





# BUSINESS AND THE STOCK MARKET

**Drug Stocks Still Popular**  
By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., March 29, 1973—So far, this has been a poor year for the majority of stocks on the major exchanges. Many of them are priced at their lowest levels in a number of years even though earnings in general are exceptionally good. Price/earnings ratios ranging from 8 to 10—usually symbolizing a bargain—are currently very common.

Throughout the generally unimpressive market, however, there has been one group that has continued to retain its popularity, that being the drug industry. The stocks of several of the prominent companies in the field have regularly been on the daily list of new highs, and issues of most of the other important drug firms have held up very well. Among the special favorites of late have been American Home Products, Schering-Plough, Eli Lilly, C. D. Searle, Richardson-Merrell, Upjohn Merck, and Johnson & Johnson.

**What's The Reason**  
The drug industry has been one of the most popular stock market groups for a long time. Why is this? Because in practically all instances earnings of the outstanding companies have increased year after year, with managements obviously very capable and profit margins maintained at high levels. In other words, prudent investors look for proven winners and they usually find them in the drug industry.

**Future Still IBright**  
Even though the pharmaceutical field has made great advances in the past, the future still seems to be as bright as ever. Among the many positive factors that should bring additional gains in coming years are strong overseas expansion and growth, higher living standards which result in further spending for medicines, a larger population, new drug products, broader medical insurance coverage, better diversification, and increased emphasis on nutrition and health.

There seems little doubt that the Federal Drug Administration will continue to scrutinize closely the drug industry and its products. And, from time to time, some companies will be forced to reformulate certain of their products or even remove them from the market. However, this has been going on for years without seriously hindering the industry's growth pattern and we do not look for any marked slowdown in the future due to actions of the FDA.

**Maintain Holdings**  
The Research Department of Babson's Reports is optimistic about the future of all the stocks of the leading drug industry, feeling that firms are attractive holdings for growth-oriented investors. This does not mean that the issues will not decline somewhat during weak markets, because they undoubtedly will. Nevertheless, over a fair period of time they should continue to make good progress in spite of the current high P/E ratios at which most of them are selling.

Those investors concerned about generous income, however, should avoid the drug group. For the most part the yields on such stocks are very low even though the drug companies frequently make small increases in their payouts. Most of the earnings are generally plowed back into the companies so as to foster further growth.

For those investors wishing to gain representation in this dynamic industry, Babson's Reports currently favors Pfizer, Richardson-Merrell, and Morton - Norwich. The last-mentioned does not have as impressive a past record as the other two but it is one of the more reasonably priced stocks in the group and should give a better performance in the future. Both Pfizer and Richardson-Merrell are high-class stocks that fully meet the qualifications of good growth issues. Pfizer is especially strong overseas, where it derives nearly one-half of its sales. Diversification is another one of the company's strong points. Richardson-Merrell is also fairly well diversified, and it has plans for expanding further in foreign markets.

# LOOKING AHEAD

By George S. Benson, President, National Education Program  
Searcy, Arkansas

Vice President Speaker At Forum  
Vice President Spiro T. Agnew will be the featured speaker at the National Education Program's 36th Freedom Forum, to be held April 12 in the American Heritage Center on the Harding College campus at Searcy, Arkansas, which is 50 miles north of Little Rock. There will be no charge for hearing the Vice President's speech. Loud speakers will be installed outside the 1300-seat auditorium to accommodate an expected overflow crowd.

The remainder of the Forum program will be held in the American Heritage Center auditorium. The theme of the Forum will be: "Responsibilities of the News Media in a Free Society." Our Board of Directors and our Freedom Forum Advisory Committee have selected this question as the most important confronting the American people in 1973. Forum speakers in addition to Vice President Agnew are:

**Distinguished Journalists**  
James Bormann, Minneapolis, past president of the Radio-TV News Directors Association of America, news director for 20 years at WCCO-TV, Minneapolis, and winner of more Peabody Awards (for outstanding achievement in news broadcasting) than any TV or radio station in Ameri-

ca. Mr. Bormann presently is director of public affairs for WCCO-TV. He is a journalism graduate of Marquette University.  
Edith Efron, contributing editor of TV GUIDE, has written articles for the New York Times Sunday Magazine, Look, Esquire and Time magazines. She is author of the documentary book, The News Twisters, charging bias in TV network coverage of the 1938 Presidential election.  
Abraham Kalish, Executive Secretary of Accuracy in Media, the private nation-wide organization "watchdogging" the news media and bringing actions requiring correction of broadcast or printed misinformation, upholding "the public's right to unbiased, balanced presentation of news and information."

**You Are Invited**  
As I have done since we inaugurated the Forums in 1949, I will keynote this Forum, and close it with "A Challenge to Take Home." The Forum program will start at 9:00 a.m. and close at 4:00 p.m. Since the National Education Program is non-profit and the Forum is a public service in communications, I can in this newspaper column invite people in every state in the union to attend. The Forum registration fee, including the noon meal, is \$20. We expect several hundred people from outside Arkansas.

As a journalist for 45 years, I subscribe wholeheartedly to the proposition that the public has the right to know. I also subscribe to the First Amendment's grant of free speech and press. But news and information are sacred substances for communication. If they are contaminated with bias, ideological advocacy, or a self-appointed adversary role by those who disseminate 'news' and 'information', the public's right to know is trampled on and our free society is endangered.  
**Criticism From Within**  
Some of America's most prominent and most respected journalists have publicly charged major news media, particularly the TV network news shows, with rejecting the responsibility of objectivity in news handling and thus coloring the news with bias, advocacy, and the 'adversary' role. These critics include Howard K. Smith, Washington anchorman for ABC-TV; Frank Shakespeare, former vice president of CBS in charge of the network's news department; James Bormann, WCCO-TV, Minneapolis; Robert Novak, co-author of the nationally-syndicated Evans-Novak column; Kevin P. Phillips, whose newspaper column is syndicated nationally; Miss Efron, and many others.
