## Mount Appoints 2 Catoctin Mountains Tourist Council Selects Logo Design

### Vice Presidents

The appointment of two priests as vice presidents at Mount Saint Mary's College was announced this week by President John J. Dillon, Jr. Rev. Philip A. Barrett, treasurer for the past eight years, has been named vice president for college relations. Rev. James M. Forker, dean of student affairs since June 1969, has been named vice president for student affairs. Mount Saint Mary's College had been without a vice president since June 1971 when Dr. Dillon, then serving as executive vice president, was elected president. The two new vice presidencies were established at the February meeting of the Mount's 19-member Board of Trustees.

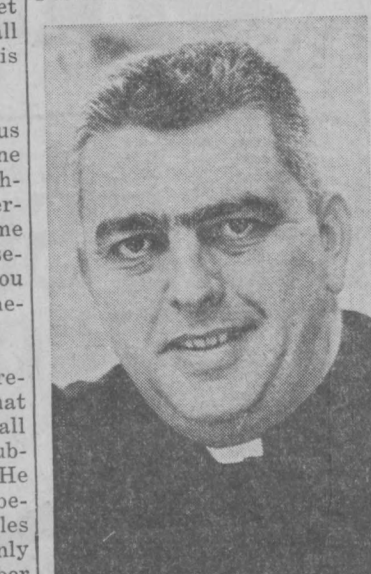


Rev. Philip A. Barrett

Father Barrett has been treasurer of the college since 1964, serving as a member of the finance committee and the academic council. From 1957 through 1963 he was dean of men. In addition to his administrative duties, he also teaches with rank of assistant professor in the theology department.

A native of Troy, N. Y., he was ordained a priest for the Albany diocese in Rome in 1954. He earned his B.A. degree from the Mount in 1950. He then went to Rome where he attended Almo Collegio Caprenia, one of the oldest seminaries in the world, and earned a degree in sacred theology in 1953 from the Pontifical Gregorian University. In 1964 he was awarded a master's degree at Villanova University.

Father Barrett is treasurer of the Mount Saint Mary's National Alumni Association, and moderator of the Baltimore chapter of the college's Parents Guild.



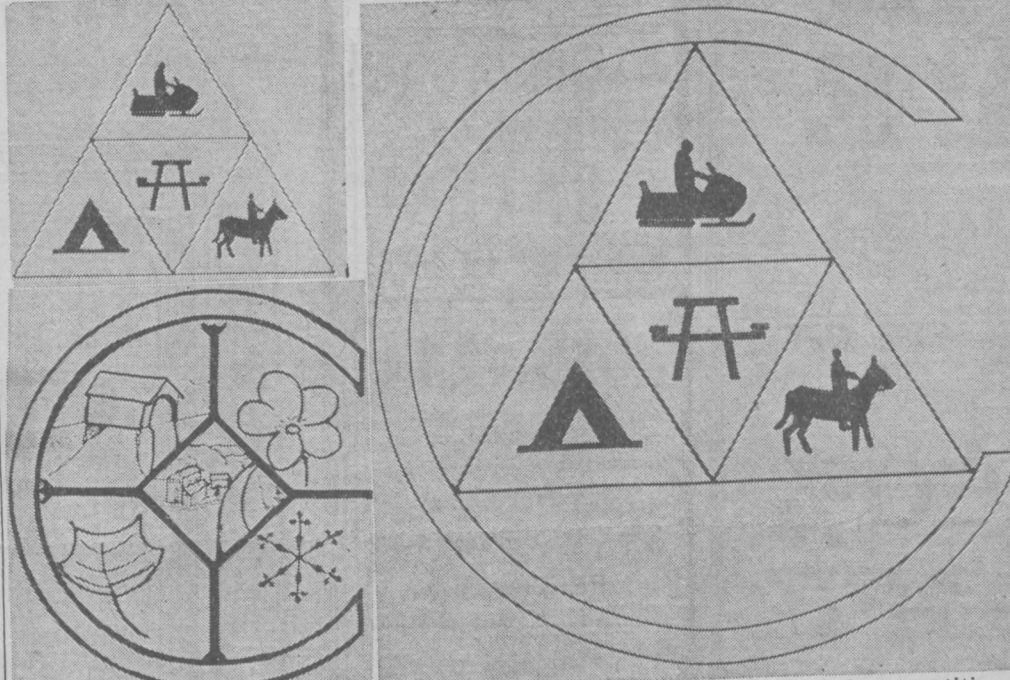
Rev. James M. Forker

Father Forker, a native of Bayonne, N. J., was named dean of student affairs in June 1969, when Dr. Dillon was appointed executive vice president of the college. He joined the Mount faculty in September 1967 as an instructor in the department of theology. Since then he has been promoted to assistant professor and continues to teach theology at the college and pastoral counseling at the seminary in addition to his administrative duties.

Prior to being named dean of student affairs, he served as faculty adviser to the student government organization. He presently is a member of the college's academic council and the priests' advisory committee.

Father Forker received his B.A. from Mount Saint Mary's College in 1956, and his M.A. from Iona College in 1969. He was ordained as a priest in 1960 by the Bishop of Trenton after graduating from Mount Saint Mary's Seminary. From 1960 to 1967, Father

# LOOKING AHEAD

**Communists At Work**  
The National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) will seek on April 22 to reestablish a rallying center and 'cause' for young people who have to some degree been alienated from our American system. The NPAC hopes to mobilize a million youth for demonstrations in New York and San Francisco. The organization leaders know they can expect good press coverage and invaluable aid from some members of Congress, many national celebrities, and prominent educators, "peace" groups, and even some very wealthy business and professional leaders. In April 1971, NPAC did attract such support and did mobilize ap-

proximately a million youth. The planning and direction of this year's operation will largely be in the hands of Communists enemies of the United States, as it was last April, according to U. S. Government security agencies. FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover says the NPAC "is dominated" by Communists. The House Committee on Internal Security, after investigations and hearings, has identified key people in the NPAC leadership as Communists. The April operation will serve the purposes of World Communism. One of those purposes is to further tear America apart, agitate disruptions, pit Americans against Americans.

The second major purpose is to gather in and re-incite massive numbers of young people who have in recent months been increasingly difficult for the Communist to "reach" and direct into revolutionary pursuits.  
**Reds In Control**  
Outfits like the NPAC and its comrade organization, the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), have been able to mobilize millions of Americans, attract support from Senators, Congressmen, and national celebrities, and get massive, sympathetic press coverage (particularly on TV). This is one of the fantastic realities of the decades of the 60's and 70's. Rep. Richard H. Ichord (Missouri Democrat), chairman of the House Committee on Internal Security, says officially:

"Of particular interest to the committee was a determination of the extent to which the Communist Party USA, the Socialist Workers Party, the Young Socialist Alliance, and other groups under Communist influence or control had acquired a leadership role in directing (such mobilization) activities.  
**The Facts**

"The evidence received by the committee in (previous) hearings clearly showed that New Mobe, a coalition of numerous antiwar groups, was heavily influenced by two Communist Party USA and the Trotskyite Socialist Workers Party, both of which advocate the overthrow of the United

"I have been surprised to learn that most Members of Congress think that the Socialist Workers Party members are the Norman Thomas-type Socialist. Nothing could be further from the truth. These are the Trotskyite Communists who, in many respects, are much more revolutionary than the Communist Party USA, and it is a group that has experienced phenomenal growth in recent years."

**Swift Growth**  
The "phenomenal" growth of such Communist groups, dedicated to the overthrow of the United States by force and violence, has been aided undoubtedly by the fact that some prominent members of the U. S. Senate and House have appeared with them in the big "demonstrations" and have thus lent their prestige and respectability.  
The facts I am reporting here are intended to inform the American people of the true nature of NPAC and PCPJ, and of hundreds of subversive groups which are behind false fronts and not adequately identified. I said in the beginning of this series of

columns that there are signs that the "restless," largely uninformed American youths who have supplied the revolutionaries with their "troops" in recent years may be awakening to the truth about Communism. So it is important that the 1972 plans of the Communist-dominated youth-mobilizing outfits not get the support of prominent non-Communist Americans. A failure by NPAC and PCPJ this April might be a turning point for a big and vital segment of American youth. It could be a message to World Communism's leaders that many young Americans whom they previously manipulated now are taking themselves out of the grasp of the Communists.

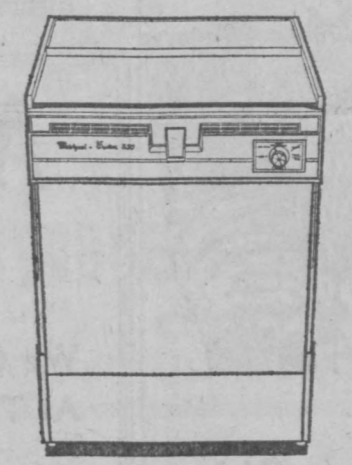

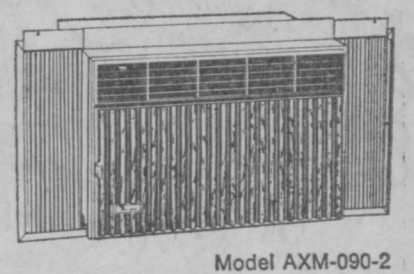

Who IS Reading?

The 1970's were set by the U. S. Commissioner of Health, Education and Welfare as the target years for the "Right to Read" program. Just how much has been accomplished so far, is questionable. In most parts of the country, the projects have been quite limited and reflect little enthusiasm. There have been some projects started which might prove interesting as well as productive.

One such program is under way in several states. Vermont, Washington, Maryland are the leaders in projects such as Sustained Silent Reading, High Intensity Practice and Uninterrupted Reading Time. The titles sound like different programs, but they really mean about the same thing—everyone takes a reading break!

The projects have as their main objectives—giving time to practice silent reading skills, creating an interest and desire to have the habit of reading, and recognizing the joy of reading.

In some schools such as Riverview Middle School in Denton, Maryland and Stephen Decatur High School in Berlin, Maryland, everyone takes a reading break—this means the entire school population including administrators, teachers, and students stop during the school day and read. Can you imagine the silence in the building with everyone reading?

Some interesting things have been happening since the initiation of the "reading break". Stores have been selling more reading materials, especially paperbacks and periodicals. Parents have become involved and are donating books and magazines to the schools. Many people in the community are reading more. They are swapping reading materials, talking about books, and even forming reading clubs and organizing discussion groups for sharing ideas.

Habits of any kind can be catching! The "Reading Habit" can develop just like any habit, if given a chance. Wouldn't it be great if the United States could improve its sad statistic of the average person reading about 2 books per year?

It is really promising to see some school systems trying to provide a time and place for reading self-selected materials. Now if parents would only help to provide an atmosphere for reading at home. A place where reading can be enjoyed—away from the noisy children playing or the television set. Wouldn't it be fun for the entire family to take a "reading break"? Most families would discover the joy of talking with each other and sharing ideas. What a pleasant change from the hectic pace we live in today!

**Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration Has Mailed 1,750,000 License Tag Applications To State Motorists**

The Maryland Department of Transportation's Motor Vehicle Administration has announced that more than one and three-quarter million license tag renewal applications were mailed out to Maryland motorists last week.

In making this announcement, Ejner J. Johnson, Motor Vehicle Administrator, reminded car owners that again this year they will receive tag validation stickers instead of new tags.

Under this plan, license tags are issued only every fifth year with validation stickers being used for the four intervening years. Mr. Johnson estimated that validation stickers would save the State nearly two million dollars in production and mailing costs over the five-year life of the tags.

Mr. Johnson went on to say, that tag validation stickers may be purchased by mail directly from the Motor Vehicle Administration's Glen Burnie Headquarters or at MVA Regional offices in Baltimore City, Chesapeake City, College Park, Cumberland, Hagerstown, Rockville, Salisbury, and Waldorf. Validation stickers and tags are also available at the County Treasurers of Calvert, Caroline, Cecil, Charles, Dorchester, Garrett, Harford, Kent, Queen Anne's, St. Mary's, Somerset, Talbot and Worcester Counties. Administrator Johnson urges vehicle owners to apply for their 1972 validation stickers by mail, if possible.

Persons sending their tag renewal applications by mail are advised to do so not later than March 15 to allow time for processing and delivery of the validation stickers. Vehicle owners who do not receive their tag applications by February 20 are requested to contact the MVA immediately, giving their present tag number, the title and serial number of their vehicle, their full name and present address. All of this information is necessary to enable the computer-printer to print their correct applications. For additional information, individuals should contact the Motor Vehicle Administration Regional office in their vicinity or they may call the Glen Burnie tag renewal information number—768-7421.

Tag fees again this year will be \$20 for vehicles with gross weight of 3700 pounds or less, and \$30 for vehicles weighing more than 3700 pounds. Motorists are cautioned against displaying their new validation stickers before Mar. 1st, and reminded that the absolute deadline for displaying their present tags without the new validation stickers.

The Motor Vehicle Administration's Glen Burnie Headquarters and Regional offices will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily for the convenience of motorists.

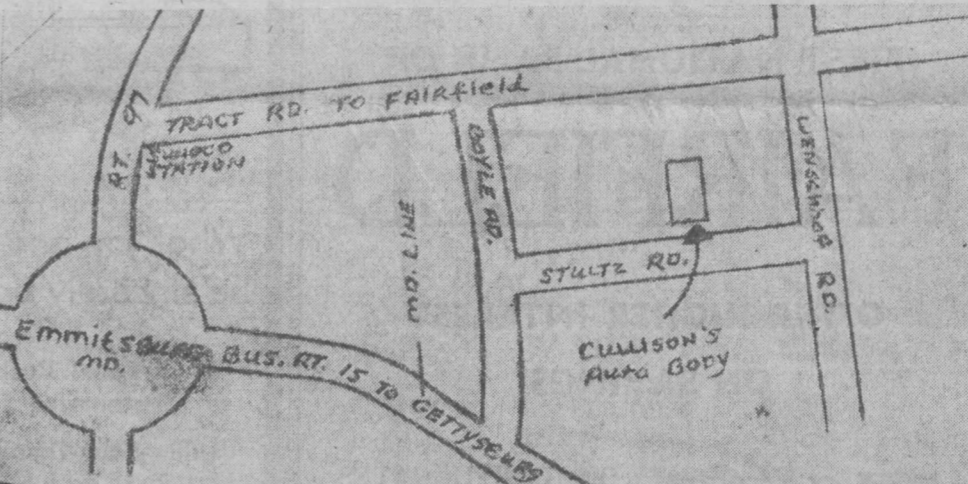

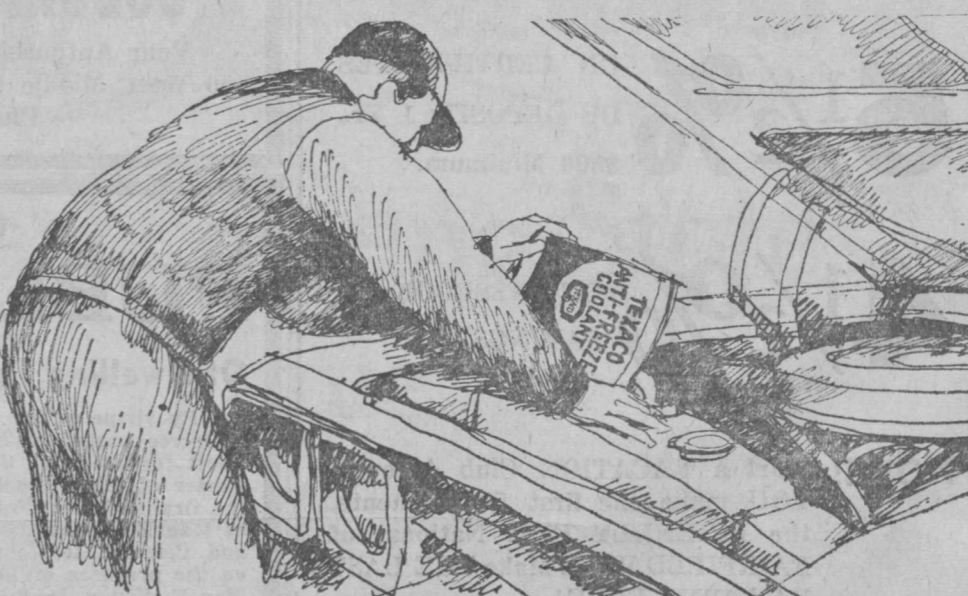

# BUSINESS AND THE STOCK MARKET

**Business Failure Trends**  
By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., February 17, 1972—While fewer businesses are going broke vs. a year ago, the number is still disturbingly high and spurts from time to time. Moreover, the sums involved are sizable and rising. Government and private economists are keeping close tabs on these failure trends. What is behind them? What lies ahead?

**Number And Liability**  
In 1971, U. S. business failures totaled 10,326, down 4% from the three-year high of 10,748 recorded in 1970. In each of 1971's final six months, commercial and industrial casualties dropped below levels for the corresponding 1970 period. Even so, the number of business failures—though well down from the highs of the late 1950's and early 1960's—is still too large for

comfort. Dollar liability of business failures last year rose to a new record of \$1.9 billion. The rate of increase for the year, however, was mere 2% compared with the hefty 65% upturn that occurred between 1969 and 1970. If this improvement continues, dollar liabilities in 1972 may be held near the \$2-billion mark.

**Business Cycle Still Rules**  
Usually during the early and middle stages of a business recovery, the number of failures is relatively small and doesn't vary too much from month to month, or even from year to year. In such periods, consumer demand is accelerating faster than goods are being produced, and sellers are firmly ensconced in the driver's seat.

It is only in the latter stages of an economic up-push—when output is rapidly overtaking demand or has already

overtaken it—that failures begin their climb, multiplying as general business slides off from its highs.

**The Up And Up Fallacy**  
But business slumps alone do not trigger skyrocketing failures. More often than not it is poor management practices that lead to the tragedy of failure, because they are not—or cannot be—corrected in time to offset the debilitating impact of economic slow-down. The major cause of business fatality is unwise expansion during a boom, especially when that expansion is financed by unrealistically heavy borrowing. The urge to get ahead rapidly and to obtain a larger piece of the action is overriding, and causes many businessmen to act rashly. They do not stop to consider objectively how far and how fast they should expand, or whether they should branch out at all.

As for new businesses which fall by the wayside when the going gets rough, most run into trouble when they face the necessity of going out and doing a real selling job. Little effort was needed to move goods in the mid-1960's. But it has been different since supply overtook demand and in-

## No-Fault Insurance For Maryland Sponsored By Several State Senators

Senator Edward P. Thomas (Fred-Car.), this week joined Senator Newton I. Steers, Jr. (Mont. 3A), former State Insurance Commissioner, in sponsoring comprehensive no-fault insurance, legislation as an alternative to proposals by

the Mandel Administration and others. Senator Thomas and six other Republican Senators are co-sponsors of the bill drafted by Steers, along with several Democratic Senators.

According to Sen. Thomas, "Ours is an honest no fault bill which will fully protect motorists and still stop insurance rates from climbing. It eliminates the opportunities for unnecessary litigation by paying medical claims up to \$1500 regardless of which driver is negligent or at fault. This limits court suits for pain and suffering payments to medical claims exceeding \$1500."

In addition to establishing the \$1500 limit prior to litigation, the bill calls for compulsory auto insurance and establishes a medical payment scale to be based on average costs determined by the Maryland Hospital Care Analysis Service.

The Thomas bill is more thorough than a third no-fault bill proposed by Sen. Edward T. Conroy (D-PG), which sets a litigation threshold of \$500 for medical expenses and wage losses.

"This bill focuses on the precise problems the Mandel bill evades", Sen. Thomas said, "compensating the injured and protecting the consumer. The savings to insurance companies will be passed on to the consumers through reasonable rates."

In addition to establishing the \$1500 limit prior to litigation, the bill calls for compulsory auto insurance and establishes a medical payment scale to be based on average costs determined by the Maryland Hospital Care Analysis Service.

The Thomas bill is more thorough than a third no-fault bill proposed by Sen. Edward T. Conroy (D-PG), which sets a litigation threshold of \$500 for medical expenses and wage losses.

"This bill focuses on the precise problems the Mandel bill evades", Sen. Thomas said, "compensating the injured and protecting the consumer. The savings to insurance companies will be passed on to the consumers through reasonable rates."

### OPEN LINE

Over the past several months I have received many letters relating to consumer product information and problems. As a result, the next two weeks of this column will be devoted exclusively to some of the consumer questions that have been raised. Letters may be sent to me c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Wash-

ington, D. C. 20515. I am writing to tell you that you just can't get service anymore. Both my refrigerator and washer went on the blink in the past three months and I had a devil of a time getting a repair man out to the house... Can't something be done?

Here's a possible solution—why not contact the Major Appliance Consumer Action Panel (MACAP). MACAP was founded two years ago by several trade associations to resolve difficulties between consumers and manufacturers of freezers, stoves, ovens, refrigerators, washers, dryers, dishwashers and air conditioners. According to the Office of Consumer Affairs, "MACAP is an important organization capable of making authoritative recommendations toward equitable resolutions of problems arising between the consumer and the home-appliance industry. The panel has been open-handed and fair in its dealings with the consumer and the industry." The organization apparently wants to help more consumers, so if you have an appliance problem, such as a repair service, drop them a line at 20 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois 60606. Remember though, it is usually better to discuss your complaint first with the dealer from whom you bought the appliance.

I recently read about a government consumer information booklet which compares the safety aspects of all American makes of cars. How can I get a copy?

An annual consumer information booklet and two companion pamphlets, dealing with safety performance of all domestic and foreign cars and motorcycles, is published by the Department of Transportation. The booklet, entitled "Performance Data for New 1972 Passenger Cars and Motorcycles", covers three areas of vehicle safety performance: Stopping Distance, Acceleration and Passing Ability, and Tire Reserve Load. The supplementary consumer pamphlets are entitled: "Brakes—A Comparison of Braking Performance for 1972 Cars" and "Tires—A Comparison of Tire Reserve Load for 1972 Cars". Interested citizens may order the publication directly from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

Are there any Federal laws in regards to the use of snowmobiles? There are no federal regulations for snowmobiles, but the Interior Department is studying the potential environmental, social and economic impact of snowmobiles and other off-road vehicles. This study is expected to be the basis for legislation or departmental regulation of snowmobiles on public lands.

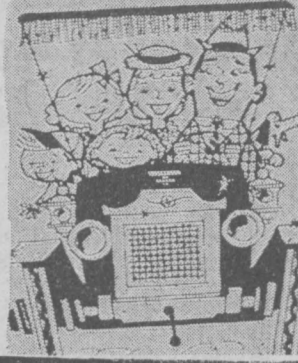

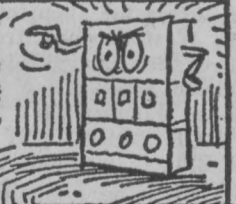

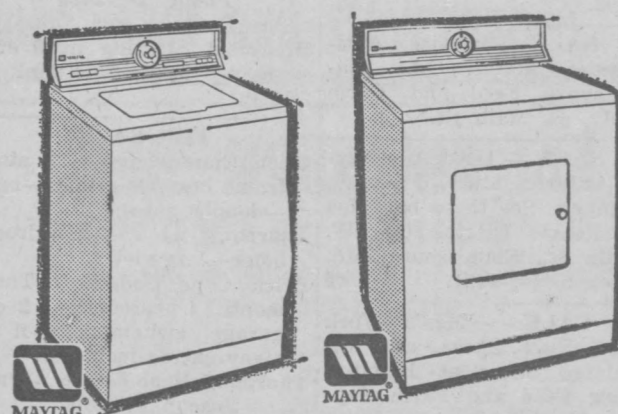
