward a Ph.D. degree in human relations in home management at Pennsylvania State University.

Over 300 X-rayed Here Last Week

The Mass Survey conducted in the Emmitsburg area on June 17 reported 356 persons availed themselves of chest X-rays. This is one of the many services made possible through the use of Christmas Seals, said Mrs. Freda S. Doll, Executive Director of the Frederick County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association. The survey is a joint project of the TB Association and the Frederick County Health Department—the TB Association conducts the survey and the Health Department follows up with a 14x17" X-ray of all films which show abnormalities; or should the person having an abnormal survey film wish to have the follow-up thru his family physician he may do so. Whichever choice the individual may make in carrying through further diagnosis on the large film, the important step is that a complete follow-up is made.

Over 500 Greet Father Stouter

Rev. Fr. Charles Stouter, C.M., a native of Emmitsburg, and the only living Vincentian Father from St. Joseph's Parish, Emmitsburg, Sunday observed the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood.

He offered a Mass of Thanksgiving at 11:30 Sunday morning in St. Joseph's Church after which he, his relatives and out-of-town guests were given a "brunch" in the Knights of Columbus Home in Emmitsburg. Approximately 200 attended with 62 families represented. Among those present was his only living sister-in-law, Mrs. John D. Stouter of Patterson, N.J. During the observance Guy A. Baker, Jr. gave a short resume of Father's life as a Vincentian.

The brunch was served by the Ladies of Brute, under the direction of Mrs. Stanley McIntyre.

In the evening, at 7:30, Father Stouter was guest of honor at a reception held on the lawn adjoining the rectory. Approximately 350 members of the community turned out to greet the priest.

Music was furnished by the Emmitsburg Municipal Band. Jacob Baker introduced four living former classmates of Father Stouter, all of whom were also members of the Emmitsburg baseball team of which Father Stouter had been a member. They were James Myers, Graceham; James Arnold, Robert Kerrigan and Robert Topper, all of Emmitsburg. During the program, a purse was presented to the priest by the members of the parish.

Born in Emmitsburg on February 7, 1893, Father Stouter was one of a family of six boys and two girls. After attending the local school, he went to Niagara University and in 1913 entered St. Vincent's Seminary in Philadelphia. He was ordained a priest on June 8, 1919. During his 50 years as a missionary, he has served as a missionary in Alabama and Panama, as chaplain in a number of hospitals, and at the Michigan State Prison in Jackson, as chaplain at St. Joseph College and as pastor at St. Joseph's Church, Emmitsburg. He is presently stationed in Brooklyn, N. Y., where he is chaplain at St. Joseph's Orphanage.

Clubs Can Operate Until 1:00 A.M.

Frederick County's new Liquor License Commissioner will consider several applications for licenses to sell beer and prepare for a new liquor law in his first month in office.

A. Irvin Renn, a County Commissioner for ten years, assumed his new office June 1. Renn replaces Dr. Norvell Belt as commissioner.

Louis V. Myers, Jr., County Liquor License Inspector, and Mrs. Caroline Bussard, secretary, continue in their capacities. Also joining the staff is Samuel W. Barrick, Renn's appointee as attorney for the office.

The new law which allows places selling alcoholic beverages the drink to be open until 1 a.m. if they so chose, goes into effect July 1. The law does not include those places selling packaged liquor . . . these must still close at midnight.

Bernard Kaliss New Mount Dean Of Affairs



Mount Saint Mary's College this week announced appointment of Bernard S. Kaliss as dean of academic affairs and Rev. James M. Foraker as dean of student affairs.

Dr. John J. Dillon, Jr., acting executive vice president, said "they are men of great ability and represent a balance of experience and youth which we seek to achieve in all of our administrative appointments."

Mr. Kaliss, succeeding Rev. David W. Shaum, Ph.D., who has completed a two-year term, becomes the first layman to hold the post of dean of academic affairs at Mount Saint Mary's.

Father Shaum continues as professor of music and director of the college glee club.

Father Foraker, as dean of student affairs, fills a newly established position.

"We will work together very closely, and he will have complete authority and responsibility for the student disciplinary-social area, aided by the dean and associate dean of students," Dr. Dillon said.

Mr. Kaliss, a member of the college faculty since 1953, received his B.S. from Mount Saint Mary's and his M.A. from Fordham University. He studied as a Fulbright scholar at Sorbonne (University of Paris) and University of Bordeaux. He has completed all requirements for a Ph.D. except the dissertation at New York University.

During 16 years on the college faculty, Mr. Kaliss has been assigned numerous important academic and professional duties. Most recently he has been chairman of the English department, Fulbright adviser, Danforth adviser, Woodrow Wilson campus representative, foreign student adviser, moderator of the Nutmeg Club, and moderator of Zeta Chapter, Delta Epsilon Sigma. In 1955-56 he served as registrar and assistant dean.

He has served on most of the college committees, including the academic council. He is a member of many learned societies and several scholastic honor societies. He was an organizer of the Mount Saint Mary's Chapter, American Association of University Professors, and served three terms as its president. He has been a contributor to scholarly journals, writing book reviews for "CCCC Journal" and "Choice." He is active in community organizations and is currently treasurer of the Emmitsburg Public Library.

Father Foraker, a native of Bayonne, New Jersey, received his B.A. from Mount Saint Mary's in 1956 and his M.S. from Iona College this month. He was ordained as a priest in June 1960 by the Bishop of Trenton after graduating from Mount Saint Mary's Seminary.

From 1960 to 1967, Father Foraker served as assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church at South Amboy, New Jersey where he combined pastoral work with religious instruction in the parish high school. He was also active in community affairs, serving as a member of the Community Planning Board in New Jersey's anti-poverty program. He is a member of the Academy of Pastoral Counseling.

Father Foraker joined the faculty of Mount Saint Mary's College in September 1967 as an instructor in the department of theology. He has been serving as faculty adviser to the student government.







All of us have had the experience of feeling tired and listless until something happened to awaken our interest and enthusiasm. Where minutes before we felt drained of energy, now we become alive, vital and awake. The source of our energy is God, the power within us. We are continually renewed, refreshed, and restored by His life. Let us give thanks for this.



How can I check the fit of my children's shoes?

There are two simple ways of detecting outgrown shoes. They are not as reliable as having the feet remeasured, but are infinitely surer than the old toe-hunt method which only ruins the toe-box of the shoe.

One is to hold the shoe under a lamp so you can see the foot print on the insole. If the shoes are long enough, there will be a light area ahead of the mark made by the great toe.

At the risk of being considered a wise guy, the writer suggests counting the toe marks. Five is par for the foot, but many shoes show only four. Lacking proper shoe width the little toe is forced up over the fourth toe and into the upper part of the shoe. Five-toed feet that make four-toed footprints should be shod in "straight-last" shoes.

The second check is simply to put your hand in the shoe, palm upward, to see if the great toe is digging a hole in the top of the toe box. The above mentioned footprint may show a light area ahead of the great toe only because the toe of the shoe is too shallow to allow the foot to advance any further. The force required to dig such a hole is sufficient to bunionate the great toe.

Labor Costs Aiding Inflation

By Babson's Reports Incorporated, Wellesley Hills, Mass., June 26, 1969—One of the most powerful contributing factors to our apparently unending inflationary spiral is labor costs, but almost no effort has been made to hold them in check. Kennedy's productivity guideline limiting raises to 3.2% annually was ignored by both labor and management. And Johnson's jawbone tactics made just about as little impression, somewhat later on.

No Handway In Sight

To bring this up to date, Nixon has approved fiscal and tax restraints on inflation, but not one positive move has been suggested to hold back labor costs. In fact, most Nixon Administration aides and even the White House itself have indicated their distaste for compulsory pay curbs, despite the fact that they are gaining favor with businessmen and bankers. Thus, as far as we can see, labor will continue to be left to its own devices to get as much as the market will bear in negotiated wage boosts and fringes.

Judging by the pay increases won in bargaining sessions during the first quarter of the current year, the inflationary trend in terms of labor costs appears to be stronger than ever. The rate of raises has been quickening over the past four years, but all records were broken during first-quarter 1969. The median hike for all lines of industry touched 19.8c an hour—4.5c higher than for the same period in 1968 and close to 7c above two years ago.

Building Hit Hard

By far the highest median pay advance was reported in the construction industry up 45.2c an hour compared with 28c for the same three-month span in 1968. Most building negotiations come up later in the year, but even the small samplings for the first quarter reveal how swift the upswing in construction costs has become. This is, of course, unhappy news for those waiting for a real new building boom detrimental to the industry than the already tight money situation.

Next down the line from top-place construction in terms of sizable median pay raises for the first quarter were shipping and longshore operations, 38c an hour; printing and publishing, 24.8c; and wholesale and retail trade, services, and transportation equipment, 24.6c each. Nonmanufacturing lines as a whole chalked up a median pay advance of 24.7c—up 5.2c from a year ago—and manufacturing settlements rose 18.4c—up 3.5c.

Hope, But Not Much

April figures from the Department of Commerce indicate a possible small slowdown in the long upsurge in labor costs, but the Department simultaneously issued a warning that no real trend can be read into statistics for one month alone. What was reported, however, was an April boost in the seasonally adjusted annual rate of personal income amounting to only \$2.8 billion, a far cry from the \$6.5 billion hike registered in March and just a trifle above the \$2.6 billion for the same time twelve months ago. And it must be noted that this slowdown was for the most part attributed to less radical expansion of wage and salary totals.

But any way you look at it, the direction of labor costs is still toward higher ground. Forthcoming union negotiations are bound to bring about still further gains in wage settlements, while built-in raises contained in multi-year agreements will exert considerable upward pressure over the two or three years immediately ahead. Nor should it be forgotten that fringe concessions are constantly adding billions to management's costs, especially since more and more such benefits are being paid for solely by employers.

Thus, it may be assumed that the flank of the war against inflation involving labor expenditures can make no genuine headway over the period ahead. Fiscal ad tax strategies apparently must still be used if runaway inflation is to be prevented.

Guilty Or Not Guilty
Twentieth Century America
has reached its most historic
crossroads. Turmoil dominates

the national scene. Logic and reason seem to have been abandoned in the uncertain grapplings of our leaders with our gravest national and international problems. Basic morality is becoming "out moded"—supplanted by a rank "code of obscurity" publicly approved by our courts and by articulate segments of our press and population. The decay of national character is unmistakably visible.

America is deteriorating militarily as the Communist juggernaut grows mightily. We no longer are the champion of world-wide freedom, the "bright hope" of 900,000,000 enslaved

people. Some of our most "distinguished" and listened - to "statesmen," viewing the rise of the Soviet Union to dominant world power, proclaim a "Welcome Communists!" international policy. The whole structure of American society is being shattered. The lives of the American people are threatened, as never before in this century. **Facing The Blame**

Who is to blame? We, the people of the United States, are to blame. Oh, the vast majority of us have been (in mind and heart) on the side of logic and reason, courage and honor, decency and morality, law and order; and for the lofty principles inherent in the goal of world wide brotherhood. And militarily most Americans want our nation to be superior in power over any possible potential enemy.

The majority of Americans almost instinctively choose to travel this high road. But a belief in mind and heart, if unspoken and inactive, is of limited influence; and, in today's world, tragic. Today most Americans are sitting by the lower roadside, inactive and fairly well satisfied with life. It is a sunny day, the breeze is nice, the children (well, where are they, what could they be doing in the forest over yonder? Ho, hum). Those wildflowers stimulate the soul; and there is a good meal left in the picnic basket; an atmosphere of security and well-being prevails. Surely, somehow, we'll reach the good destination. Sitting in the sun, thinking good thoughts, will (many Americans seem to believe) bring about a solution to our problems. But will it? The hard fact is—it won't! It hasn't.

Survival Number One

Our most urgent problem is survival. There is no question (finally the truth is out) about the growing superiority of the Soviet Union's nuclear power; and there shouldn't be any doubt about its objective; the takeover of the U.S.A. Every Communist boss since Marx has proclaimed this objective, repeatedly. The White and Black Communists in the U. S. today are repeating it openly, and showing they mean it.

What has the American people, who unquestionably want to safeguard their lives and liberty, done about this urgent survival problem? Most of them continue to "think" survival and "favor" adequate national de-

fense, but they continue to sit inactive, relatively undisturbed in the good sun out where everything is pretty and one need not get oneself "worked up."

Vocal Minority Powerful

The President suggested a fragment (a vital fragment) of ballistic missile defense (ABM). The "Appease Russia" partisans mobilized and organized a nationwide "Kill-ABM" movement with prominent leadership and the backing of the U. S. Communist Party. Vast sums of money were poured into skillfully-designed, effective propaganda against the U. S. military establishment—a calculated oblique assault on ABM. Much TV network time was occupied with the propaganda. The "military" was made to look like a gigantic evil, its top leaders ogres, unintelligent, arrogant and grossly wasteful, spending billions on unworkable weapons systems and defense projects.

Although nation-wide polls showed that the American people by a margin of two to one favored the deployment of an ABM missile system, the mail to Senators and Congressmen (on which voting decisions usually are based) ran 10 to 1 against

Frederick County Backgrounds

The Annan Family

The notes on the Morrow family of the Marsh Creek Settlement are concluded at this time.

List of Morrows buried in the Lower Marsh Creek churchyard, as continued from last week's column:

5. "Sacred, to the memory of: John Knox Morrow. Died May 1, 1819, Aged 3 years."

Note: A grandson of John (2) and Mary (Lockhart) Morrow. It will be remembered that Rebecca Hodge, a half-sister of Mary (Lockhart) Morrow, married Dr. Samuel Knox and this intermarriage brought the name of 'Knox' into the "family circle."

6. "In memory of, Margaret Morrow, wife of, James Morrow, who departed this life, May 9th, 1937, Aged 46 years."

Note: James (3) the seventh child and third son of John (2) and Mary (Lockhart) Morrow, was married, in 1815, to Margaret Knox. He (James) was one of the last of his family to leave what is now Adams County, Pennsylvania, for the Ohio country. But in going he left his dead behind—his wife and three of their children.

7. "Sacred, to the memory of: James Morrow, Died March 3, 1826, Aged 1 year."

"Also, John Morrow: Died June 14, 1829, Aged 2 years. Children of, James and Margaret Morrow."

Note: The inscription on this stone is self-explanatory—the two little sons of James (3) and Margaret (Knox) Morrow.

The third family in the "genealogical hookup" of Cochran-Morrow-Annan alone remains to be discussed. Through the courtesy of descendants an Annan family chart was made available to the writer of this column. The clan is a somewhat complicated one with many intermarriages and the same family names used generation after generation. However, like a jigsaw puzzle, it can, with patience, be fitted together, and it is hoped that the complete picture will reflect "light on the past."

The first Robert (1) Annan was born and died in Scotland. He married into the Landales family. He is chiefly noted, in this late day, for being the father of the Rev. Robert Annan, the first of the family to emigrate to America.

Robert (2) Annan was born in the town of Capar, Fife, Scotland, in 1742. Of his early life little can be definitely ascertained but it can be assumed that he

enjoys a happy and carefree boyhood.

After pursuing the usual course of study at the University of Saint Andrew's, Robert (2) Annan studied theology under the venerable Alexander Moncrieff, one of the original Seceders. He (Robert) (2) was licensed by the Presbytery of Perth when only about nineteen years of age—a rather young man to wear the stern and pious mantle of the Covenant. Shortly after his ordination he was appointed by the Synod to visit the American Colonies in the capacity of Missionary. It is a family tradition that he was reluctant and unwilling to accept the appointment but he seems to have had little choice in the matter. The decision of the Synod was final and they were determined to "bring the Word of God to the waste places of the world." To make doubly certain that their decrees would be obeyed an act had been passed stating that the name of any probationer appointed to America would not be proposed to any vacant congregation in Scotland. Robert (2) Annan, therefore much against his will, came to America.

The young minister arrived in New York in the summer of 1761. He labored as an itinerant missionary for about four years—working among all sorts of conditions of people striving to implant the faith of the Covenant. In 1765 the Rev. Robert (2) Annan was ordained and established to be the minister over the Associate congregation at Neelytown, New York and remained there for some fourteen years.

During the War of the American Revolution the Rev. Annan was an earnest and hard-working patriot. He preached the American cause to one and all and made many converts.

In 1783 Mr. Annan removed from Neelytown to Boston, there to take charge of the "congregation worshipping in Federal Street." Three years later the minister moved his family to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he had accepted a call to the old Scots' Church, located on Spruce Street. Here he continued to labor until 1801 or 1802 at which time he removed to Baltimore, Maryland, to take under his pastoral care a newly formed congregation.

Some eleven years or so later, feeling the weight of his years, he decided to retire to the farm he had purchased in York County, Pennsylvania. He had worked long and hard to advance the faith of his fathers and had earned his rest. However, although he never held another pastorate, his work was far from finished for he supplied several churches located in the region in which he made his home. Moreover he kept up "his habits of study and retained the use of his excellent mind until the end."

The death of the Rev. Robert (2) Annan occurred as the result of an accident. According to a fairly reliable tradition he was "thrown with great violence from his carriage." He was taken up and carried home, insensible, and never rallied sufficiently to recognize any member of his family. He survived the accident only two or three days, dying on December 5, 1810. He was interred in the burial ground of Octorara Church, now connected with the Associate congregation. His grave is well marked and can easily be found at the present time.

The Rev. Robert (2) Annan was twice married. In 1764 he was united in the "holy bands" to Margaret Cochran, the daughter of William Cochran, of Carrollburg (Carroll's Tract), York (now Adams) County, Pennsylvania. Margaret (Cochran) An-

nan died October 13, 1793 leaving "a disconsolate husband" and three "orphan children."

In those days a man needed a helpmate and grief was no barrier to remarriage. In this respect the Rev. Annan was no exception for in 1794, barely a year after the death of his first wife, he was married to Elizabeth Hawthorne, the daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Hawthorne. The Hawthornes lived in the village of Strasburg, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The second wife died in Lancaster County on July 23, 1813.

The notes pertaining to the Annan family will be continued in this series next week.


