Editor, Emmitsburg Chronicle:

The Emmitsburg Lions Club has received much adverse criticism for deciding not to sponsor the Childrens Christmas Party this year. As a self-appointed spokesman for the club I believe some response is in order.

Over forty years ago the Lions started the Christmas Party. At the time it was the only one in the area. For many years the party consisted of two hours of free movies from 10:00 a.m. to noon, followed by free lunch and then the arrival of Santa Claus. The children were kept busy for a good part of the day and their parents did much of their Christmas shopping in town at the same time. It was a fine idea when it started and it still is. However, like any project which continues over a long period of time, adjustments must be made.

The Lions Club at one time numbered more than thirty educators, business and professional men of the area including past and present publishers of the Chronicle. For various reasons (mostly because of too many other commitments) the number has now dwindled to ten. There were seven members present at the meeting when it was reluctantly decided not to sponsor the party this year. Among the things that influenced this decision were:

1. The uncertainty as to the number of club members who could help.

2. The sharply decreasing numbers of children at the party the last two years which seemed to indicate a declining interest.

3. Soaring prices would double the cost and make it necessary to ask double contributions from our patrons.

We want to assure all who may be interested that the Lions Club has not stopped thinking of others as Abigail suggested. Nor did we drop the childrens party so we could concentrate on a party for ourselves, alcoholic or otherwise, as was suggested by two of your readers.

We who voted to discontinue the party at this time felt it was the practical and necessary thing to do. We were not happy to have to do it. We are glad to learn that other clubs are taking up the idea and hope they make a success of it. We will support them in any way we can.

One of the sad features of this affair is the fact that there was not even a hint of a "thank you" in the Chronicle by either Abigail or anyone else to the men who originated the party and kept it going all these years.

Therefore I want to publicly express thanks to the two Charter Members of the Lions Club who are still with us, Clarence Frailey and Francis Matthews. They helped start the party and have worked on it every year. I also want to thank the many other good members both past and present, who helped to make this and many other Lions Club projects successful.

Parents and friends are invited to share the Christmas Carols on Wednesday evening in the SJHS auditorium. There will be no admission charge.

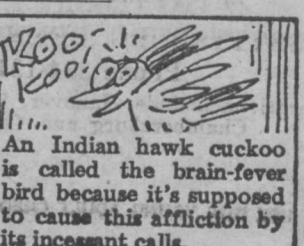
## Letter To The Editor

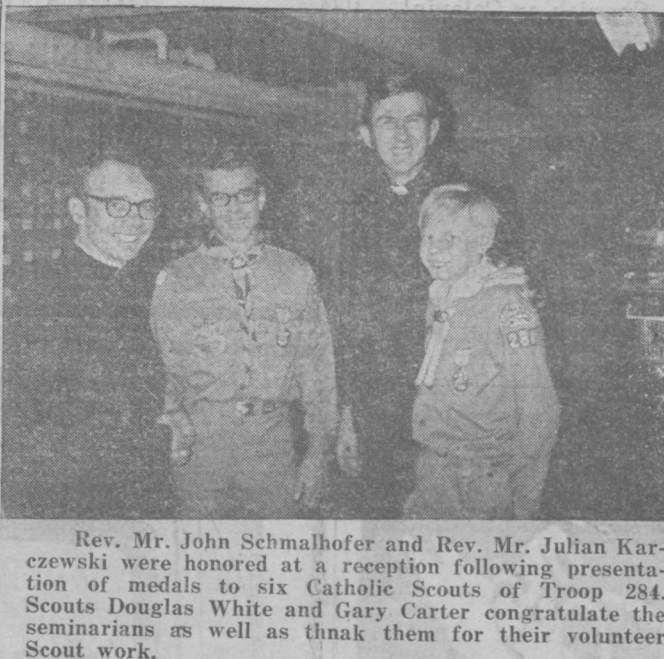

Legislation increasing the domestic supply of oil by opening the Naval Petroleum Reserve in Elk Hills, California, has been co-sponsored by Rep. Goodloe Byron.

Byron indicated the facility would provide 180,000 barrels of oil per day for our Naval Fleet, reducing U. S. military demands on domestic oil sources by a like amount.

Prior to the Arab embargo, the Armed Services were processing 350,000 barrels per day of foreign oil and 350,000 barrels per day of domestic oil.

## Sixes Amendment Not Included In Bill

Charles Fisher, president of the Save the Monocacy Association Tuesday urged Senators Charles Mathias and J. Glenn Beall to vote against the entire Water Resources Act because they had been unable to exclude funds for the Sixes Bridge Dam project.

The Senate Public Works Committee was to file the act Tuesday minus the Mathias-Beall amendment except for a proviso that the National Academy of Sciences will double check the Army Corps of Engineers study of the Potomac estuary.

The full amendment required that studies of alternatives to the Sixes Dam be completed before any funds are allocated for construction.

Mathias and Beall also asked that the Corps study not only the estuary but the impact of the Sixes Dam on the local economy and environment and a dozen other alternative sources of water for Washington.

Beall concluded that Public Works bills, loaded with projects for the entire nation, are very difficult to amend for one project.

The Public Works Committee bill passed the House earlier this fall despite an attempt by Congressman Goodloe Byron to amend the Sixes Dam out of it on the House floor.

The bill provides the Corps with \$6 million to study the estuary and with \$1.4 million to design and engineer the Sixes Dam here and the Verona Dam in Virginia. When Mathias and Beall announced their amendment on Oct. 29, Mathias declared he would vote against the entire bill if the amendment failed.

## Committee Names Advisory Group

In the fall of 1972, Principal Harper Long of Catoctin High School created a committee comprised of Catoctin High School staff members, parents of the school, and members of the the Board of Education. This committee became known as Project '73.

One of the recommendations of the Project '73 committee was: that a standing committee, made up of parents and interested community people, be appointed by the principal and the PTSA; that the functions of this group shall be to study curriculum, the effectiveness of local school programs, innovative educational ideas and other activities as requested by the school administration and/or the community, and to develop better lines of communication between school and community.

As a follow-up to this recommendation, Mr. Long asked Mr. William Mackinzie of Emmitsburg, a parent and PTSA member, to create such a committee by asking for volunteers to serve.

The committee, to be known as the Community Advisory Group was formed; the main purpose being to serve as a communication medium between Catoctin High School and the communities it serves. It was felt that a definite need existed for improved two-way communication between the community and the school. The following ideas were discussed as to ways to develop more and better communication: establishing panel groups composed of students, parents and faculty members and administrators; volunteers to speak to the various Catoctin community civic groups; to publish articles in the local papers about school activities and about the activities of the Community Advisory Group. It was stressed that this is only an advisory group and has no real authority other than to bring concerns to the community and to the school and to make suggestions and recommendations.

It was suggested that the names and phone numbers of the committee be published in the local papers so that people in the community who have suggestions, questions, and recommendations can contact these members.

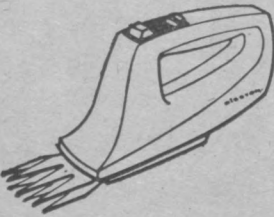

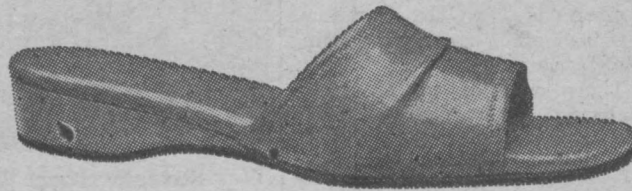

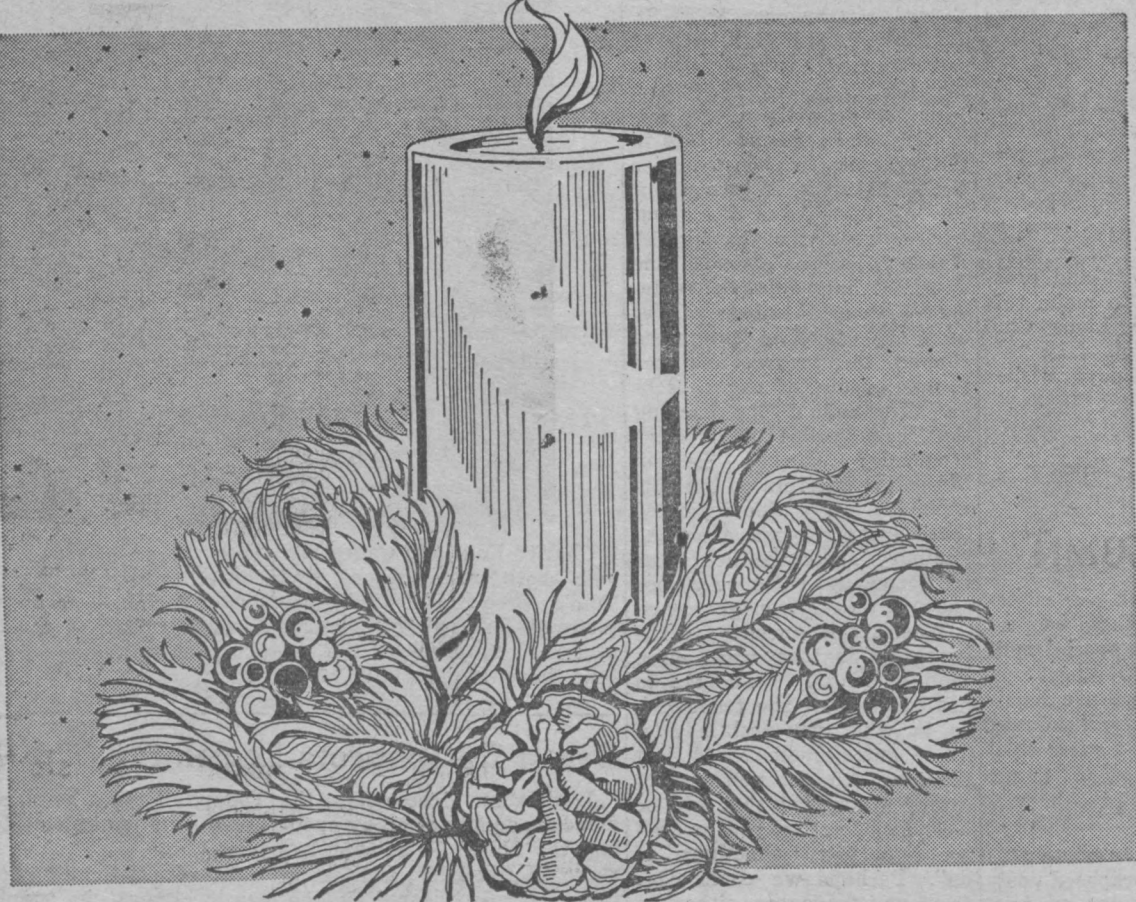

## PERSPECTIVES IN LEARNING

Dropouts Are Worth Saving

There are many young people who are discouraged with their educational experiences and are "calling it quits" to public education.

A few educators who are barely coping with the "average" students will rationalize and explain that most dropouts are slow learners and are probably better off finding a job rather than furthering their education.

Hopefully, the few educators who feel this way will remain the minority as many of us believe that at least 10 per cent of high school dropouts have IQ's of 110 or above and are certainly worth saving.

J. French, P. Witty and E. Torrance have participated in studies which indicate that highly intelligent young people are dropping out of school. In several surveys it has been discovered that hundreds of dropouts have had IQ's of 120 and above. These young people

have the capacity to learn and to benefit from their educational experiences.

The intelligent dropouts seem to have similar personalities, interests, and educational skills. They are considered to be frank, happy-go-lucky, easy-going, and deliberate in their actions. They tend to be rebellious, independent, assertive, and unconventional.

These characteristics fell within the normal limits as far as mental health was concerned. It would therefore suggest that these dropouts could be productive and could become successful citizens if given meaningful opportunities.

When questioned about their educational experiences, dropouts have expressed concern that schools are not preparing them for the "real" world. They felt that their teachers were unprepared and not really concerned about the students as individuals. Many of the dropouts resented the need to conform and to play "favorites" in order to get

good grades or to be accepted by their teachers.

The responses of these highly intelligent dropouts are very similar to those students who remain in school and attempt to cope with the situation. So the feelings are not unique to dropouts nor are they "cop-outs" or excuses for their lack of persistence. Problems do exist which are "pushing" out these young people.

Until we can do something to correct the causes of the problems we must continue to treat the symptoms and help the dropouts to recognize that many learning experiences are worthwhile and can lead to creative and useful ventures in living.

Why lose 10 per cent of our quality youth because we classified them as dropouts? Let's help to improve programs designed to give these young people another chance with an alternative-type of education. Dropouts are worth saving!

### Congress Nearer To Adopting Budget Reform

By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., December 13, 1973—When the history of the Nixon years in the White House is finally written, not too many outstanding domestic policy successes will be cited. But ranking high among these may well be the President's masterful needling of Congress, prodding it into acceptance of stricter controls over its whole appropriations process. Tightly Held Power

For generations Senators and Representatives have been so eager to retain and assert their constitutional "power of the purse," so fearful it might be usurped by the Chief Executive, that they have insisted on voting the money to run federal departments, agencies and programs on a piece-by-piece basis. Hence they have given little thought to total expenditures approved for any fiscal year and displayed insufficient awareness of the impact of spiraling cost of expanding programs which seemed modest enough when first authorized.

Net result of such undisciplined practices has been to weaken, not strengthen, Congress' power to control spending. The snowballing effect of such delinquency has been disastrous. It has led to huge increases of the federal debt and to continuance of an untold number of projects and programs not now measuring up to the economic and social benefits envisioned when they

### Presidential Strategy

Faced with enormous increases in costs, the President made deep cuts in his budget requests to Congress, eliminating from them many social programs he considered either too expensive or of doubtful value. In a number of instances, the answer of Congress to this parring was to restore deleted funds, often to increase them.

White House countered these moves by using the veto as an economy weapon and by impounding—or refusing to spend—funds appropriated to run a number of controversial programs. Although seemingly assured of eventual release of many of the impoundments via court action, Congress is fuming at the delays, is riled too at its inability to override the vetoes. Hence it has been stung into serious consideration of the budget reform it avoided so assiduously for decades.

### What It Is

What Congress is now in the midst of prescribing as a remedy for the nation's expanding fiscal ills—and as a curb on its own propensity to spend freely and indiscriminately—is a complete new budget system. The nation's fiscal year would be revamped to start on October 1 instead of July 1 as at present. Congress itself would clear all authorization bills for any given

fiscal year by March 31 preceding. By May 1, Congress would establish spending and revenue targets for the coming fiscal year, in toto and for each major government program area.

Money bills over and beyond these primary targets would not be sent to the President when passed. They would be held back for inclusion in a wrap-up spending bill slated to be acted on no later than August 1. After that Congress would have—in September—one final chance to raise, or lower, spending ceilings. Timing And Impact

It looks now as though Congress will enact such a budget reform bill by spring,

following fairly closely to the calendar cited above, and including also powerful Senate and House budget committees that will supervise a new congressional budget office. But it will then take several months to prepare for the changeover and we don't expect the system to be functioning before the fall of 1975.

The ensuing impact on business should be very favorable, for the new system will eliminate current uncertainties with respect to government spending and will make it easier to fund federal programs and the huge federal debt. In addition, it should help to curb inflation and improve international economic relations.

### Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q. I loaned my brother-in-law some money for a business venture that flopped. I know I'll never collect from him. How can I tell if the loan qualifies as a deductible bad debt expense?

A. When you claim a bad debt deduction you must have good evidence that the debt is worthless and will remain so in the future. You must take reasonable steps to collect the debt. It is not necessary to go to court if it can

be shown that a judgment, if obtained, would be uncollectible. If, in the exercise of sound business judgment, it is determined that there is no likelihood of recovery at any time in the future, the debt has become worthless.

Secondly, gifts cannot form the basis of a bad debt. Thus, if an advance is made with the understanding that it is to be repaid and is later forgiven, the advance is considered a gift and not a loan.
