

"New World of the Mind" Tells About Sensory Perception

Almost everyone you meet these days is interested in Extra Sensory Perception. There are television series about it—books, movies and plays. Yet it is only in comparatively recent times that any extensive research has been carried on in this field.

J. B. Rhine, Professor of Psychology at Duke University, and Director of the Parapsychology laboratory there. He and his fellow scientists, after painstakingly thorough tests, have given us a scientifically accurate account of the working of this formerly hidden area of the mind.

In America, the pioneer and foremost authority in this science of Parapsychology, is Dr.

In his book, "New World of the Mind", Dr. Rhine dis-

cusses clairvoyance, telepathy, recognition, and the influence of mind over matter. He takes us on a voyage through the crucial experiments, the criticisms of fellow scientists, and finally the conclusive results. He shows us E.S.P.'s relation to other natural sciences and it's place and significance in human life.

Especially interesting is religion from the viewpoint of parapsychology. I seriously doubt whether any organized religion will take notice of any research activity in this field. A few individuals from religion are interested, but only a strong sense of inadequacy of existing religious truths would the implications of Psychic Phenomena be considered.

Dr. Rhine has made his discoveries by sound methods and is completely verified. He broadens horizons for us as individuals and as a nation.

Already other nations are doing intensive research in parapsychology. In "Psychic Discoveries Behind the Iron Curtain", by Sheila Ostrander and Lynn Schroeder this is demonstrated. Though not schooled in the world of Paraphysics as Dr. Rhine, they nevertheless have been helped in writing this book by many eminent scientists, including Dr. Rhine himself.

The book takes us through Iron Curtain countries and examines the various types of psychic phenomena in each. Is there such a thing as an aura? What is eyesight? How does the dowsing rod work? This book answers these questions and many more, including those on acupuncture, so much in the news these days.

Communist Plans For San Diego

Communist forces within America are planning for and expect to achieve the biggest propaganda victory in the history of World-wide Communism when they mobilize their comrades and dupes at San Diego in August. They expect to have 1,000,000 people. They expect to swing most of the television and newspaper spotlight away from the Republican National Convention being held in San Diego. They expect thereby: (1) to achieve their most far-reaching victory within America in their strategy of "divide and conquer;" and (2) to focus world attention on what they believe will be reflected in the world news media as a mas-

sive "citizens' revolt" against the Nixon policy of no-surrender in Vietnam.

We have been watching the plans developing for this mammoth Communist operation. We have been in touch with sources that have pipelines into the brain-centers of the various "peace" and revolutionary organizations involved. The "word" is that the North Vietnam Communists and the spokesmen for Red China's Chou En-lai and Soviet Russia all have assured their American agents that Hanoi will not have accepted any American peace proposal—less than surrender and overthrow of the present elected Saigon Government—when the Republican Party meets in San Diego in August to

nominate President Nixon for re-election.

Of Great Value

The bosses of World Communism also have assured their U. S. operatives that the Nixon "anti-war" and anti-Nixon "demonstrations" will be of incalculable aid to Communist victory plans in Vietnam, and, in fact, around the world. Hanoi has made no secret of its high appraisal of the political and military value of the planned San Diego demonstrations.

Backed up by Moscow, Peking and other Communist citadels, Hanoi has told the U. S. comrades that the big agitation at San Diego against the Nixon policies (with the American public looking on) can be an indispensable aid in turning the Vietnam war into a Communist victory. The logic is simple: Hanoi is being offered "better deals" by some of the candidates contesting for the Presidency. The Hanoi bosses, and their masters in Moscow and Peking, feel they have a chance to further divide the American people and thus achieve a change, in their favor, in American policy. Should any one of several presidential candidates be successful at Miami, and then in November, North Vietnam would expect to get the unconditional withdrawal of U. S. forces and an easy route to full control of South Vietnam which

President Nixon has denied them.

Dupes On Parade

I said in the beginning that Communist forces within America were making elaborate plans for San Diego, because I have documented facts to support the statement. Every hard-core Communist outfit, every Communist-front operation, every revolutionary cadre in the "youth movement" is active in the planning. And among the top planners are persons who have been identified as Communists. Their prediction of 1,000,000 may not be realized but the Police Department of San Diego, the California State Police and Federal security agencies are preparing for an "invasion" of at least 500,000 protesters. San Diego Police have asked the U. S. Justice Department for \$920,000.00 to expand protective measures.

As always in the past, the comrades must depend on mobilizing hundreds of thousands of young people as their marching and sometimes violent dupes. In the past year they have lost a lot of their youth following; some have awakened to the true nature of their Pied Pipers and at the same time the Nixon Administration clearly has been "winding down" the war. But the comrades have been instructed from Hanoi, Peking and Moscow nevertheless to make the supreme effort to get 1,000,000 marching "peace-niks" to San Diego, all with chips on their shoulders against Mr. Nixon and the police.

Byron Seeks Funds For Water & Sewers

Citing the critical need of small communities for financial assistance in developing water and sewer systems, Rep. Goodloe Byron has joined

with several House members requesting the President to release \$58 million in FHA funds already allocated for this purpose. The letter follows-up previous efforts by House members to free the withheld FHA money, including a resolution co-sponsored by Byron last week calling upon the Office of Management & Budget (OMB) to immediately release the funds. Last year Congress appropriated \$100 million for water and waste facility grants for use during fiscal year 1972, the maximum amount allowable under the basic authorizing law. To date only \$42 million has been freed by OMB and the FHA currently has a backlog of applications totaling \$150 million which cannot begin to be processed until the balance of money is released. Byron said the rural redevelopment funds are needed to preserve small communities and help reverse the migration to overcrowded cities. He said the funds will also protect the natural environment and remove health hazards caused by unclean water.

VA Gives Dividends On Life Insurance

The Veterans Administration has some welcome news for 4.1 million veterans due a record \$286 million in dividends paid this year on World War I and II government life insurance policies.

The dividends, Mr. George A. Davis, Director of the Baltimore Veterans Administration Regional Office, said are not subject to Federal income tax, and need not be reported as income on tax returns.

Veterans who have instructed the Veterans Administration to hold insurance dividends in interest bearing accounts, however, must report accrued interest as income, and pay Federal tax on it, Mr. Davis pointed out. One out of seven veterans falls into this category, he said.

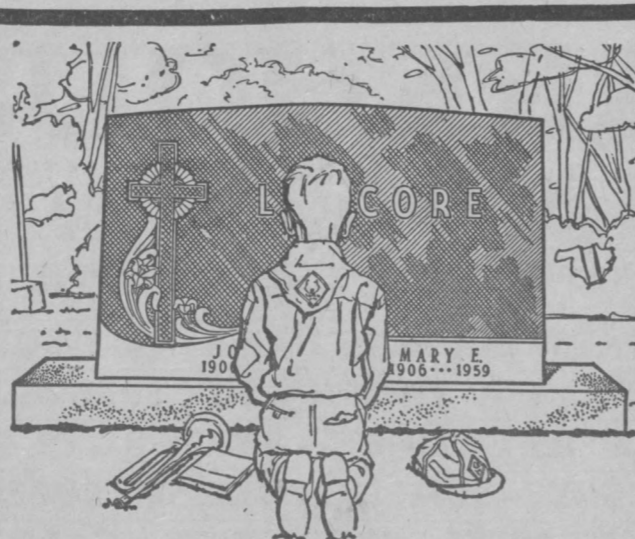

FREDERICK COUNTY BACKGROUNDS

 Again—The Eichelbergers
 The year's at the spring
 The day's at the morn;
 Morning's at seven

 The obituary of the first
 Dr. James W. Eichelberger, as
 it appeared in the "Adams
 Centinel," published in Get-
 tysburg, Pennsylvania, is con-
 cluded at this time.
 "Dr. Eichelberger first prac-
 ticed his profession at Woods-
 boro, Maryland, for several
 years but about 1830 moved
 to Emmitsburg. Here he had
 remained and, at the time of
 his retirement from active
 practice, was the most re-
 spected physician in the vi-
 cinity.
 "Funeral services for Dr.
 James W. Eichelberger were
 held in Elias Lutheran
 Church and interment was
 made in the adjoining burial
 ground."
 In writing of Grayson Eichel-
 berger and pondering his

place on the family tree—if
 any—the record of his mar-
 riage and the fact that he has
 children (two) interred in the
 Elias Lutheran churchyard—
 all points to some degree of
 relationship between the Gray-
 son and the Dr. James Eichel-
 berger family.
 11. Married, Tuesday eve-
 ning, May 21, 1844 by the
 Rev. Solomon Sentman, Gray-
 son Eichelberger, Esq., of
 Frederick Maryland, to Miss
 Amanda Baugher, of Emmits-
 burg, Maryland.
 Note: There is a possibili-
 ty that Amanda (Baugher)
 Eichelberger was the daugh-
 ter of either Joseph Baugher,
 Esq., or Isaac Baugher, one
 of the early merchants in
 Emmitsburg. It will be re-
 membered that according to
 details given in his obituary,
 the senior Dr. James W. Eichel-
 berger, on first coming to
 Emmitsburg (probably from
 Creagerstown), found his first
 employment in the store of
 Isaac Baugher. All the Baugh-
 ers are interred in one row
 in Elias churchyard—just west
 of the Eichelberger graves lo-
 cated just back of the chancel

of Elias church.
 One thing is certain, how-
 ever, Amanda (Baugher) Eichel-
 berger was a descendant of
 that heroic servant of God
 —the founder of Tom's Creek
 Lutheran (now Elias) church—
 the Rev. John George Bager
 (Baugher). The Eichelberg-
 ers were in "good company."
 Now to return to data per-
 taining to the children of Dr.
 James W. (1) and Anna Marg-
 aret (Mottler) Eichelberger.
 In the obituary of Dr. Eichel-
 berger they are listed as follows:
 "... Dr. Charles D. Eichel-
 berger, Dr. James W. Eichel-
 berger, Jr., Mrs. M. E. Ehre-
 hart, and Miss Marion F. Eichel-
 berger."
 It would appear that Dr.
 Charles Dicks Eichelberger,
 the eldest living son of the
 senior Dr. James W. Eichel-
 berger at the time of his
 death, was never married. His
 grave is to be found in the
 Eichelberger plot in Elias
 churchyard. The inscription
 follows:
 7. Dr. Charles D. Eichel-
 berger, born March 2, 1835,
 died October 18, 1910.
 Dr. James W. Eichelberger,
 Jr., was married to Sarah
 Minnie Hoke and they had
 one child—a son—another
 Charles Dicks Eichelberger.
 All are interred in Elias
 churchyard.
 8. Dr. James W. Eichelberger,
 Jr., born December 5, 1841,
 died February 23, 1913.
 Sarah Minnie (Hoke) Eichel-
 berger, wife of Dr. James
 W. Eichelberger, Jr., and her
 son are interred together with
 their names and dates on the
 same stone. Their graves are
 a short distance away from
 that of the husband and father.
 9. Charles Dicks Eichelberger,
 born May 6, 1893, died
 February 6, 1938.
 "Saran Minnie Eichelberger,
 born January 12, 1863, died
 January 3, 1942.
 Mary Elizabeth Eichelberger,
 the oldest living daughter
 of the senior Dr. James W.
 Eichelberger, at the time of
 his death, is also interred in
 the Eichelberger family burial
 plot, in Elias churchyard. Her
 husband, the "Rev. Professor"
 Charles J. Ehrehart, is buried
 in the Evergreen Ceme-
 tery at Gettysburg.
 12. Adams Sentinal, Friday,
 August 13, 1869—
 Married, on the morning of
 August 5, 1869, in the Luth-
 eran church, Emmitsburg,
 Maryland, by the Rev. M.
 Valentine, D.D., the Rev. Prof.
 C. J. Ehrehart, Gettysburg,
 Pa., to Miss Mary Elizabeth

Federal Income Tax Questions Answered

Q. Are tax rates any lower for single people this year?
 A. Yes. The lower tax rates for single persons are reflected in the tax tables and tax rate schedules in the instructions for your 1971 Federal income tax return.
 Q. I know that the proceeds of a life insurance policy received upon death generally are not taxable, but what about the lump sum I receive when I cash in my policy? Is that also tax exempt?
 A. If you surrender your life insurance policy for a lump sum, you must include in income only that portion of the proceeds of the policy in excess of what you paid for it.

Q. I have two jobs. Can I deduct transportation expenses between one place of work and the other?
 A. If you work at two places in a day, whether or not for the same employer, you may deduct the expense of getting from one place to the other. However, if for some personal reason you do not go directly from one location to the other, you may deduct only the amount it would have cost you to go directly from one location to the second.
 Q. Are there any penalties for a tax preparer who sells information from a person's Federal income tax return?
 A. Yes. The Revenue Act of 1971 made it a misdemeanor for any person engaged in the business of preparing tax returns, or providing services in connection with such a business or for any person who receives compensation for filling out a return to disclose Federal tax return information or use it for any purpose other than to assist in preparing the return. Violations may be punished with a \$1,000 fine or a year in prison or both.

Q. If I pay someone to fill out my tax return, is he responsible for any mistakes?
 A. If you are not going to prepare your own return, you are still responsible for the accuracy of every item entered on your return. Therefore, you should exercise the utmost care in choosing as a preparer one who is both knowledgeable in tax matters and scrupulous in preparing a complete and accurate return.

New Members Join Bay Group In 1971

The Chesapeake Bay Foundation increased its individual memberships by more than five-fold in 1971, it was announced by Arthur W. Sherwood, executive director.
 At the beginning of 1971 the non-profit foundation had 600 members working to prevent permanent damage to the Chesapeake Bay and its basin. Today there are over 3,000 members.
 One-third of the active members trying to save the world's largest estuary live outside the Bay area, and some even reside in foreign countries.
 More support is needed for the 16 special projects of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, however, and a membership campaign is presently being aimed at the 70,000 Maryland boat owners registered with the Office of Chesapeake Bay Affairs.

BUSINESS AND THE STOCK MARKET

Who Benefits From Devaluation

By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., Mar. 22—The Nixon Administration's bill to devalue the dollar by raising the official price of gold from \$35 to \$38 an ounce was recently approved without change by the House Banking Committee. The approval at a time when the dollar was again under pressure from foreign currency speculators, focuses attention on the probable effect of devaluation on U. S. companies.

The extent of the devaluation of the dollar in relation to the price of gold is relatively minor and the stock market had been "psychologically prepared" for it for some time. Hence, investor reaction to the move has been generally favorable. After an initial period of indecision, the Dow Jones Averages moved strongly upward and (as of this writing) prices have held their gains quite well.

Long-Range Implications

Looked at from an investor's point of view, the decision to devalue the dollar and realign other key currencies has bullish long-term connotations. It has been thought that one reason for the slow recovery of the national economy from the 1969-1970 recession was that the flood of foreign merchandise into this country over recent years depressed demand for U. S. merchandise. So, making foreign goods more expensive should increase demand for U. S.

made goods, thereby boosting domestic employment. And exports of our merchandise should expand because prices to foreigners will be lower in terms of their money.

On the face of it, then, both U. S. firms that derive a sizable portion of revenues from export and those that have been hard pressed by foreign competition here at home should benefit from a devalued dollar. However, things are not quite that simple. Caterpillar Tractor for example could be expected to show significant gains as a result of dollar devaluation since 83% of its volume comes from foreign sales. Yet competitive benefits from lower prices of its equipment in terms of foreign currencies will be restricted by (1) slow-downs in economic activity in many of Caterpillar's customer countries, (2) inelasticity of demand for earth-moving equipment, and (3) the fact that Caterpillar already holds a dominant position in its own particular industry.

Impact On U.S. Companies

In spite of the somewhat muted benefits to Caterpillar from devaluation of the U.S. dollar, the Research Department of Babson's Reports is of the opinion that higher profits are in prospect for this company for 1972 as a whole, and retention of the issue is recommended. There are, of course, a number of corporations with heavy foreign business that could be expected to derive some benefit from dollar devaluation.

Those mentioned here all carry "hold" advice.

Particular attention is directed toward those concerns with 50% or more of total sales in foreign markets: Santa Fe International (70%); American Smelting & Refining (65%); Otis Elevator (61%); Colgate-Palmolive (55%); and Columbia Pictures, Reading & Bates (each 50%). Close on the heels of these leaders are some important companies, with 40-50% of their sales made abroad: Pfizer (47%); Ferro (46%); National Cash Register and Standard Oil of California (each 45%); Black & Decker, Chesebrough-Pond's, and Gillette Company (each 43%); Dow Chemical and Texaco (each 40%).

Even those firms with foreign sales in the 30-40% range are worth considering by investors eager to take advantage of the opportunities stemming from devaluation of the U.S. dollar: International Business Machines (39%); Culligan International (38%); Singer Company and Warner-Lambert (each 36%); Burroughs Corporation (35%); Honeywell (34%); Eastman Kodak, Trans World Airlines, and Upjohn Company (each 33%); Sperry Rand (31%); Aon Products, Bucyrus-Erie, and Xerox Corporation (each 30%).

Selective Service Has New Rules

The Selective Service System has issued its last major group of Regulation changes and thus ended more than two years of almost constant reform in draft policies and registrant rights. The Regulations issued today concern procedures for personal appearances and appeals, among other subjects. This action by Selective Service Director Curtis W. Tarr removes the administrative hold on personal appearances and appeals which has been in effect since late 1971. Tarr had directed the 4,100 local draft boards to suspend action on most requests for personal appearances and appeals so that registrants would be afforded the procedural rights incorporated in the 1971 amendments to the law.

The Regulations, which will become effective immediately, set a 15-day time limit following the mailing of a Notice of Classification card in which a registrant must request a local board personal appearance or an appeal. When he demonstrates that his failure to respond within the 15 days was due to reasons beyond his control, his local board may grant an extension of the 15-day period. The new Regulations also require local and appeal boards to give a registrant at least 15 days notice of his scheduled personal appearance before his local or appeal board. Another change announced gives a registrant who is under a long postponement of induction the right to receive consideration from his local board for a reopening of his classification to hear claims for exemption, deferment or conscientious objector status.

The new Regulations also allow a registrant to have up to three witnesses appear in his behalf at his local board personal appearance, require that a quorum of the members of the local board be present, entitle him to 15 minutes for his presentation, and state that his local board

must furnish him with the reasons should he receive an adverse decision on his classification request.

A personal appearance before a quorum of his state appeal board, and, when the vote of the state appeal board is less than unanimous, the Presidential appeal board, also are provided for by the new Regulations. These boards also must furnish the registrant with the reasons should he receive adverse decisions on his classification request. He is not allowed to have witnesses appear in his behalf before appeal boards.

Solar Energy Panel Seeks Solution To Energy Problem At University Of Md.

The growing demand for clean and non-polluting energy is a major problem for America—and it may be solved by the laboratories of industry and universities working together, according to a University of Maryland engineer.

A step in this direction has been taken with the creation of a Solar Energy Panel at the University of Maryland, College Park Campus. Headed by Dr. Frederick H. Morse of Silver Spring, an associate professor of mechanical engineering, and funded by a \$59,800 grant from the National Science Foundation, the panel was formed in response to President Nixon's message to Congress last June calling for answers to the energy problem.

The work of the panel will be to acquire and evaluate necessary information on potential uses of solar energy, so that a plan of action may be proposed. This plan would be based on conclusions and recommendations as to type, amount, and direction of research and development.

OPEN LINE

The following questions are typical of the kind asked of me in recent weeks: Letters should be sent to me, c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515.

What is our country's federal obligation to colleges and universities?

Your question can best be answered by reading the National Science Foundation report my office sent you on "Federal Support to Universities and Colleges, Fiscal Year 1970." The report focuses on federal support to individual universities and colleges for research and development, R & D facilities, and other support for science and engineering. Data on federal funding for nonscience activities are also given to provide a total picture of federal support for higher education. Interested citizens may order

copies from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. Please specify booklet NSF 71 - 16 when ordering.

Can it be arranged with the Veterans Administration to automatically apply dividends from my G.I. life insurance policy toward payment of the loan on the policy?

Yes, if you request VA to use your dividends for that purpose.

How do you feel about health insurance legislation?

Federal financing of limited health insurance programs on a voluntary basis is a good idea. In fact, I have co-sponsored a bill that would provide for medical and hospital care through just such a program. Under this proposed legislation the insurance would be financed in whole for low-income families and in part for all other persons through allowance of tax credits. The purpose of this Medicare Act is to make it possible for every individual to obtain comprehensive medical and hospitalization insurance designed to protect against ordinary and catastrophic expenses of illness regardless of prior medical history and on a guaranteed renewable basis.

My wife and I are planning to purchase a small motorboat this summer, however, in the meantime we thought it would be a good idea to become somewhat knowledgeable on boat safety. Can you suggest any books?

The U. S. Coast Guard publishes a free booklet which I think you might enjoy. It's called "Everything You Ever Wanted to Know About Boating . . . But Were Ashamed to Ask" and can be ordered from the Office of Boating Safety, 400 7th Street, S.W., Washington, D. C. 20590.

Filing Guidelines For Md. Income Tax

By LOUIS L. GOLDSTEIN
Comptroller of the Treasury
The following questions are asked by many taxpayers and this is a good time to answer them. I hope you will find them helpful:

I received income of \$500 in addition to my Social Security of \$1,500 in 1971. Must I file a tax return?

No. Social Security payments are not taxable and no income tax return is required. As a single person you are not required to file as your other income is under the \$1,700 basic filing requirement.

Is interest received on U. S. Bonds taxable on my Maryland Tax return?

No. Interest received on bonds of the United States government is not subject to the Maryland Income Tax and should be deducted on your Maryland return.

Is interest I received on Maryland and New Jersey bonds taxable in Maryland?

No. (Maryland) Interest received on bonds of the State of Maryland or any of the subdivisions of Maryland is not subject to the Maryland Income Tax.

Yes. (New Jersey) Interest on bonds of other states and their subdivisions is subject to the Maryland Income Tax.

I live in the District of Columbia but work in Maryland. Must I file a Maryland return?

Under present law, you are not required to file a return in Maryland. Similarly, Maryland residents employed with

in the District of Columbia are not required to file returns there. There is a reciprocity provision of both Maryland and D.C. laws which allows the taxpayer to file and pay his income tax in the State where he resides.

I am receiving Social Security, but in 1971 I worked part-time for a firm which paid me \$600 and withheld \$5.00 for Maryland Income Tax. Must I file a Maryland return?

Yes. In order to have the money withheld by your employer refunded to you it is necessary that you file a return and submit with it the tax withholding statement supplied to you by your employer.

Do I have to itemize my medical expenses and contributions on my Maryland return?

No to both questions. Just report on your Maryland return the total for contributions and medical expenses which you reported on your Federal Income Tax return.
