

### How Experts Tackle 'Rust' Problems

But before you put that brush fort.

There are certain tricks of the trade which can save you money as well as unnecessary work. Researchers at the Rust-Oleum Corporation, experts in rust-prevention, pass along these key painting hints:

· When painting a metal fence, whether woven wire or chain interlock type, use a roller to apply the coating. It gets the coating on the fence, not on the ground or on you! Rollers should be used on barbed wire and this method is faster than brushing.

· To keep playground equipment in tiptop shape, do a little renovating after a year or two of use since exposure and hard knocks take their toll. If the equipment is already rusted, first use a good primer. Then, complete the job with a tough

A word of warning: don't use any kind of coating on the sliding surface of a slide!

· Genuine wrought iron is nearly rustproof. However, protective coatings are essential to preserve the beauty of even true wrought iron. And cast iron and formed steel that simulate wrought iron need this protection even more. If ornamental ironwork is fairly new, with a sound prime coat or finish coat, a single coat of a high quality metal-protective finish coat will give it new beauty and immeasurably longer life.

• If the metal is already rusted, give it new life by prim-



ing it after scraping and wire brushing to remove rust scale and loose rust. Then finish off with a high quality topcoat in the color of your choice.

· Thinning of a high quality coating is usually not required. But if thinning should become necessary, it is important to pay special attention to the instructions on the container's label. Use only the thinning oils or thinners the manufacturer recommends for best results.

Rust is caused by the chem-ical action of air and water on metal, and it's important to stop it before it starts. According to the researchers, rust can be stopped by keeping air and water away from the metal via high quality protective coatings.

· Check gutters and downspouts, metal lawn furniture, air conditioners, screens, lawn tools -in short everything that's susceptible to rusting.

A quick paint job can make the difference between the cost of a high quality rust preventive coating and replacing the item altogether.





Plastic Card Dilemma-Which One Do You Use? By Willis W. Alexander Executive Vice President American Bankers Association

There's a new dilemma for consumers today. Imagine: You've spotted a for-sale item you really need, but you don't have the cash on hand to buy it. Your wallet is full of plastic cards, but which one should you use? Credit card . . . asset card . . . charge card . . . bank card . . . cash card . . . debit card . . . "T & E" card?

If that question hasn't occurred to you yet—it may soon.
Use of cards in place of cash
began before World War I when charge account cards were issued in limited number by a few hotels, oil companies and department stores for local or company use only. Today, with increased travel, decreased acceptance of personal checks and a real fear of carrying too much cash, the variety and number of cards has dramatically increased.

Here's a breakdown of the

variety by type: · Credit cards, charge cards and bank cards like BankAmericard and Master Charge are all based on the "charge" or "line-of-credit" privilege. The company or bank issuing the card bills the cardholder once a month for all purchases made, and, in most instances, the individual has the option of re-paying part of the bill and put-ting the rest on a deferred basis, In this case, a finance charge is generally added to the unpaid



### Good Nutrition Torothy M. Rathmann, Th. D.

Wouldn't it help if I ate no fat

A. Don't try to copy Jack Spratt-you could get into trouble! Although nutritionists have not established a Recommended Dietary Allowance for fats, there is no doubt that some is necessary and desirable.

Fats carry fat-soluble vita-mins A, D, E and K, and help the body utilize protein. Vegetable oils in particular contain essential fatty acids, which cannot be produced by the body. Fats also keep you from getting hungry too soon-so even reducing diets should contain some fat.

You should be aware that fats are triglycerides formed from 3 general classes of fatty acids. If saturates predominate, as they do in most animal fats, the fat is solid at room temperature. In most liquid vegetable oils, polyunsaturates predominate. (Coconut oil, a saturated fat, is an exception.) Margarines are in between. Even though Mazola margarine appears to be solid, its primary ingredient is liquid corn oil. Yet another type, olive oil, is primarily monounsaturated.

All fats and oils in foods are alike, however, in energy value. Weight for weight, fat has over twice the energy (calorie) value of protein and carbohydrate. So a high fat meal is likely to be a high calorie one, too. Much of this fat is hidden-not readily visible-being present in meats, poultry, whole milk, cheeses, rich desserts, nuts.

The typical American diet contains 40 to 50% of its energy value (calories) from fat. That sounds like a lot, doesn't it? It is-and is too high for the typically sedentary person.

Reducing the total amount of fat usually means cutting calories-the first step in losing weight. Reducing the amount of saturated fat may do even more; it may reduce the likelihood of heart disease.

You can accomplish this by eating less meat fat (choosing leaner cuts, discarding visible fat, using smaller portions); switching to skim milk, using less butter and less cheese made with whole milk or cream; incorporating polyunsaturated vegetable oils, like Mazola corn oil, in moderate amounts in salad dressings, in cooking lean meats, poultry or fish and (with appropriate recipes) when you make breads and desserts.

# Consumer Scene?

Tips On Home Food Preservation

conscious consumers these days that a shortage of canning jars and lids in many areas threatens to put a crimp in the home canning plans of some families who have carefully nurtured an Anti-Inflation Garden to the harvest season.

But there is an alternative way to put up that bumper crop of vegetables - freezing. And many home economists feel it is not only easier but safer than canning.

Here is a quick checklist on food freezing from General Electric's Consumers Institute:

▶ Be selective. Choose only top-quality fruits and vegetables at their peak of ripeness. Freezing maintains quality, but cannot improve it.

Plan ahead. Some foods are better wrapped in individual-sized portions, others in family-size.

Wrap it well. Wrapping material should be moisture and vapor proof to prevent drying; be careful not to puncture the wrap.

Label packages to show quantity, intended use, and

Check freezer temperature. Food should be frozen at a temperature near zero and stored at a temperature that is maintained below 8° F.

Don't freeze too much at one time, Overloading will raise the temperature. Add only about 1/10 the capacity of the freezer each day. Place the

the sides and back. Use oldest foods first.

✓ Most fruits and vegetables can be kept frozen 8 to 12 months without affecting flavor or quality.

If you're one of the lucky ones who have the necessary equipment for canning, the Consumers Institute offers these

Don't experiment! Use only tested, approved methods. Follow all time and temperature specifications precisely. If in doubt, err on the side of higher temperature or longer cooking time.

Use only jars, cans and lids made specifically for home canning. Don't try to reuse old peanut butter or mayonnaise

Do not reuse sealing lids; the rubber may deteriorate, preventing proper seal. Rings can be re-used.

Do not overpack foods; trying to get too much into a jar may result in under-proc-

essing and spoilage. Leave one inch of "head space." Before using canned foods check for leaks, bulging lids, off-odors, off-colors, or any sign of mold. When in doubt. throw it out! Never use any canned foods showing any sign

of spoilage. Whatever you do, don't taste-test it! To be extra safe, boil home canned vegetables for at least ten minutes before serv-




