New Waste Collection System Helps Solve Fuel Crisis

AM/FM RADIO

A new fuel-saving, waste collection system has been developed by Orbital Collection Systems, Inc., to help solve the "garbage explosion" problem. According to William W. Evans, president of OCS, a Washington, D.C. based company, the United States produced a mountainous 250 million tons of refuse in 1972-over five pounds per person daily. And this "garbage explosion" is growing at a rate of eight per cent annually, he noted.


The new system—called Orbie-offers municipalities a means of attacking this problem through an integrated waste collection service utilizing recyclable refuse bags designed to completely eliminate the garbage can and specially made shredder-compactor garbage trucks.

A tremendous advantage of the Orbie System is its fuel savings capabilities. For example, the Orbie System could save a city with a population of 25,000 up to 49,920 gallons of gasoline per year. With the average suburban police patrol car averaging eight miles per gallon of gasoline, the fuel savings from Orbie could give the car about 400,000






