The Tamburitzans of Duuesne University will present their 1972-73 concert production in the DePaul Auditorium of Saint Joseph College on Wednesday, November 1, at 8:00 p.m.

Tamburitzans To

The concert marks the first appearance by the group in the Emmitsburg area and is presented by the Mount Saint Mary's College Cultural Events Committee.

The Tamburitzans are a collegiate group of 35 talented folk artists dedicated to the preservation of Slavic folk culture in the United States. They take their name from the musical instrument they play-the tamburitza.

Using over 500 authentic costumes in each concert, the Tamburitzans sing in a dozen different European languages and do the dances of as many countries. Their performance is a two hour spectacle of music, color and dance.
