"Joey and the Birthday Present," by Maxine Kumin and Anne Sexton. There were a hundred and four mice in the deserted farmhouse, and Joey was one of the youngest. **Sister Ann Margaret Of Emmitsburg Professes Vows To Carmelite Sisters**



On Monday, April 3, 1972, the Motherhouse and Novitiate of the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm in Germantown, New York, was the scene of the Profession of 18 Novices. After the completion of two years Novitiate, the Novices made first Temporary Vows for one year in the presence of His Excellency, The Most Rev. Edwin Broderick, Bishop of the Diocese of Albany, who presided at the ceremony. The Rev. Mother M. Angeline Teresa, present Mother General and Foundress of the Congregation accepted the Vows in the name of the Congregation. The newly professed Sisters represent 14 different Dioceses throughout the United States and the Glasgow Diocese in Scotland.

The Ceremony was attended by the families of the newly professed and members of the Congregation. A luncheon was served after the ceremony.

The Congregation was founded in 1929 by Mother Angeline Teresa to render modern concepts of care to the Aged. At the present time the Congregation staffs more than 30 homes for the aged throughout the country.

Among those who made first Profession was Sister M. Ann Margaret, the former Miss Gloria Jean Myers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert G. Myers, 218 West Main St., Emmitsburg, Maryland.

Sister Ann Margaret is a graduate of St. Joseph's High School and a member of St. Joseph's Parish. She was employed as a Library Assistant before entering the Congregation. After a short visit with her family, Sister will be joining the staff of the Carmelite Sisters in Carroll Manor, Hyattsville, Maryland.

**R. Lauer Promoted To Full Professor**

Dr. Raymond R. Lauer, Chairman of the Business Department at Mount Saint Mary's College, is being promoted to full Professor. Academic Dean, Bernard S. **Victims Left Along Rt. 15 After Assault**

A Florida trucker was apprehended by state police from Everett, Pa., on the Pennsylvania Turnpike in connection with alleged assaults of two teenager girls on Route 15, south of Emmitsburg early Tuesday.

Maryland State Police at Frederick said they were bringing charges of two counts of assault and attempted murder against the suspect arrested in front of the Everett substation on the turnpike nine miles west of Breezewood between 9 and 10 a.m. Tuesday.

The Everett police tentatively identified the suspect as George Smith, in his late twenties, from Calahan, Fla. They said Frederick State Police had already started extradition proceedings to return him to Maryland.

The assault incident reportedly resulted in the admittance of Linda Price, 16, St. Petersburg, Fla., to the intensive care unit of the Warner Hospital, Gettysburg, with a stab wound under the right arm. She was listed in satisfactory condition. Another girl, 17, allegedly involved, was not treated at the hospital. Frederick police said her identity is still being sought. A youth who was accompanying the girls, Robert Spence, 22, New York, reportedly suffered smoke inhalation but was not treated at the hospital. The three were taken to the hospital in the Emmitsburg VFW ambulance.

According to the Frederick officers the youthful trio apparently secured a ride with the black trucker while they were hitchhiking in North Carolina. The report indicated that when the truck neared Emmitsburg on Route 15, Spence was lured into the semi-trailer of the truck in the belief there was marijuana there. The trucker allegedly locked Spence in the semi-trailer and attacked the two girls at knife point, stabbing Miss Price. Meanwhile, police said Spence attempted to get out of the trailer by setting a fire causing him to suffer smoke inhalation.

After the alleged attacks, the trucker freed Spence and left him with the two victims along the side of the road.

Everett police made the arrest on the basis of a teletype sent out by Frederick officers.

## LOOKING AHEAD

**"Gay" And Revolutionary**  
The "Gay" people will be marching alongside the Communists in a big "demonstration" being planned to grab the news media spotlight when the Republican National Convention convenes at San Diego in August to nominate President Richard Nixon for reelection. "Gay" is the designation which the "New Left" has given to the homosexuals. Under the banners of "Gay Liberation Front" both the male and female homosexuals are being organized within the "New Left" movement. They marched as groups in last April and May "demonstrations" in Washington. They are expected in huge numbers to swell the ranks of the "peaceniks" at

San Diego. The "new morality" of the "New Left" has brought the sex deviates into such prominence that some of the Presidential candidates are expressing support for their legislative aims; and "Gay Lib" now is playing a formidable role in the "New Left"-born Women's Liberation movement. Here is some enlightening news from the underground newspaper, The Village Voice published in New York—news such as doesn't often get to the American public: "A flurry of gay political activity in New York this past week began with a zap of Senator Edmund Muskie. . . . Asked in front of a large audience about his stand on the repeal of sodomy

laws in New York (Muskie) replied he hadn't given it much thought. . . . Senator Edward Kennedy and Eugene McCarthy were confronted by homosexual activists. . . . (McCarthy) said he was opposed to discrimination against homosexuals. . . . (Kennedy) said 'I'd endorse and support civil rights of homosexuals. It's time that discrimination on the basis of security grounds ended. . . . "Gay" and "Women's Lib" The obscene but widely-read underground newspaper, Los Angeles Free Press, is the source of information on the amalgamation of the lesbian groups with the Women's Liberation nationwide organization in recent West Coast activities. At an event sponsored by various national organizations of the Women's Lib movement, two of the top panelists were identified in photo and news story in the Free Press as "Jean Cordova," of "Daughters of Bilitis" (identified as a "lesbian" nationwide organization) and "Dianne L'Heureux," of "Lesbian Feminists," another nationwide group. Both spoke on the program.

Star attraction on the panel was the widely-publicized Gloria Steinem of New York, "member and adviser of the National Organization for Women (N.O.W.) and co-organizer of the National Women's Political Caucus, along with Congresswomen Shirley Chisholm and Bella Abzug; and Betty Friedan," one of the "Women's Lib" founders. "Marx Not Radical Enough" Gloria Steinem revealed in her address to the assembled "Women's Lib" group in the Hollywood High School Auditorium that she wasn't at the present time "the classical Marxist that I once was" and that "I'm afraid Marx was not radical enough and a lot of things are not radical enough." She said she fell out

with the maleness of Marx after learning that "Marx lived off the jewelry and silverware of his middle class wife, and that his daughter committed suicide." She did not disclaim the Marxist political ideology, Communism. She did say near the end of her speech to the women: "It's the path to humanism we're on; and maybe with the revolution, it's a revolution, not a reform, right?"

Most of the "Gay" and the "Straight" revolutionaries who, according to plans of the planners, will be marching in the San Diego "demonstration," will bury the single-purpose that guides each of their activities as single groups. The project will be a typical "United Front" operation as envisioned by the comrades. If the best hopes of such as Jerry Rubin, Abbie Hoffman, Tom Hayden, David Dellinger et al materialize there will be tens of thousands of dupes: "restless" young people, pacifists, and some adults who are non-Communists, lending their presence to the affair—as usual. There will be a corps of perhaps 5,000 Communists, a handful of them calling the shots as decreed by their masters in Moscow and Peking, Hanoi and Havana.

**Leader's Identity**  
It would be well for the viewing public to watch the publicity handling of the affair, to see whether the full identity of "demonstration" leaders is given or just the label "pacifist" or "dove" or "anti-war demonstrator" used. There are significant dossiers on all of the headliners, compiled by the House Committee on Internal Security and the Senate Subcommittee on Internal Security. Most of the "demonstrators" and no doubt most of the prom-

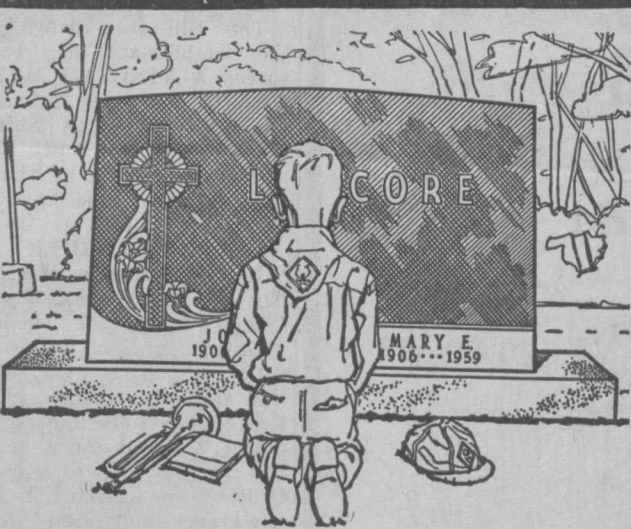

# BUSINESS AND THE STOCK MARKET

**Defense And Aerospace Upturn**  
By Babson's Reports Inc. Wellesley Hills, Mass., April 13, 1972—The worst downturn in two decades for the aerospace industry as a whole is giving signs of abating as the U. S. economy stages a recovery. Since the fourth quarter of 1971, many of the major aerospace and defense companies, now much leaner after extensive streamlining and more efficiently managed, have been taking heart from a more receptive Congress. No doubt improv-

ed business conditions, an ever-increasing Soviet arms threat, the nearing end of the Vietnam involvement, and the obsolescence of aging tactical weaponry—all making for a less hostile public sentiment towards aerospace and defense—are dictating the need for renewed activity. **Modern Aircraft And Missiles**  
Several major aircraft programs, development of which has already been funded, include (1) the B-1 advanced manned strategic bomber, (2) the F-14 Navy supersonic fighter, (3) the F-15 Air Force

superiority fighter, (4) the S-3A carrier-based antisubmarine aircraft, (5) the Navy A6 electronic attack plane, and (6) the AX counter-insurgency aircraft. Still waiting in the wings is the Airborne Warning and Control System. If fully funded for production, many of these could be billion-dollar programs.

In addition, in the area of missiles, there are such well-known potential systems as Poseidon (a seabased successor to Polaris), the important ULMS (the Navy's undersea long-range missile), Harpoon (a type of anti-ship missile), and Minuteman 3. It is generally believed that we have enough new weapons being developed to maintain a strong defense posture. However, increased funding is necessary before our arsenal becomes outdated.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) officials received the green light in January to select a contractor to develop a reusable space shuttle in the next six years. Complete government funding of the Skylab flights (successor to Apollo), the space shuttle, and the space station could mean a rebirth of the overall space industry. The space shuttle itself will represent an investment ranging from \$5.5 billion to \$6.5 billion.

The Research Department of Babson's Reports believes that the prospects for the commercial manufacturers are also looking up, especially as two new jumbo trijets are appearing on the market this year. McDonnell Douglas' DC-10 and Lockheed's L-1011 will be flying commercially, for the first time and will give Boeing's 747, currently in service, a competitive run. With air traffic already registering a substantial improvement this year, the aircraft companies should receive a pronounced uplift through new commercial orders.

**New Look In Contracting**  
Dubbed "Milestone," the new military contracting system promises to be more successful than past systems in avoiding extensive cost overruns. The technique is devised in such a way as to prevent a weapon from going into production until all development requirements & economic feasibilities are met. "Milestone" should render the aerospace industry less vulnerable to severe impacts stemming from possible cancellation of large-dollar amount contracts. On the other hand, aerospace companies, through more closely monitored competition, stand a much better chance to make a profit.

Using this plan, the school system would develop a relationship with business and industry so that indicators of success for various jobs could be established. This cooperative effort would make it possible for an ambitious high school dropout to apply successful work experience to qualifying for a high school diploma.

This program is very similar to the new "external" college degree plan which New York State has adopted. Persons who have never even acquired a high school diploma nor taken a college course can become candidates for this unorthodox degree program.

The candidates are required to pass examinations which indicate proficiency in the subject areas. The knowledge necessary for meeting success on the examinations might be acquired through practical experience or independent study.

Hopefully, these programs will become as accepted as the GED (High School Equivalency) program. The establishment of "external" diploma and degree plans will open new doors to adults who are unable to undertake the regular High School and College programs. This recent trend toward giving dropouts unconventional avenues to an education should be supported and encouraged. School Chancellor Harvey

Schibner states, "If the idea of High School is to prepare a student for the outside world, then he should be given the credit." Something must be done to give the dropouts another chance. The thousands of young dropouts trying to get jobs today need encouragement to give education another try. Programs such as the "external" plan are surely worth considering. What do we have to lose?

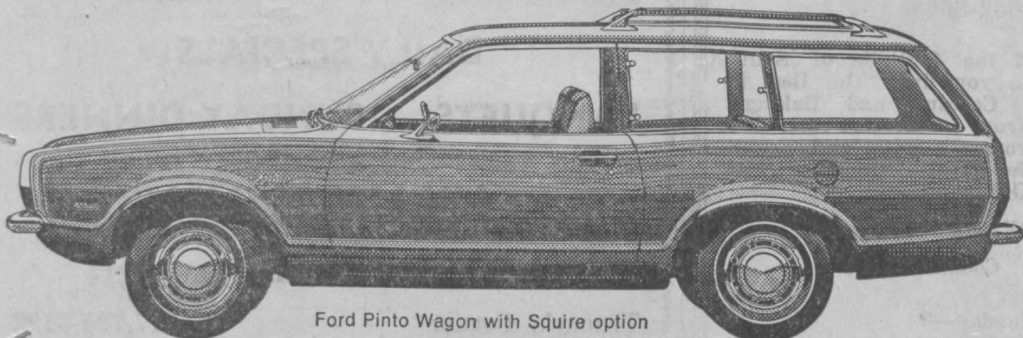

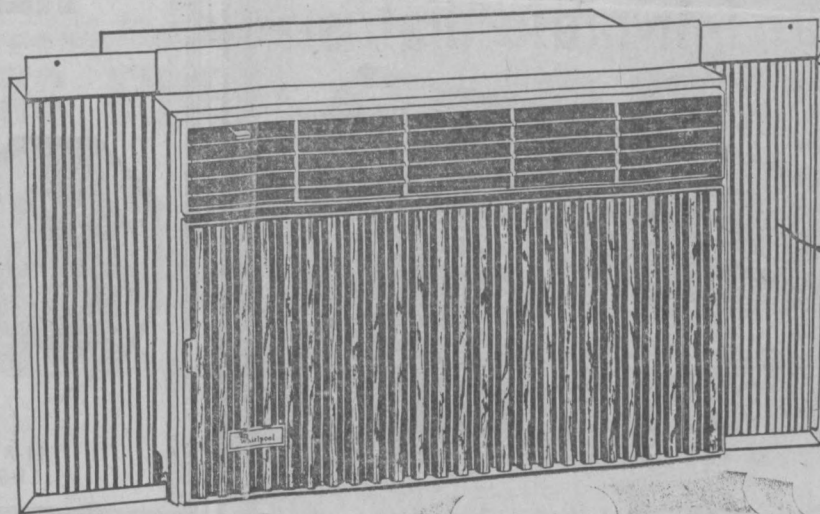

The following questions were typical of the kind asked of me in recent weeks. Letters should be sent to me, c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515.

What does the government do with all its surplus land? Why can't it be used for conservation purposes?

Under Public Law 91-485 surplus Federal property is now made available to State and local governments for park and recreation purposes. The law also increases the level of the Land and Conservation Fund until the program expires in 1989.

Can you send me information on the federal law relating to equal employment?

A guide has been published in relation to the Federal law prohibiting discrimination on account of race, religion, sex or national origin in private and public employment. "Equal Employment Opportunity Under Federal Law" can be ordered from the Public Documents Distribution Center, 5801 Tabor Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa. 19120, for 25 cents.

Will November 11 be designated as Armistice Day this year?

Last November, Rep. Olin Teague, Chairman of the Veterans Affairs Committee joined with me in introducing legislation that would recognize November 11 as Armistice Day. Since that time, Chairman Emanuel Celler of

the House Judiciary Committee, to which the bill was referred, has been urged to act on the measure during the current session of Congress and hopefully before another Armistice Day has passed. This legislation has received support among 6th District citizens and veterans clubs, and progress reports will be published in future Open Line columns.

I am currently enrolled at two colleges but am not receiving the proper amount of VA educational benefits. I think a mixup has occurred because my two Certificates of Eligibility were sent to VA separately. Can you help me as I am really in need of the money to pay tuition costs?

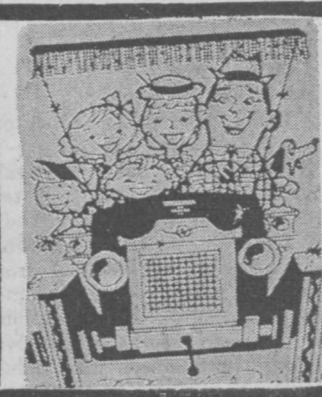
Upon receipt of your letter my office contacted the Veterans Administration concerning the benefits due you for your concurrent training. As you are now aware the mixup has been straightened out and a check for the upcoming semester has been sent you. Citizens experiencing similar difficulties receiving VA benefits justly due them should write my office in Washington for assistance.

What were the results of your questionnaire?

The 6th District survey is currently being compiled and the results will be reported in my May newsletter which will be sent you. Early returns indicate that crime, inflation, and taxes and government spending are uppermost in the minds of two-thirds of the citizens. Crime prevention appears to be the only area in which the majority of respondents think federal spending should be increased. And early returns are about evenly divided on the question of whether the Phase II controls are helping to curb inflation.

**Mt. St. Mary's Establishes Scholarship Fund To Help Middle Income Students**

Mount Saint Mary's College says inflation is discouraging too many academically qualified middle-income students from applying for admission to its campus, and it plans to do something about it.

The remedial action, in the form of a President's Academic Scholarship Program, has been started in time to have a meaningful effect on enrollment for next September's freshman class. After 163 years as a four-year liberal arts college for men, the Mount will have coeds in residence next fall, hopefully enough to fill Pangborn Hall, a 120-bed dormitory.

"Four years ago, 34 per cent of our freshmen came from middle-income families," said President John J. Dillon Jr. "In this year's freshman class there are just 14 per cent from middle-income homes. For a college that has always prided itself on offering opportunities to students from middle and lower income families, this is an unsatisfactory trend."

With only a small scholarship endowment fund producing \$20,000 per year for academic scholarship purposes, the Mount has decided that it must also make available \$25,000 in annual grants to talented middle-income students in each of the four undergraduate years, starting with the class of 1976 which enters next September. Designated the President's Academic Scholarship Program, the four-year plan calls for commitment by the Mount, subject to funds being available, of \$25,000 for additional academic scholarship grants during the current fiscal year, \$50,000 in 1972-73, \$75,000 in 1973-74, \$100,000 in 1974-75, and \$100,000 in each year thereafter.

Dr. Dillon said the new program assumes that while government students aid programs are geared to be of greatest help to young men and women from low-income families, a modest per-student scholarship grant to middle-income students, using college funds, could significantly increase the number of such students who could then afford to enroll at the Mount. A grant of up to \$500-per-year from the President's Academic Scholarship Program could form part of a total aid "package" including government loans or grants, and student earnings through participation in a greatly expanded campus work-study program.

"Thanks to more aggressive

college action, we expect this year to have more government student-aid funds allocated to the Mount than ever before," Dr. Dillon said. "Given what appears to be an acceleration of financial support from our alumni and friends, coupled with increased allotments of government student-aid funds, I believe we can turn our situation around within four years."

Dr. Dillon said the college looks for the first \$25,000 for the President's Academic Scholarship Program from the current 'Mount Fund' campaign which seeks to raise a total of \$150,000 by June 30. "The Mount Fund" is an annual college support campaign, organized under volunteer leadership by a 50-member National Development Council composed of alumni, parents, friends, and business and church leaders.

"Our newly identified priority need for scholarship funds places new urgency behind our 'Mount Fund' effort for this year and future years," Dr. Dillon said. "Augmenting these general campaigns, and no doubt a key to our ultimate success, will be solicitation of foundations, businesses and other major gift prospects among the alumni and friends of the college."

Dr. Dillon said an "instant" addition of \$2,000,000 to the Mount's scholarship endowment would immediately answer his need for \$100,000 per year.

"However, while we are not bashful about letting it be known that \$2,000,000 invested in the Mount now would be a philanthropist's money well given, our development sights are realistically set on gradual increases in goals for the annual 'Mount Fund', and an accumulation of special contributions from major gift donors within the various constituencies of the college. I am confident that an overwhelming majority of our alumni and friends will support us as we rededicate Mount Saint Mary's College to one of the primary purposes for which it was founded: to educate the children of middle and lower income families."

St. Joseph College will host the academic choir of Szczecin Technical University from Poland on April 18 through 20. The chorus, one of 16 international university choruses participating in the month-long Lincoln Center International Choral Festival, will perform in DePaul Auditorium on the Emmitsburg campus April 19 at 8 p.m.

Sponsored by the Cultural Events Committee, the concert is free and open to the public.

The performance is part of a national tour arranged by Lincoln Center prior to the choruses' concerts at Kennedy Center and Philharmonic Hall. The 15 visiting choruses will sing at 125 colleges, universities and schools in 22 states while in this country.

The individual choruses will perform the music of their own countries on their tours here before joining together with the U. S. Universities Chorus for concerts at Lincoln Center and Kennedy Center. They will also visit the White House and the United Nations during the month-long visit.

The participating choruses are from universities in Argentina, Brazil, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, France, West Germany, Great Britain, Hungary, India, Japan, Republic of Korea, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Poland, Uganda and the United States.
