Bicentennial Talks Begin On Tuesday

Mr. Jeremiah Wynkoop, a fictional character, will be your guide and commentator through the events of the Revolutionary Era, the first of a 12 part series to be presented as a special Bicentennial Project conducted by Mt. St. Mary's College and the Town of Emmitsburg. The series opens on September 2 when, "The American Revolution and the Birth of a Nation", will be presented in the VFW by Dr. John L. Morrison, a faculty member at both Mt. St. Mary's College and Seminary.

Among his many personages, Mr. Wynkoop was a successful merchant of New York City. Jeremiah Wynkoop was also a smuggler! He brought goods, including illicit molasses, sugar, silks and laces, brandy and Dutch gin into the country from the West Indies. All of these goods were stored in secret compartments in his home in Greenwich Village. It was in one of these secret compartments that a rare discovery was made in 1940, as a manuscript dated 1789 and an album of prints and pictures clipped from newspapers were uncovered. Because of these findings Jeremiah's commentary on the events of that period will be presented to the citizens of Emmitsburg on Sept. 2 at 7:30 p.m. when Dr. Morrison will present "Those Revolting Americans, A Portrait of Revolutionary America Based Upon the Jeremiah Wynkoop Collection of 1789." There will also be 18th century musica nd an exhibit of the Wynkoop Collection.

Quilt Exhibit To Be Part Of Show

Ceremony In Rome Is Moved Outdoors

Rev. Sylvester A. Taggart, C.M., vice postulator for the cause of Mother Seton, has announced changes in location and time for the canonization ceremony of Elizabeth Ann Seton September 14 at Rome. The ceremony has been moved outdoors to St. Peter's Piazza and re-scheduled for 5:30 p.m., Rome time (11:30 a.m. EDT).

Over 12,000 requests have been received to date by the U. S. Secretariat for the Postulation set up at Rome to handle reservations for the event. The anticipated audience cannot be seated in St. Peter's Basilica as originally planned, necessitating the transfer outdoors. Seating will be provided in the Piazza for all who will have been issued tickets.

Rome's traditionally high daytime temperatures led to the choice from a morning ceremony to one during the cooler early evening hours.

Pope Paul VI will be the principal celebrant and will deliver the homily at the canonization ceremony. In keeping with Mother Seton's example of "universal charity" and to accent it as a spiritual experience, a monetary gift will be presented to His Holiness by representatives of the 1500 member Federation of Daughters of Elizabeth Ann Seton "to alleviate the needs of the starving people of the world."

Energy Future — Not So Rosy

By Sen. Charles McC. Mathias, Jr. It is standard for public officials to be optimistic, to say the future looks rosy, and that things are going to get better. I wish I could say things such as inflation, employment and other basic aspects of modern life are bound to get better.

Instead, I feel it is necessary to act the role of Jeremiah and speak very frankly of my concern for the future of our economy, our society and our country. Many of our problems revolve around the question of energy. Both our agriculture and our industry have been built on cheap energy, and the outlook for energy is very bad.

Demand for energy doubled from 1950 to 1970, and it will have doubled again by 1990. There is no way for supplies to keep up with that kind of growth in demand, and the result will be a squeeze that we all will feel.

One study, which used the most optimistic reports about available supplies from Alaska, solar energy, nuclear power, plants and shale oil from the Midwest, matched these up with the most optimistic outlook for conservation through more efficient use, higher prices, and cutting back wherever possible. The results showed that we will have to look abroad for more and more energy each year.

Even with sacrifices, our dependence will increase, and we will have to compete in the market with the prices other nations are willing to pay.

Does this mean that we will have to lower our standard of living? I am still hopeful this does not happen. There is no question, however, that our way of life must be changed. We should keep this in mind during the many debates on energy that face us in the months and years to come.

We don't have to end up on the rocks, if we understand the seriousness of the problem and make the commitment to take serious steps to solve it.

Choirs To Sing At Shrine Masses

A "Carillon" Mass in Honor of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first native U. S. citizen to be canonized, will have its premier at Emmitsburg, Sunday, September 14, 1975, the day the canonization ceremony will take place at the Vatican.

Commissioned by the Daughters of Charity of the Emmitsburg Province, the newly composed mass is the work of Robert Grogan, assistant director of music, carillonneur and associate organist at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Washington, D. C.

Composed during July 1975 in anticipation of the canonization, the "carillon" of the title carries the same connotation as with many compositions for organ based on bell figurations and motives. The "Holy, Holy, Holy Lord" and the "Lamb of God" are melodically related to the Sanctus of Mass IV and the Agnus Dei of Mass XVII in Gregorian Chant.

The mass will be sung by guest choirs during the six liturgical celebrations scheduled for the day in the Shrine Chapel at St. Joseph's Provincial House at Emmitsburg. Rev. Joseph A. Wysocki, organist at St. Anselm's Benedictine Abbey, Washington, D. C., will accompany the choirs on the organ.

The choirs participating at each mass are: 9 a.m., 35-voice seminarians choir, Mt. St. Mary's Seminary, Emmitsburg, directed by Timothy Sperber; 11 a.m., 35-voice choir, St. Mary's Church, Damascus, Md., directed by Mrs. Margaret Hanville; 1 p.m., 55-voice choir, St. Catherine Labourer Church, Wheaton, Md., directed by Mrs. Eileen Bottamiller; 3 p.m., 50-voice choir, St. Joseph's Church, Mehanicsburg, Pa., directed by Timothy Sperber; 5 p.m., 50-voice mens and boys choir, Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Baltimore, directed by Norman Sydner, with Rev. Arthur W. Bastress, pastor of Immaculate Heart serving as cantor; and at 7 p.m., 35-voice choir, including a complement of trumpets and handbells, of St. Andrew the Apostle Church, Wheaton, will be directed by the composer, Robert Grogan.

A cordial invitation is extended to the public to join in the celebration at the Seton Shrine on canonization day, and to participate at any of the six masses in the chapel at St. Joseph's Provincial House, where the remains of the saint are reserved in the newly-designed altar dedicated to the sainthood of Elizabeth Ann Seton. Reservations are not required.

The chapel accommodates 1000 persons. If necessary, outdoor masses will be held in the vicinity of the chapel on the even hours (10 a.m., noon, 2, 4 and 6 p.m.) to serve an overflow attendance.

Ample parking for private cars and charter buses will be available at the Shrine. Visitors will be welcomed from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the new Shrine Center where they may view a brief slide presentation of the shrine sites. A gift shop will be open to purchase mementoes of the occasion. The historic buildings associated with Mother Seton's pioneer years, 1809-1821, at Emmitsburg will be open and staffed with extra guides to serve visitors. Light refreshments will be sold only on Sunday, September 14, in the Student Center.

There is no admission fee for entrance to the shrines or for parking.

Town Rejects Bid To Purchase Hotel

Members of the Emmitsburg Town Council last week rejected an offer of Farmers and Mechanics National Bank to let the town demolish the century-old Emmitsburg Hotel on the Square and install a public parking lot under a five-year lease.

As a result of Council's rejection, Bank President Guy W. Nusz said the bank will allow its option to buy the property expire on Monday.

The bank obtained an option to buy the structure, now used as an apartment house, from Mrs. Pearl Myers for \$45,000. Nusz said the bank has no immediate use for the property and offered to lease it to the town for five years if the building were demolished and a parking lot were constructed. He said the bank also offered to give the town the "right of first refusal" to purchase the property at the end of five years for \$45,000 plus interest, if the bank decided there was no need to expand.

Mayor Richard Sprankle said the town already had 150 metered parking spaces ("many are not being used") and the town sees no justification for spending \$22,500 to \$27,500 for demolition, "plus another \$5,000 for paving and metering a parking lot we don't need."

He said he had hoped that the bank would buy the property, which is in a bad state of repair, and raze it for a customer parking lot and the eventual addition of another drive-in window. The hotel adjoins the present bank building.

Sprankle said the 9,000 sq. ft. lot would provide about 24 parking spaces, which under the bank's proposal, would cost approximately \$3,000 each, "plus the cost of rent during the lease."

Sprankle anticipates increased tourism in Emmitsburg with the canonization of Mother Seton, but he feels that most of the influx will be in one-day or less visitations. He believes the event will "have some impact on the town" and that "it might be a little rough for awhile." But he doubts that immediate expansion of parking facilities is necessary.

The following questions were typical of the kind asked of me in recent weeks. Letters should be sent to me, c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515.

How do I go about applying for an academy appointment? From now until October 30 I will be accepting applications for appointments to the United States Service Academies

for the class entering in July, 1976. Nominations are open to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, the Military Academy at West Point, the Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point. Interested candidates should write me here in Washington. Applications will be sent to prespective nominees who will later be subject to written and physical examinations and an interview by my Academy Selection Board.

Has the Interior Department issued any new environmental learning guides for school-age children? A new booklet containing

more than 100 environmental projects and activities suitable for elementary school children has been published by the Department of Interior's Johnny Horizon Program.

Please send me a list of federal financial aid programs for students.

The U. S. Office of Education has several programs of student assistance including Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, College Work-Study, National Direct Student Loans and Guaranteed Student Loans. Citizens interested in detailed descriptions of those programs, as well as application forms, should write the Department of Health, Education & Welfare, Education Division, Office of Education, Washington, D. C. 20202.

What is the status of impounded Highway Trust Funds? Are they ever going to be released?

Earlier this year \$2-billion in impounded funds were released to spur highway construction and create 107,000 new jobs. The money was part of a \$10.7-billion in congressionally authorized high-

way funds for which spending had been deferred. The funds had accumulated in the Highway Trust Funds from impoundments begun in 1968.

Can you tell me if Medicare takes care of outpatient hospital services?

Medicare's medical insurance helps pay for covered services you receive as an outpatient from a participating hospital for diagnosis or treatment of an illness or injury. Medical insurance pays the hospital 80 per cent of the reasonable charges for covered services you receive as an outpatient after subtracting any of \$60 deductible you have not met. The hospital will apply for the medical insurance payment & will charge you for any part of the deductible you have not met plus 20 per cent of the remaining reasonable charges.

Travelers Checks — High Value, Low Cost

Once you have saved, borrowed or otherwise acquired the money to pay for a long-dreamed-of vacation, the question arises: How will you carry it? Cash is too dangerous, credit cards not useful in all circumstances and personal checks almost useless — especially in a foreign country.

Obviously, you want a means of exchange that will provide both wide international acceptance and protection against loss, and nothing fits that bill better than travelers checks. Available to vacationers since the end of the 19th century, these self-identifying money orders are widely accepted by hotels, merchants and restaurants because they include a guarantee that they will be honored by the issuer if proper cashing procedures have been followed.

Protection against loss is provided by the bank or issuing company itself, provided that you have agreed to and met certain conditions stated at the time of purchase. Specifically, you must be able to provide positive identification of yourself and supply the receipt or the numbers of the lost or stolen checks, or at the very least the name and address of the bank or place where you bought them and the date on which they were purchased.

Then too, you must strictly follow the signature identification system. When you purchase travelers checks, you will sign them once in the presence of

the seller and leave behind a sample of your signature for the files. When you cash one of the checks, you sign it again in the presence of the person accepting it so that the two signatures can be compared. Normally, this is the only identification required.

Travelers checks may be obtained in various denominations, usually \$10, \$20, \$50 or \$100. In recent years, they have also become available in the U.S. in some foreign currencies. The fee to purchase them is nominal — normally about one per cent of face value, or \$1 for \$100 worth of checks. In some cases, they are free to bank customers.

Some final tips for safety and quick refunds when checks are lost or stolen:

- Carry your checks in an inside pocket or money belt and keep them in your possession at all times.

- Keep the purchase receipt in locked luggage or the hotel safe, but do not keep it with your checks. If they are lost or stolen, the receipt would also be gone. You might even want to keep a list of the check numbers at home.

- Keep a record of the numbers of the checks you cash, when and where you cashed them and the amount involved so you will know which ones were lost or stolen. And finally,

- Do not sign the checks the second time until the moment you are ready to cash them. If your lost or stolen checks have been signed twice, you will probably have difficulty in obtaining a refund.

Senator Questions Police Methods

State Senate Minority Leader Edward J. Mason (R-Dist. 1) will introduce legislation in the Maryland General Assembly requiring that all state policemen be attired in uniform and traveling in marked police cars when giving speeding tickets.

Senator Mason said he is proposing the bill in reaction to Governor Mandel's recent directive to state police to use unusual methods to apprehend speeders, such as hiding radar equipment in commercial vehicles and working out of uniform in unmarked cars.

"For the state police to disguise themselves or their radar equipment in an attempt to catch unsuspecting speeders is questionable behavior which smacks of entrapment," said Senator Mason.

"The purpose of patrolling the highways and ticketing speeders or clearly to effect an overall slow-down of the traffic flow to the 55 MPH speed limit. It is obvious that marked police cars with uniformed drivers are the best deterrent of speeders. As anyone who drives knows, traffic slows down immediately when a police car is spotted. To ticket an unsuspecting motorist, however, is nothing but a punitive action against an individual. It does nothing to solve the overall speeding problem."

ing to solve the overall speeding problem."

Senator Mason said that while he does not advocate excessive speed on Maryland's highways, he feels that alternatives must be found to solving the energy problem other than the 55 MPH speed limit.

Tempting Bounty From Bayou Country

The unique, highly seasoned taste of Cajun cooking has helped make southern Louisiana one of the more interesting tourist spots in the United States. Today's Louisiana Cajuns are descendants of the hardworking, religious French Acadians who fled to this side of the world during the 17th century and formed colonies in the Canadian provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Some of the more hardy stock later found their way south, settling in Louisiana "bayou country" where small streams draped with exotic Spanish moss crisscross the marshy coast.

For an authentic Cajun dinner, Baudoin suggests Crawfish Thermidor, an elegant marriage of seafood and seasonings in a heavy sauce, Corn Maque Choux, a typical Cajun vegetable, and Derby Pie, a luscious mixture of roasted pecans and chocolate chips.

- Crawfish Thermidor**
- 6 scallop shells
 - 1 1/2 pounds crawfish tails and fat
 - 2 shallots
 - 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 - 3/2 ounce brandy
 - 2 cup white wine
 - 3/2 cup cream
 - 1 cup bechamel sauce
 - Prepared mustard to taste (about 1 tsp.)
 - Salt, pepper, cayenne to taste
 - 2 ounces grated Italian cheese
- Bechamel Sauce**
- 2 tablespoons butter
 - 3 tablespoons flour
 - 3/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup hot milk

To prepare sauce, cook butter and flour for a few minutes over gentle heat. Warm milk and add to mixture about 1/2 at a time. Bring sauce to boil, stir-

ring constantly. Season with salt and pepper; strain. Cook sauce very gently to avoid burning.

Fry crawfish in fat to color, one or two minutes; add shallots and parsley and cook about 10 minutes. Remove mixture from pan; heat brandy in same pan. Return shallots and parsley to pan; blend in cream, bechamel, seasonings and wine. Cook until liquid reduced by half (about 15 minutes); strain. Mix about 3/4 of sauce with crawfish; add mustard. Fill shells with mixture and pour remainder of sauce over filled shells. Sprinkle with cheese and brown in 400-degree oven or under broiler.

Corn Maque Choux

- 8 ears fresh corn
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 3/4 cup chopped bell pepper
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 3/4 cup cooking oil
- 1/2 cup roux*
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 4 fresh tomatoes, wedged for garnish

Clean corn thoroughly and slice from cob; scrape cob to get juice. Mix corn, onion, bell pepper and sugar. Season with

salt and pepper and pour in heated cooking oil. Reduce heat to low, add roux* and stir. Cover and cook over low heat 45 minutes, stirring frequently. Garnish with tomato wedges. Serves 4 to 6 people.

*Roux: Melt 4 tablespoons butter over low heat; slowly stir in 3 tablespoons flour. Stir constantly; heat gently to brown slightly. Slowly add 1/4 cup water, stirring until blended smoothly.

Derby Pie

- 1 stick butter or margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 cup coarsely chopped pecans
- 1 16-ounce pkg. chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 9-inch unbaked pie shell

Stir sugar into melted and cooled butter. Add eggs, vanilla and flour; blend well. Stir in pecans and chocolate chips; pour into pie shell. Bake in 325-degree oven about 1 hour, or until knife inserted halfway between center and edge comes out clean.

Garden-fresh vegetables, ripe, ready fruit, tender young chickens. Many home-makers have learned to take advantage of seasonal abundances when these foods are at their peak freshness and lowest price by canning at home. fruits. So first, let's consider the pressure cooker and canner.

The size pressure cooker and canner you need depends on the size of your family and amount of food you are going to can. Mirro Aluminum Company, for example, manufactures 4, 6, 8, 12, 16 and 22-quart models. The smaller models are ideal family-sized pressure cookers as well as convenient canners for small to medium-size home gardens. Large canners double as grand-scale pressure cookers for large families or group gatherings.

Bear in mind that cooker size is not the same as canning capacity. For example, a 4-quart cooker equipped with weight control for 10 lbs. pressure will hold 4 pint-jars, 6 and 8 quart cookers will hold 7 pint-jars, and 22-quart cookers will hold 38 half-pints, 20 pints or 7 quart jars.

There are several different kinds of pressure cooker and canners on the market, so it's important that you get just the right type.

Look for one that has a weight control rather than a

dial gauge. Weight controls have no working parts to get out of order, and won't require annual checking or calibration for accuracy.

Canners with a dial gauge require checking by your county extension home economist (if she has the proper equipment) or by the manufacturer before each canning season to assure accuracy.

Because a weight control maintains correct pressure automatically, it eliminates a lot of pot-watching. As Laura Wilson, Mirro Test Kitchen Director says, "With a weight control, an audible signal will tell you proper pressure is being maintained, but a dial gauge has to be watched. Pressure does not exceed the selected level with a weight control, but it can with a dial gauge." For this reason, weight controls are often preferred. Once you get your pressure cooker and canner, be sure to read the instruction booklet that comes from the manufacturer for proper operation and recipes. Then be prepared to enjoy seasonal favorites all year 'round, while you stretch your food budget.



Subduing The Sod Webworm

Q. 


