Most Anything At A Glance

More than a few of us were a bit surprised last Thursday to wake up and see snow outside. But it came and went so fast, that evidently it was just Old Man Winter giving us a small hint of what to expect. Seemed a bit early in the year, to me, to have all that white stuff on the ground. Noticed a lot of people took the warning to heart and scurried right out to get snow tires on and cold weather gear for themselves.

Seems to me it's about time something was done about that "hump" that runs down most of the middle of Main Street. There are places that it isn't suitable to park a car—you either have to climb out one door or roll out the other. I've heard that the State is in charge of that street and I certainly wish they would get it leveled out before bad weather hits, though that's probably asking too much.

Which reminds me, there are still a few sidewalks around town that are in pretty bad shape. There are a couple of spots that couldn't even be referred to as "sidewalks", more like "stumbling walks".

I ended last week with "Comments, anyone". There were a lot of comments voiced, and even a few written in to me. It would appear that the McGovern fans are at least the most vocal about expressing their ideas. Good thing, too, we need them to interpret what George is trying to say. Let's hope that these unofficial spokesmen know what they are talking about when they say what he is talking about!

Dear Concerned Citizen:

I would like to reply to the criticisms, accusations, and concepts, which you expressed in your letter to Abigail.

First, Senator McGovern has stated his views on welfare many times, including his televised speech on the economy this past Friday. He indicates that he wants the people who can work to be put to work and those who are disabled to have decent incomes. I think the 47% figure you speak of refers to the proposal which he has long ago rejected. Incidentally, what that proposal really amounted to was income assistance for below average income families. This proposal was much like the one which Mr. Nixon supported but later changed his mind on this past year. Actually, both men have changed their minds on this matter, yet only George McGovern is called inconsistent.

The real welfare issue is unemployment. Welfare's only function is to support those without jobs. During the Nixon administration, welfare rolls have nearly doubled. Two million workers have lost their jobs these past four years.

The Nixon plan is to retrain these people. This is fine except that after training there are still no jobs, so what good is training? Only 5% of the retrained have found jobs. Nixon's work ethic blames those on welfare for not working, but he hasn't done anything to help employ them. In fact, he consistently calls those proposals which provided for needed public service jobs "inflationary." Perhaps this is the out-of-work ethic.

Senator McGovern would propose to establish much needed public service jobs—such as environmental protection jobs, public transportation, construction of homes, schools, and hospitals. He would support the establishment of day care centers so that dependent mothers on welfare can work instead. Employment is certainly the answer to the welfare mess and it can be done without increased tax burdens.

Please tell me this—why, if the average citizens are tired of bearing the welfare burden, do they condone the 8 million dollars in tax loopholes Mr. Nixon has given? Is this kind of action fair?

The second issue I wish to speak of is that of the danger of a President McGovern. In my opinion, the people have

Tamburitzans To Appear At College

The Tamburitzans of Duquesne University will present their 1972-73 concert production in the DePaul Auditorium of Saint Joseph College on Wednesday, November 1, at 8:00 p.m.

The concert marks the first appearance by the group in the Emmitsburg area and is presented by the Mount Saint Mary's College Cultural Events Committee.

The Tamburitzans are a collegiate group of 35 talented folk artists dedicated to the preservation of Slavic folk culture in the United States. They take their name from the musical instrument they play—the tamburitza.

Using over 500 authentic costumes in each concert, the Tamburitzans sing in a dozen different European languages and do the dances of as many countries. Their performance is a two hour spectacle of music, color and dance.

Every Tamburitzan is a full-time student at Duquesne University, and each member receives a full-tuition scholarship in exchange for participation in the troupe. Candidates are chosen on the basis of academic achievement and proficiency as singers, dancers or instrumentalists. As members complete their four years of college work and graduate, their places in the group are taken by incoming freshmen.

Each year the Tamburitzans present an entirely new concert portraying the culture of the Slavic peoples of the world. The professional credits of Pittsburgh's collegiate performers extend over the United States, Canada, Europe and Latin America. Serving as goodwill ambassadors for the United States State Department, the Tamburitzans have made extended concert tours of Europe in 1950 and 1952, Latin America in the summer of 1968, and Romania, Poland and the Soviet Union during the summer of 1969. For their 25th anniversary the Tamburitzans toured Europe in 1962.

Bloodmobile At Mount St. Mary's

The Red Cross Bloodmobile visit to Mt. St. Mary's College near Emmitsburg, on Tuesday, Oct. 10, resulted in a net collection of 130 pints of blood. A total of 142 persons appeared with 10 being deferred for medical reasons, and two unsuccessful in donating a full pint of blood.

Of those appearing, 109 were students at Mt. St. Mary's; 15 were Seminars; three faculty and staff; three St. Joseph College students, and 12 outsiders. A total of 78 were first time donors in the Frederick County Blood Program.

Dr. Shaum Returns From Sabbatical



Rev. Dr. David W. Shaum, Professor of Music at Mount Saint Mary's College and director of the Mount Glee Club, has returned from a year's sabbatical leave which he called "as challenging as it was diversified."

Fr. Shaum spent the Fall semester of his leave studying at The Indiana University School of Music in Bloomington, Indiana, the largest music school in the world. Fr. Shaum studied with such noted figures in music as Dr. Julius Herford, Bach scholar and musicologist, Paul Matthan, a distinguished concert vocalist, and Xannis Xenakis, mathematician and musician who is a specialist in electronic music.

He spent his Spring semester at Temple University School of Music in Philadelphia, where he worked with Mr. Robert Page, recently named Director of the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra Chorus. He also performed as a member of the Singing City Chorus of Philadelphia, an all-community chorus that strives to prove that music unites all men. The group is directed by Dr. Elaine Brown, a pioneer in this field. He ended his leave with a Caribbean cruise and a tour of France.

Fr. Shaum is currently preparing the Gleemen for an extensive Fall concert season of appearances throughout the area.

On November 1, the group will appear in Hanover at the banquet of the Distinguished Citizen Awards, and at the Visitation Academy in Frederick on December 3. On December 6, the Gleemen will appear before the Taneytown Ki-Wi's, and will perform their annual Christmas concert in the Mount College Chapel on December 10.

In a new approach to Yuletide celebration, the Glee Club will sponsor its first annual Madrigal Dinner on December 8. Tickets for the musical and theatrical production, which will feature the costume, atmosphere, and dinner of an Elizabethan court, will go on sale early in November.

FREDERICK COUNTY BACKGROUNDS

BY SAMUEL CARRICK
More About the Beard Family
 "A suns and skies and flowers of June, Count all your boasts together, Love loveth best of all the year Octobers' bright blue weather."

The records of Trinity Lutheran Church, Taneytown, Maryland, list the baptism of three children of Daniel and Barbara Beard—namely Joseph Albert Beard, Sarah Elizabeth Isadora Beard and Ann Caroline Beard. Daniel W. Beard was probably a son of Frederick (1) and Magdalena Beard.

14. Baptized—Clara Sabel Beard—daughter of Isaac and Ann Beard—born August 4, 1858 — baptized February 5, 1859.

Note: Isaac Beard could well have been a son of Frederick and Magdalena Beard — but it must be stressed that definite proof of this relationship is lacking.

15. Baptized—Charles Edward Edwin Beard — son of Daniel W. and Barbara Eve Beard—born July 29, 1858 — baptized February 5, 1859.

Note: The above record speaks for itself.

16. Buried — Cora Mong Beard—died January 4, 1881 —aged 10 years, 6 months, and 24 days. Interment at Fairfield, Pennsylvania.

Note: This little girl remains somewhat of a mystery—the names of her parents are not given. Her grave is probably in the Union Cemetery at Fairfield.

17. Buried — Walter P. Beard—died January 7, 1881 —aged 8 years and 1 day. Interment at Fairfield, Pa.

Note: Undoubtedly a brother of Cora Mong Beard, who died just three days before her younger brother. Some highly contagious disease such as diphtheria or Scarlet fever was probably the cause of death.

18. Buried — Mrs. Samuel Beard — died January 5, 1882 —aged 82 years, 5 months and 10 days. Interment at Fairfield, Pennsylvania.

19. Married — September 5, 1867—George F. Beard to Miss Amanda Heighleigh — both of Adams County, Pennsylvania. (Ceremony performed by Pastor E. S. Johnson.)

This concludes—for a time at least—the data pertaining to the Frederick Beard family—pioneer settlers in Tom's Creek Hundred, Frederick County, Maryland. If at any time in the future additional material is forthcoming it will be included in this series.

The Singer family
 Listed among the more interesting tombstones in old Elias churchyard are those marking the graves of the Singer family. These are to be found in the northwest section of the plot. There may have been members of this family interred in the "ancient burial ground" at Tom's Creek—but if so—the graves are long lost. It must be remembered that two-thirds of this plot has been put "to other uses."

In Elias churchyard are the graves of the following:

1. In memory of John Singer, died March 24, 1849, aged 70 years and 3 months.

2. In memory of Sarah Singer, wife of John Singer, died January 13, 1893, aged 92 years, 3 months, and 28 days.

3. In memory of Charlotte Singer, daughter of John and Sarah Singer, died August 3, 1905, aged 76 years, 4 months and 12 days.

Note: Mrs. Hoover is interred in the same lot as her parents. If her husband is buried here his grave is not marked.

In another part of Elias churchyard is the grave of one more member of the Singer family. The inscription follows:

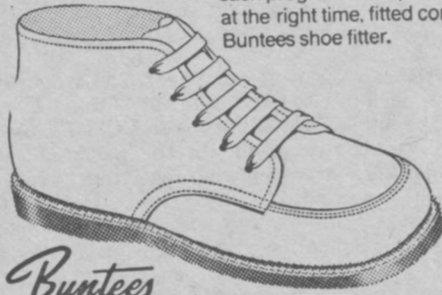
4. In memory of Susannah Singer, wife of Samuel G. Ohler, died October 25, 1841, aged 24 years, 3 months, and 27 days.

The notes pertaining to the Singer family will be continued in this series next week.

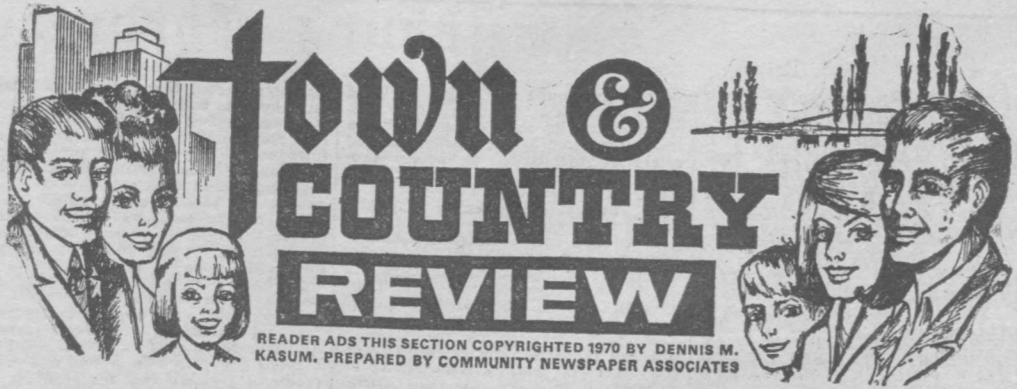

OPEN LINE

The following questions were typical of the kind asked of me in recent weeks. Letters should be sent to me c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515.

Has anyone ever done a study on the number of aircraft that are delayed over airports — it must be quite high?

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) informs me that the number of aircraft delays over 30 minutes reached a new low in August by averaging 38 per day nationwide.

I understand the Census Bureau surveyed fishermen and hunters to find out the public's interest in these sports. What were the results?

The results are a 108-page booklet loaded with detailed tables, charts and drawings on hunting and fishing. Chief

among the statistics was the fact that in 1970 more than 83 million people labeled themselves fishermen and 14 million as hunters. Who these people were in terms of age, sex and place of residence, what types of hunting and fishing they pursued, how far they traveled, and the manner and quantity in which they spent their money on the sport—are all detailed in the survey.

How can I get further information on the new survivor benefit plan for military retirees was signed by the President. This law (Public Law 92-425) replaces the present Retired Servicemen's Family Protection Plan (RS-FPP) for future retirees. You may obtain explanatory literature on this plan by contacting the military finance center maintaining your retired pay record.

I am a veteran of World War I with a 70% disability due to a shrapnel wound received in combat. My health has deteriorated and I feel that I am entitled to 100% disability compensation. Can you help me out?

Upon receipt of your letter my office contacted the VA in Baltimore. As you are now aware, based on your medical evidence, you have been re-evaluated as 100% disabled and accordingly, have been awarded increased compensation and a six-month retroactive check.

Citizens experiencing similar difficulties in receiving government benefits justly due them should contact my office in Washington for assistance.

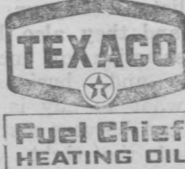

Reds In Ireland

In his book, *The Subverters* (Arling House), J. Bernard Hutton, former Communist Comintern officer and foreign news editor of Moscow's official Communist newspaper *Vechernyaya Moskva*, who has defected, and is now exposing the Communists, sheds light on situations around the world that have confounded well-informed as well as uninformed and misinformed Americans. He documents the fact that Soviet Communist and Chinese Communist bosses have "subverter" apparatuses tearing nations apart all over the world. Here is his report on the Communist activities in fomenting civil war and revolution in Northern Ireland.

"Moscow is over-eager to transform the explosive situation in Northern Ireland into a civil war between Ireland and Britain," he says, and he publishes secret documents corroborating his statements. "The Kremlin abandoned its customary caution and Russian diplomats in the United Kingdom were ordered with undercover subverters, so as to be able to feel the pulse of Northern Ireland's simmering discontent and make split-second decisions.

Names And Dates

"High-ranking security officers in Belfast know that Soviet diplomats cooperated with subverters and arranged deliveries of arms to IRA Provisionals. They know that Soviet diplomats and KGB agents supplied terrorists in Northern Ireland with arms, ammunition and explosives.

and planned their operations against British troops with the aid of Soviet military experts . . .

"Uglick Zbignew was a naturalized Pole, living in London. His credentials and cover story were sound, and he had found employment as a postman. Security officers know Zbignew (Soviet-trained subverter) was in Paris in 1968 and helped inflame the student rioting that created a revolutionary situation in France. On the 2nd of July 1971, Uglick flew to Belfast. His special services were needed to help stir up an ugly political situation. His subversive activities were short-lived, however. Soon after his arrival in Belfast, troops returned fire from a rooftop sniper and Uglick Zbignew was shot dead while scrambling over a rooftop. He was wearing a dark sweater and pants, his face was blackened and he was carrying a modern telescopic-sight rifle.

Red China Too

"Moscow's tactical blunder was to implicate Soviet diplomats with subverters like Zbignew. It enabled British security officers to establish links between Russia diplomats, the Angry Brigade, terrorists and Irish subverters; and to uncover large caches of armaments in the homes of Irishmen living in London and elsewhere."

Red China's Communist apparatus also reaches deep within the area of combat in Ireland, Hutton says. He published the full text of an official Chinese directive "which was transmitted in code from Peking's Special-Division-for-Subversion Headquarters to their master-subverters in Southern Ireland." Here are some excerpts:

"Recent activities in Area One (Northern Ireland): To increase guerrilla warfare is essential. The population of Area One must be convinced that it is the public's wish to liberate its country from British slavery. It is not enough to direct guerrilla warfare in

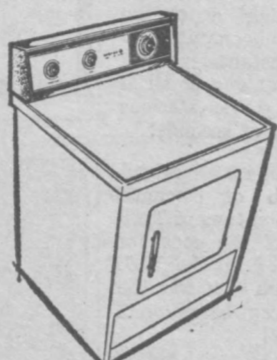
Area One from the safe area of Southern Ireland. It is not enough to brief undercover sub-agents, provide them with funds, weapons and explosives and send them into their field of operation without firm instructions and adequate training . . . Our objective is to plunge Area One into complete disorder and turmoil . . ."

Irish Youth Trained To Kill

There are five specific tactics to be used by the people mobilized by the Communist forces in South and North Ireland (as shown in Red China's secret orders to its subverters). Here are some:

"All undercover subverters must launch non-stop and widespread agitation throughout Area One . . . Master-subverters, through network subverters, will select suitable terrorists and instruct them in bomb-making . . . Master-subverters, through network subverters, must train large numbers of rioters with rifle-firing . . . aim at creating a small army. Children should be encouraged to throw gelignite nail bombs and other explosives at police or troops . . . Master-subverters have learned that the IRA Provisionals make good network subverter terrorists. Spare no effort or money to recruit as many as possible."

Hutton's book is an amazing documentation of activities of a world-wide army of Communist subverters. Next week, some light on Communist-guided skyjacking.

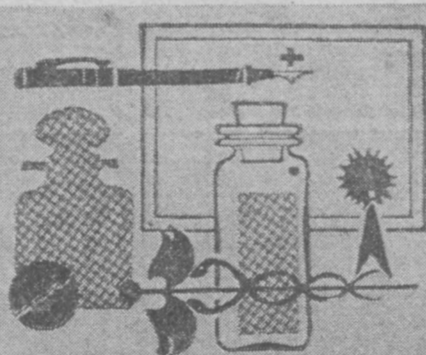

WASHINGTON REPORT FROM SENATOR J. GLENN BEALL JR. Project Find

A program called Project FIND is now underway to improve the nutrition of older Americans. It is an intensive 3-month effort to seek out the many senior citizens who are eligible for federal food assistance, but are not enrolled in any program. Nutritional deficiencies are related to the two most widespread problems of the elderly: isolation and trying to live on a fixed income. Many of these people do not realize that they are eligible for assistance, such as food stamps, as well as other special benefits. As a result, it is believed that persons over age 60 have the highest proportion of people who are eligible, but not enrolled, in food assistance programs.

Project FIND will try to locate these people and inform them of their eligibility. The Social Security Administration enclosed a bulletin about Project FIND along with the benefit checks that were mailed in August. The brochures, which went to 27 million Americans, are expected to generate hundreds of thousands of responses from persons requesting further assistance. The Red Cross has enlisted 50,000 volunteers to do follow-up work on the return mail and cases referred to them from other sources.

The Maryland Red Cross is participating in this work, and information also can be obtained through the Maryland Commission on Aging, which has a statewide telephone hotline. In the Baltimore area, its number is 685-0525. For the rest of the state there is a toll free number, 800-492-0270. Senior citizens should take note of the special considerations that might make them

eligible for food stamps, which are nothing more than a discount for the purchase of basic foods. For example, the level of income for eligibility could be affected by medical expenses, hospital bills and other extraordinary expenses. Also, possessions, such as a home, life insurance policies and personal property are not included when determining eligibility based on assets. As the ranking Republican member of the Senate Subcommittee on Aging, I have been deeply involved in studying the problems of older Americans and seeking solutions to those problems. But it also has become clear to me that our senior citizens do not want to be "put on the shelf" and do nothing while others wonder what to do for them. They want to be a part of the solution. That is why a program like Project FIND is so important. Its immediate goal is to locate people and get them enrolled in a self-help program to improve their nutrition. Yet there is another result that goes hand-in-hand with the immediate goal, and in the long run is probably more important. By locating these people, we also will be able to bring them into other projects—such as the Retired Senior Volunteer Program or Foster Grandparent Program—and thereby help end their isolation by getting them involved in community projects. Project FIND will continue through October, so if you need information or know someone who does, get in touch with the Red Cross, the Maryland Commission on Aging, or my own offices in Washington, Baltimore or Cumberland.
