Taxpayers Group Organizes; **Plans Election**

A representative group of Emmitsburg and Thurmont taxpayers met in a two-hour session Monday evening at St. Joseph's High School, to determine ways and means to have adjustments made is recent tax assessment figures handed out the first part of December. Among the group were businessmen, farmers and other

property-owners. It was the consensus of the group to follow the standard procedure of applying for a tax hearing, first at the Supervisor of Assessments Office in Frederick, then the County Commissioners and if necessary, to the State Tax Court.

The meeting was presided over by the chairman pro tem, Milton Sewell, retired Army Colonel residing in the Emmitsburg District. The chairman first introduced Richard Zimmerman, Frederick attorney, who spoke on procedure of tax appeals, what could be expected and what could be done. Following Attorney Zimmerman's talk a question and answer period was held. Immediately following Attorney Zimemrman, Chairman Sewell introduced Robert E. Dailey, Sr., president of the Frederick County Taxpayers League. Mr. Dailey outlined procedures pertinent to tax assessment appeals and explained the workings of his League. He stated that legal service would be provided by the League in cases that might reach the Tax Court.

The consensus of the group was to have all those dissatisfied with their recent assessment send in their protest slips to the Assessment Office in Frederick for a hearing. It is the intention of the group to give aid to those who do not care to face the hearing, by having some individual to represent them, free, at the hearing. Thisaid can be had by calling the Emmitsburg Chronicle or M. A.

In all, about 100 residents from the two towns were present at the meeting, despite freezing temperatures and slippery roads. Membership application forms for those desiring to join the Taxpayers League were distributed during the session. An appointed nominating committee of two residents of Emmitsburg and two from Thurmont, was named by the Chairman.

The committee presented the following nominations: President, Miltion A. Sewell; vice president, William Benjamin, Thurmont: secretary, Harry Swomley, and treasurer, Richard Stambaugh, Thurmont. Another meeting of the group is anticipated in the near future at which time, additional nominations can be made and a slate of permanent officers elected.

Gives Good Advice On Phone Calling

The Christmas season brings not only a shopping rush but also

a calling rush. Miss Peggy L. Houff, chief op-erator for the C&P Telephone Company here, made some suggestions that may help you avoid delays in your long distance calls to family and friends during the holidays.

"The most helpful thing to do," said Miss Houff, "is to make your calls when the telephone traffic is lighter—and in the Frederick area there ars usually fewer calls on Christmas Day between 1 p. m. and 6 p. m. Then, during the evening, the traffic picks up again."

Lower long distance rates are in effect 24 hours on both Christmas Day and New Year's Day, she pointed out.

Miss Houff listed these additional tips about holiday calling: Check ahead of time to be sure you have the out-of-town numbers you expect to call. To get a number, just call the area code of the distant place and the number 555-1212. You make this call as you do any long distance call, but there is no

If you don't know the area code for the place you're calling, look in the front pages of your phone book for the area code map and list.

Allow the operator a little extra time to answer you. She's probably working on a call that its difficult to get through. Tanging up and dialing again won't expedite the call.

Call station to station. This saves the extra time it takes to get a person-to-person call through, and the cost is lower. If you plan to call overseas during the busy holidays, make a reservation as far ahead as

possible. Just ask your operator to connect you with the Overseas Operator for the country you wish to call.

During the holidays Miss Houff said, the telephone company makes adjustments in the circuits to provide more pathways into and out of the various communities, and there are also many operators

on duty. Still, the traffic sometimes backs up, although the number of long distance calls is actually lower than on an ordinary business day. "The difference," she explained, "is in the traffic pattern." The bulk of everyday long distance calling is between large towns and ciities, and the telephone circuits are designed to handle that

"In contrast," Miss Hooff said, "many holiday calls to friends and relatives across the country travel routes where calling is usually light—and where we don't normally need super-speechways."







A similar Institute at St. Joseph College last year attracted teachers from high schools in Maryland, California, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, Missouri, Georgia, Virginia, South Carolina, New Jersey, Florida, Montana, Connecti-cut New York, Indiana, Michigan

Preference will be given to teachers in need of training in the use of experimental techniques to be studied and whose applications provide evidence that they will derive suitable benefits from the Institute. Participants will receive a stipend of \$75 a week,

plus \$15 for each dependent.

The purpose of the Institute is to strengthen the laboratory competency of secondary school teachpetency of secondary school teachpeten petency of secondary school teachers in areas where initial preparation may be lacking in utilization of modern science techniques.

Sister Marcella Scully will instruct participants in the use of radioisotopes, pH measuring devices and chemical methods. Sister Juliana Kowal, assistant professor of biology at St. Joseph fessor of biology at St. Joseph College, will teach microscopy, mi-crobiologicial techniques and chromatography. Sister Denise Eby, Ph.D. candidate and chairman of the Science department, will be a part-time instructor and will demonstrate the use of the Beckman DB spectrophotometer and gas chromatograph.

Physicians Attend Training Session


