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FREDERICK COUNTY BACKGROUNDS

Lewis M. and Alice (Rudisel) Motter
"God of our fathers known of old—
Lord of our far-flung battle lines,
Beneath whose awful hand we hold—
Dominion over palm and pine.
Lord God of hosts be with us yet—
Lest we forget—Lest we forget."

The listing of the children of Lewis Martin Motter and his wife, Alice (Rudisel) Motter is continued at this time:
2. Isaac M. Motter — Reformed minister.
Note: According to the Historian Williams, in his "History of Frederick" (Volume II) "Isaac M. Motter was born and reared in Emmitsburg, Maryland. He attended the public schools of his birthplace. Later attended Mercers-

burg College, Mercersburg, Pennsylvania, where he was graduated in 1873. He graduated in Theology in 1876 and was ordained in October of that year. Served in the active ministry in Maryland and Pennsylvania for a number of years.
"The Rev. Motter was married in October, 1878, to Ada Serena Kunkel of Shippensburg, Pennsylvania. They are the parents of nine children.
"In 1904 Governor Warfield, of Maryland, appointed the Rev. Motter, president of the Board of School Commissioners of Frederick County. He was also President of the Frederick and Woodsboro Turnpike Company."
3. Lewis Edwin Motter—Third child of Lewis M. and Alice (Rudisel) Motter—This son, as a young man, "Removed to the West."
4. Carrie May Motter — married A. A. Hack.

5. Grace Motter — married the Rev. George B. Reaser.
6. Ellen Motter — died unmarried.
Note: Buried in the family plot in Elias Lutheran churchyard. The inscription follows:
18. Mary Ellen Motter, born April 24, 1841, died May 27, 1865.
7. Alice Motter — married Dr. Robert Annan (first wife). Note: This daughter is also interred in the family plot in Elias Lutheran churchyard. The inscription follows:
19. In memory of Alice C. (Motter), wife of Dr. Robert L. Annan, born October 6, 1843, died April 18, 1878.
In the burial ground of Tom's Creek Presbyterian church, located just north of Emmitsburg, are the Annan graves. Here lies buried the husband of Alice (Motter) Annan and three of the daughters born to the Doctor's first marriage—as follows:
20. Dr. Robert Lewis Annan, born February 22, 1831,

died January 14, 1807.
21. Gertrude Annan, daughter of Dr. Robert L. and Alice C. (Motter) Annan, born March 22, 1822, died August 21, 1872.
23. Ann Annan—Died January 1971. (Undertaker's marker).
Note: Miss Ann Annan, the daughter of Dr. Robert L. and Alice C. (Motter) Annan, died comparatively recently — and her grave is in the plot at old Tom's Creek churchyard — where so many other members of her family are buried.
The eighth and last child of Lewis Martin and Alice (Rudisel) Motter was a son, who died quite young. His grave is in the family plot in Elias churchyard.
24. Sacred to the memory of William Rudisel Motter, son of Lewis M. and Alice R. Motter, died January 29, 1848, aged 2 years, 3 months, and 12 days.
Now to return to the study of the Lewis and Mary Magdalena (Martin) Motter family. The eighth child born to this couple was a son—as follows:
8. (Record taken from the family Bible). William Motter—born March 24, 1819 — baptized May 4, 1819.
Note: This son is also interred in Elias churchyard. The inscriptions follow:
25. In memory of William Motter, born March 24, 1819, died November 21, 1892.
26. In memory of Hannah C. Motter, wife of William Motter, died January 16, 1883, aged 61 years, 1 month, and 25 days.
27. In memory of Mary Josephine Motter, daughter of William and Hannah Motter, died March 14, 1855, aged 7 years, 3 months, and 18 days.
The ninth and last child of Lewis and Mary Magdalena (Martin) Motter is listed in the family Bible—as follows:
9. Samuel Motter, born January 11, 1821—baptized May 4, 1821.
The historical and genealogical notes pertaining to the Motter family of Maryland, will be continued in this series next week — with background material on the family of Lewis Motter, the founder of the Emmitsburg branch of the family. It will be remembered that this Lewis Motter, who operated and owned the first tannery in Emmitsburg, is also interred in Elias churchyard.

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BUSINESS AND THE STOCK MARKET

Geothermal And Other Energy Sources

By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., May 11, 1972—There has been increasing mention of geothermal power as one solution for the nation's energy shortages. There are several possible possibilities in the development of electric power from geothermal sources. One is the location and control of underground steam. The Old Faithful geyser in Yellowstone National Park is an example of underground steam and water reaching the surface through fissures, having been naturally heated and pressurized far below the surface.

Currently, the only commercial development of geothermal steam is in northern California's Big Geysers field. Here an oil company has drilled and producing steam wells; the steam is sold to a public utility partner for conversion to electric power. By 1975 the project will turn out 600,000 kilowatts, the energy equivalent of 21,000 b/d of fuel oil, and sufficient power to service a city comparable to San Francisco. However, the drawback of geothermal steam is that underground sources are few and far between and not

always in practical locations. It is an ideal nonpolluting "fuel," but it is obvious that in the immediate future it will supply only a fraction of our energy needs.

Another potential source of geothermal energy would be man-made. The Atomic Energy Commission, in its Plowshare program, proposed to detonate a nuclear device far below the earth's surface. The hot cavern created would be charged with water to produce steam for surface power generation. This would appear to be a feasible concept, but implementation is unlikely until well into the future.

Tar Sands
Athabaska tar sands are named for the river along which they are found in north-east Alberta, Canada. The sands are one of the greatest potential reservoirs of oil in the Western Hemisphere, but today production is limited and barely out of the experimental stage. Many of the major oil companies have interests in the tar sands, but only one has achieved meaningful production, now near an average 42,000 b/d of synthetic crude oil. Tar sands represent a promising source of fuel, but only after lengthy and costly

development. The end of the decade may possibly see tar sands providing profitable production.

Oil Shale

Related to tar sands is a mineral known as oil shale rock, another likely fuel-for-the-future. This is found in abundance in Colorado, Utah, and Wyoming. It is possible to extract one pound of hydrocarbons (essentially oil) from every ten pounds of shale. Estimates indicate that there may be in excess of one trillion barrels of oil trapped in the shale oil deposits. Although it has been in the process for over fifteen years, shale oil extraction is still largely a pilot plant operation. In all, it has been calculated that it might require \$200

million to develop a 5,000 b/d plant, possibly by 1975.

An interesting side road for the shale oil extraction process is the possibility of modifying it sufficient to handle the vast coal deposits found in the Western states. Since it is far from Midwest markets, the coal is presently costly to transport. Using the shale process, the coal would be treated to remove water and other impurities (30% of weight content), leaving a low-sulfur product which could be transported economically to a ready market.

In Summary
Synthetic fuels will make some progress in the years ahead, with commercial use expected by 1980. But even in that decade they will probably contribute only about 2% of our energy requirements. By that time, energy needs would be about twice

what they are today. Population expansion, many more automobiles, and huge increases in the use of electric power will create the utmost demand for energy. Therefore, it would seem logical that efforts to develop resources such as synthetic fuels and geothermal energy should be given high priority.

Seidel, the course is being offered for the first time this year to help prepare its participants for the state CPA test to be administered in November. The course will be a non-credit course.

The Saturday morning following the last class in each topic.

Instructors for the course will be headed by Dr. Raymond R. Lauer, chairman of the Mount Saint Mary's Business Department and will include Professor Seidel and Professors George M. Spring, Donald R. OPEN LINE

The following questions were typical of the kind asked of me in recent weeks. Letters should be sent to me, c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515.

What is Congress doing to stop drug abuse in our country? A short time ago the Drug Abuse Treatment Act of 1972 was passed by Congress and signed into law by the President. The Act establishes a Special Action Office for drug abuse prevention with the objective of significantly reducing the incidence of drug abuse and developing Federal strategy to combat drug abuse. The new law also incorporates provisions of a House bill I co-sponsored which specifically encourages research and development of a long-lasting nonaddictive drug for heroin and establishes clinical research facilities for this purpose. I am hopeful that this new law will help cure the heroin addict of his disease and serve as a significant step in the fight against crime and drug abuse in the United States.

What is the extent of FHA financial assistance in our area?

Framers Home Administration assistance for current rural community service projects in the 6th District exceeds \$8 million. Assistance includes outright grants for water and sewerage projects as well as direct and insured-

loans. My mother worked in a laundry all her life and is now unable to do any work because of rheumatism in her legs. Can you help her get disability payments from Social Security?

Upon receipt of your letter the Social Security Administration was contacted and your mother's case was placed before a hearing examiner. As you are now aware, based on the evidence of her case, she will begin receiving approximately \$89 monthly. A lump-sum check for benefits retroactive to May 1971 will also be sent her. Other citizens encountering difficulties with Social Security matters should feel free to contact my office for assistance.

Why do you support legislation to increase Social Security benefits this year? I favor a Social Security benefit increase because a retired person who draws Social Security and lives on a fixed income is generally hit much harder by inflationary pressures such as food prices and property taxes. I also favor an increase in the \$1680 outside income limitation now set up by the Social Security Act. The present limitation is unrealistic in today's inflationary economy and unnecessarily penalizes those citizens receiving Social Security who want to earn a livable outside income.

Teenager Dies In Harney Rd. Crash

A Taneytown girl was one of 11 persons to die on Maryland roads over the weekend. Three persons perished in boating accidents and two in a Baltimore fire.

Margaret Irene Corum, 15, of 10 Frederick St., Taneytown, died of injuries received when a car her brother was driving Friday at 11 p.m. ran off Harney Road and struck a tree, Westminster State Police said.

Miss Corum was transported to Carroll County General Hospital and transferred to Baltimore's University Hospital where she died of multiple injuries, police said.

Howard Charles Corum, 17, of the same address, was operating a sedan south on Harney Road when he apparently lost control and ran off the road into the tree, police reported.

State Police Tfc. C. K. Snyder charged Corum with reckless driving, according to police.

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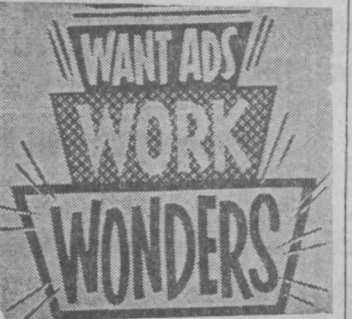
